Lummus Gin Given To Texas Tech

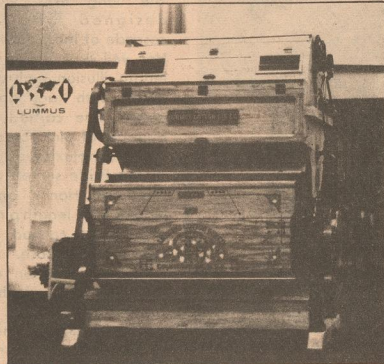
The presentation of a restored Lummus 1925 gin stand and feeder to Texas Tech University was the highlight of the 70th Annual Convention of the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association held recently in Lubbock. The 70-Saw "Automatic" Air-Blast Gin and "Big Drum" Feeder, part of a five-gin outfit originally purchased by Mr. E.E. Wood, were restored by Lummus Industries and presented to Texas Tech by Mrs. Reggie Anderson, granddaughter of Mr. Wood.

The one-story outfit was erected on Mr. Wood's farm outside White Flat, Texas, and was operated by him for a number of years. Joe Bloodworth, an employee of Wood's, married Mr. Wood's eldest daughter, Arlene, and Mr. and Mrs. Bloodworth operated the gin from the early 1930s until 1961, with a few seasons missed due to drought. Recently Mrs. Anderson, their daughter, arranged for the gin and feeder to be restored and given to Texas Tech.

The presentation was made the evening of April 8th, following a reception at

the Lummus booth in the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center. Members of the Bloodworth family made the formal presentation to Dr. Clyde Jones, director of the Tech museum. The restoration was done in the same Columbus, Georgia, plant in which the machines were built fifty-eight years ago. After locating the 1925 shipping list and the original drawings of the plant, the real work began.

The mechanical restoration was done by the same workers who assemble the latest Lummus "Imperial" 158-Saw Gins. All parts of the gin and feeder are original, except for the glass, two leather drive belts, and two pieces of wood which were too damaged to use.



The 1925 color scheme was duplicated as closely as possible. The exterior wooden parts and the metal roll box cover were painted and then stained in a wood grain pattern. The castings and metal fixtures were painted in a dark green enamel. Since none of the Lummus "Cotton Belt" decals still exist, this design had to be painstakingly restored by hand.

Doc Cook was conveyed by ambulance to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, Friday afternoon after a tractor he was repairing rolled over his body.

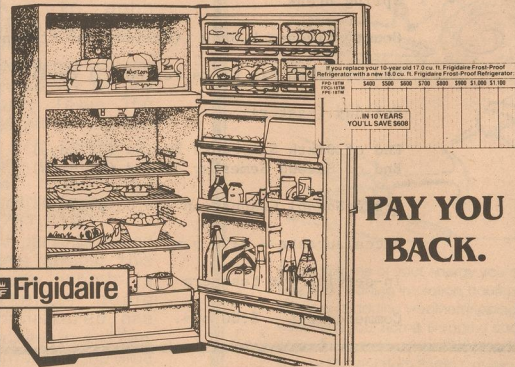
He was still a patient in ICU Tuesday having received a punctured lung, broken ribs and cardiac complications.

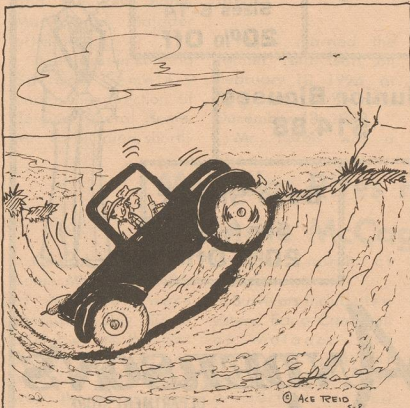
