


This is a fun time for dress-up in Mother or grandmother's hats, dresses, gloves, jewelry, etc.

#### PURIFYING WATER AT HOME

If you are unsure that your water is safe from bacteria and other diseasebearing organisms, purify your water before using it for drinking, preparing food, brushing teeth or dishwashing.

If the water contains sediment of floating material, strain it through a cloth before treating it. If the water is repeat the dose and let the water stand cloudy, muddy or discolored, filter the water through clean cloths or allow it to settle. Pour or draw off the clear water to be disinfected.

Water can be purified by boiling or by chemical treatment. Boil water at a rolling boil for 10 minutes to kill any disease-causing bacteria in the water. Add a pinch of salt to each quart of boiled water or pour the water between clean containers several times to improve taste.

If water cannot be boiled, treat it able. chemically. Two chemicals usually for water. Check the label to be sure Follow manufacturer's directions.



# Couple Announces Engagement







Is television the family's friend or foe? In recent surveys of 1000 parents conducted by the IOF Forest-

ers, most reported their children watch more television than the parents did as youngsters. They also said that watching television together was the number one way they spend time with their kids. Yet improving family communication and building their child's self-esteem were the two greatest con-

Television and its influence is parent. Hold family discussions about the ideas and values presented. Set limits when a child neglects other areas of life in favor of television.

With a little assistance from parents, children can bring a monster appetite for TV under control. In fact, some educators believe that children's love of TV can be used to improve their reading, learning and communication skills.

Here are a few tips to consider from Dorothy and Robert DeBolt, the parents of 20 children, who are currently touring America speaking on better parenting at IOFsponsored seminars:

•Get children into the habit of checking out a television program guide, preselecting what they will watch and scheduling their chores and homework so that there are no conflicts.

•Explore ideas with your children for activities that might be more fun than watching a TV show of no particular interest.

 Put the kabosh on TV at mealtimes. Make a practice of eating together. Upbeat conversations around the dining table are a good way to sell kids on communication.

•TV viewing can even lead to your children's greater involvement with reading. An educator in New Jersey discovered that 40 percent of the books chosen by junior high school students were movie or TV related.

•Ask for a child's point of view if you want to open the door to communication.

•A special note: monitor the exposure of younger children to movies and television programs that are violent. The American Academy of Child Psychiatry warns that viewing such programs does increase aggression and disturbance in some children.







# **Anti-What Vitamins?**

#### Survey Reveals Confusion About Antioxidant Vitamins

(NU) - Despite broad coverage by the media of antioxidant vitamins in recent years, two national surveys revealed widespread misunderstanding about the role of these vitamins.

More than half of those surveyed had heard of antioxidant vitamins, but 82 percent of those aware couldn't name a single example. Fifty nine percent said that they don't understand the difference between antioxidant vitamins and other vitamins. And survey participants showed little understanding of the role antioxidants may play in preventing disease.

#### What Are Antioxidants?

Just as a piece of metal rusts or an apple turns brown when exposed to air, the human body is vulnerable from contact with air, especially pollution and smoke. Antioxidant nutrients --- beta-carotene, vitamins C and E - help the body fight this reaction by stabilizing harmful molecules, called free radicals, before they attack cells.

Studies reveal that antioxidants may play a role in the prevention of

heart disease, certain cancers and other fat-rich foods are the best complications from age-related eye diseases.

#### How Do I Get Them?

Although the optimum way to achieve adequate levels of antioxidants is through a healthy diet, it may be necessary to use supplements to achieve many of their potential benefits. Eating five servings or more of fruits and vegetables a day will help to provide adequate levels of vitamin C and beta-carotene.

Although a healthy diet gives you most of the antioxidants you need, Vitamin E is difficult to obtain without eating too much fat.


Vitamin E is harder to obtain while following a low-fat diet because vegetable oils, nuts, seeds and sources of vitamin E. It is virtually impossible to get enough of this vitamin in the diet without consuming too much fat. Antioxidants are not a substitute for maintaining a healthy lifestyle, i.e., not smoking, exercising regularly and eating right.

#### Why Should I Take Them?

Study findings recently published in the Journal of the American Medical Association showed that vitamin E appears to slow the growth of fatty deposits in the arteries of heart disease patients.

Numerous studies have shown that high amounts of beta-carotene, vitamins C, E and diets rich in these nutrients, may lower the risk of developing certain cancers. For people with diabetes, several initial studies suggest that antioxidants prevent increased free radical production caused by high blood glucose levels.
