THE CHANGING AMERICAN DIET-EATING LESS FAT Americans are eating less fat as percentage of total calories, according
to a new U.S. Department of Agrul to a new U.S. Department of ture nationwide food survey.
Data from the first yar (1994) of the three year survey -- "What We Eat In America" - found that Americans consumed 33 percent of calories from fat in 1994, continuing a downward
trend. In the late 1970's, Americans consumed 34 percent of calories from fat.
Even with this decrease, however wo-thirds of adults still eat more than the 30 percent recommended limit for
fat calories. The survey also found that nearly as many are consuming more than the recommended limit for saturated fatty acids.
The American
The American Heart Association well as other health organization recommend that no more than 30 perent of the calories come from fat with tropical oils and animal fats and poly tropical oils and animal fats and poly-
unsaturated fatty acids found in soy, unsaturated fatty acids found in soy,
corn, safflower and cottonseed oils. The remainder is made up of monounsaturated fatty acids found in olive peanut and caonla oolls.
That means consumers will need to That means consumers will need to amount of fat and the types of fatty acids found in varoius products. Also they can read levels to determine if other ingredients are found in the prod ucts ordinarilly containing fat.
