Petroleum Industry Ranks County 154th

The petroleum industry in Motley County played a significant role in 1972 in helping to satisfy the unprecedented demand for Texas' crude oil and natural gas.

Motley was one of 190 of

Texas' 254 counties which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a record production year for the state's No. 1 industry, according to figures compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

The county ranked 154th in the state in the value of petroleum produced, \$1.8 million. The sale of crude oil brought most of that total.

But despite this record year, due in large part to nine months of production at 100-percent of the maximum efficient rate, the nation's largest producer of petroleum could not produce enough to satisfy demand.

"To further stimulate production, we need a restoration of the open market force," said Robert A. Buschman of San Antonio, president of the Association.

"This would produce two much-needed effects: First, it would channel the state's petroleum products to the most efficient and highest priority uses; second, it would help provide part of the capital needed so desperately to build refineries and superports and to carry on expensive exploration and production activities," Buschman added.

This study by the Association also shows that production last year in Motley County resulted in the payment of \$228,000 to royalty owners.

The state of Texas received \$84,000 in production taxes from county wells, with almost all of that total coming from crude oil output.

Oil and gas producers and developers spent \$226,000 drilling three wells in the county last year, all dry holes.

(Special to the Tribune) AUSTIN — The number of cases filed in district court in Motley County during 1972 was 50 per cent more than the number filed during 1971, according to statistics released by the Texas Civil Judicial Council.

Cases filed during the last calendar year totaled 27, including 12 criminal and 15 civil.

Judge L. D. Ratliff of the 110th District Court has jurisdiction in Motley County.

The local district court disposed of 25 cases during 1972, 24 per cent of the cases filed during the year or carried over from 1971. At the end of the year, 79 cases were pending on the docket.

Statewide, the 245 district, domestic relations and special juvenile courts experienced less than a 1 per cent increase in filings during 1972 — to 280,971 cases from 278,338 in 1971. Twenty-seven per cent of these were criminal cases.

These state courts disposed of 51 per cent of the total cases filed in 1972 or carried over from 1971. The defendant entered a guilty plea in 47 per cent of the criminal cases disposed of. In the cases disposed of by a jury verdict, 74 per cent of the defendants were found guilty and 26 percent acquitted.

Of the 276,979 cases pending throughout the state at the end of 1972, 19 per cent had been on the docket 12 to 24 months and 28 per cent had been pending over two years.

For the last 40 years the Texas Civil Judicial Council has been collecting information concerning caseloads for the district and appellate courts. Beginning in 1973, the Council will expand its data collection activities by gathering and publishing statistics on caseloads of county, municipal and justice of the peace courts.

These statistics are essential for study and evaluation of the judicial system and its effects on the people of the state.

Meeting Sets Economy Goal

Bumper Crops In '72 Set All-Time Record

NOW THAT the records are in, the year of 1972 probably produced the best crops in the county's history. County Agent Bill Pallmeyer has received the

official report. Motley County produced 20,600 bales of cotton in 1972.

The yield was the highest on record, 415 pounds per acre from 23,500 harvested acres. Original planting was 29,100 acres.

It is true that the county has produced more cotton, but not on such small acreage. In 1929 the acreage was 81,000 and in 1957 the acreage in cotton was 90,000. That year the average yield was 347 pounds per acre.

While Motley County is primarily a cattle county, the favorable season produced other crops according to government reports.

Peanuts added to the county's economy last year. Mr. Pallmeyer said 1,350 acres were harvested, and the average yield was 3,346 pounds per acre. The price was, roughly, 15c per pound.

The 7,300 acres of wheat harvested in 1972 averaged 10.03 bu. per acre. The 8,000 acres of milo cut, averaged 1,839 pounds per acre.

The 1973 wheat crop was more favorable than 1972, but the excellent moisture conditions were a part of the 1972 season, which carried on into the early part of this year.

BOYS RANCH SURVEY MADE

IN ORDER to determine the response to the appeal made by former resident, Harry Hamilton of Lubbock, for a Boys Ranch in Motley County, a questionnaire has been mailed citizens.

A Boys Ranch committee has been appointed and will make a report to the Texas Boys Ranch in Lubbock.

The Boys Ranch project, when fully developed would care for about 100 homeless boys. It is estimated that 640 acres would be needed for the ranch. L. B. Campbell is chairman of the Motley County Boys Ranch committee.

Four options are provided in the questionnaire. One is a pledge to be paid at the time the land is purchased. Another is a pledge of so much per month for a blank number of years. Another favors the project and will provide funds for support when able.

The fourth choice says: "I am opposed to this project." It is requested that the statements be signed and returned not later than July 14.

GRASS FIRES START EASILY

Almost anything can start a grass fire under the dry conditions which have prevailed for more than a month, according to Fire Chief Alton Marshall.

Last week end, a shredding machine was being moved along the highway east of town when a bearing allowed metal to drag on the paving. Sparks from the dragging metal set the grass on fire, and the fire department was called.

During the year the department has answered over 40 calls, and over 30 have been rural, or grass fires.

Chief Marshall cautions everyone to use extreme care with the use of fire, especially in the burning of trash.

Hopes Rise For Reversed Trend

NEW HOPES rose to reverse the trend of dwindling population and economy of Motley County at a meeting held at the high school auditorium Tuesday. The optimism was sparked by Turett Mayes of Lubbock, regional service officer for the South Plains Association of Governments.

Mr. Mayes explained that Motley is one of the five counties in his region which is eligible for special federal aid. He said the county qualified because it had lost population between 1960 and 1970.

He said the government had spent billions trying to relieve conditions in metropolitan areas and with little success. "The government is now trying to relieve conditions in rural areas to make them more attractive and to try to move population back to them. We are trying to create jobs," he said. "We are attempting to reverse the trend through the aid and cooperation of locally elected officers. I refer of course to Judge Forrest Campbell who has named committees to work on possible plans.

"We are not going to tell you what to do," Mr. Mayes explained. "We want you to decide what economy would help you most and then we will work with you in an effort to obtain it. List your problems and set a goal."

Committees Separate He then turned the meeting over to Judge Campbell who designated each committee to a special place in the building. They began work instantly, and enthusiasm increased as they worked.

In the Housing, Parks and Recreation committee with Glen Brotherton serving as chairman, the conservation of water was the principal topic.

The three rivers that flow eastward from the Plains through the county "were dammed" to build recreation areas, supply municipal water and for irrigation, in addition to establishing flood control. New housing projects were discussed but the dams possible in the county led in interest.

The hour and 15 minutes allotted the committees was consumed and they continued functioning. About 40 interested businessmen attended. A second meeting has been suggested when the various projected ideas can be sifted for feasibility and immediate action.

Mr. Mayes was accompanied by Jackie Bubenik, planner for SPAG. Other counties were cited where SPAG projects are already being put into practice.

Gordon Zeigler, young regional writer for the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, who was present, said he had talked to "Chuck" Siewert, Lubbock capitalist, and asked him about making Roaring Springs a State Park. Mr. Siewert told the reporter that the Parks and Wild Life people were examining the grounds for that specific purpose.

The meeting, at which all areas of the county were represented, continued until almost midnight.


