Speed Limit Goes To 70 MPH On U.S. And State Highways

Department of Transportation's (TxDOT) Childress District were posted at 70 mph by Friday, Feb. 9, completing the third phase of the speed 70 mph. limit change.

The only remaining roadways that have not yet seen a speed limit incease are farm-to-market and ranch-to-market roads. Increased speed limit signs

will be posted on those roads by May


