## Bishop DeFalco To Administer Sacraments Here

Bishop Lawrence Michael DeFalco of the Catholic Diocese of Amarillo will visit the Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Matador, on Sunday, June 28, to administer the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Bishop DeFalco was born in McKeesport, Pa., where he received his high school education. He attended St. Vincent's College at Latrobe, Pa., St. John's Mission Seminary, Little Rock, Ark., and the Gregorian University in Rome, where he studied Canon Law and received the Licentiate of Canon Law and Doctor of Divinity.

He was assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Fort Worth, for ten years, upon coming to Texas in 1942, and returned to the Dallas-Fort Worth Diocese following his stay in Rome.

In 1936 Bishop DeFalco was installed as Bishop of the Amarillo Diocese. This is his first visit to the Matador church.

## Flomot Horse Show Scheduled July 17th

IN THE SHADOW of the Quitaque, Flomot is staging its first annual quarter horse show, and with the approval of the American Quarter Horse Association. The show is being sponsored by women, the Flomot Home Demonstration Club.

The show will be held on the football field and the ladies will serve lunch and have a concession stand on the grounds.

Purpose of the show is to help raise funds to build a community building. Plans and estimates have already been prepared for the steel and concrete building, 40x60 feet, fully air-conditioned and forced air heated. The estimated cost of the completed building is \$8,500, in addition to chairs and equipping the kitchenette.

Mrs. C. C. Jones, secretary for the show, said this week that hopes are held to have the number of entries at 100 or more which will place the show in a senior class.

In addition to the quarter horse show, a junior activities program has been arranged to include pole bending, reining, "western pleasure", barrel racing and goat fleecing. Buckles and ribbons will be given in this division. (entry fee in youth activities is \$2.50).

Handsome trophies for the quarter horse show have been received and will be awarded in each first place with ribbons through six places. John Stotts will serve as judge of the show.

## Safety Meet Sparks Area Hi-way Work

A MEETING held in the Texas Highway maintenance warehouse here early Tuesday afternoon, may prevent one or more accidents and perhaps save life and injury after work is started on State Highway 70 about July 6.

The pre-construction Traffic Safety Meeting is similar to meetings held on Texas Highway construction before the work is started. It included representatives of the Department of Public Safety, a representative of the construction company and representatives of the Texas Highway Department.

The project embraces six miles on State 70, from the Flomot intersection, six miles north to the Hall County line, and includes the removal of the present bridge across Quitaque River, and the construction of a new bridge.

Charles H. Schmidt, engineer for contractors Cooper & Woodruff, said removal of the present bridge would start about July 6. W. O. Hamm, supervising resident engineer for the Texas Highway Department, of Childress, said a temporary "all weather" crossing will be constructed across Quitaque River, and that the crossing will be maintained by the Texas Highway Department.

Traffic will be reduced to 40 MPH through the area of actual construction and proper markings will be installed. Flagmen will be on duty in areas of danger during the construction, which includes widening, reconditioning and resurfacing the six miles. Estimated cost of the project is \$219,823. Contract time is 150 working days.

**Highway Patrol Attend**  
Three members of the Texas Department of Public Safety attended the meeting and included Sgt. D. L. Dowdy of Childress, Patrolmen F. E. Johnson and J. G. Whitfield, both of Paducah. Local members of the THD attending included Resident Engineer Algine Groves, J. D. Craven, inspector and Calvin Nimmo, Field Survey worker.

Dirt base work for the project is expected to start in September, but crushing of material will start about August 15. It is expected that the work will be completed about the first of November. All equipment and materials will be stored off the right of way during the construction period, it was declared.

They have been in town each day hoping to receive the permits. Another problem is water. The "gyp" water at a windmill where they are camped is bitter and they brought some water from the Plains. They have, however, developed a "taste" for Matador water, and will use it for the remainder of their stay here.

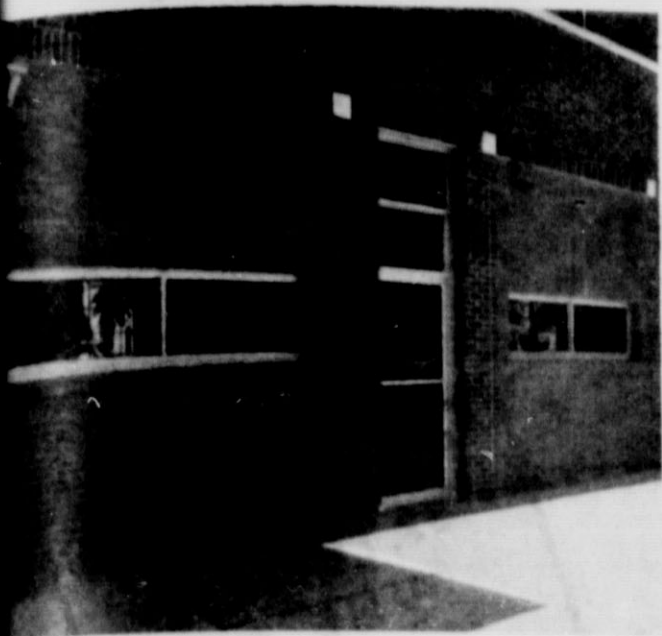
