




There are strong evidences that the Bible is above human ability. We have noted one. The Bible was written by about forty scribes, from several nations, from varied economic and cultural settings, and over a 1500 year span of time. Yet, the authors do not contradict each other.

Observation Number Two. Science and the Bible agree, even in areas where man was ignorant until recent times. The Bible is not a text book for scientific study. However, when the Bible has made statements in relation to scientific knowledge, those statements have been found true. Several scientific facts may be found recorded in the Bible long before men of earth ever discovered these facts. If so, where did the Bible authors get their information? Let us note a few such cases.

1. Shape of the earth. Every school child in the United States has been made aware of the "wisdom" of the ancients about the shape of the earth. "Why, it's flat. Anybody can see that.

By Magellan's time, some people began to doubt the scholars of the day. So Magellan decided to give scientists the old "laboratory test." His plan was to sail west, until he returned to his starting point in Spain. In 1519 he set a westward course with five ships and 230 men. Three years later, one ship returned with only 19 men. Imagine newspaper headline in Seville, Spain. "WORLD IS ROUND, WISE MEN WRONG." The experiment to prove this scientific fact had cost three years on the calendar, four ships, and 211 lives - not to mention monetary considerations.

But the world was a sphere before Magellan's time. And that fact was recorded many centuries before Christ. "It is He who sits above the circle of the earth . . ." Isa. 40:22. L. E. O'Neal
