Director Is Announced For Annual Spelling Bee

The director for Motley County's 1984 National Spelling Bee program has been named by the regional sponsors, the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University, Canyon.

Directing the county program will be Mrs. Edith Timmons, retired teacher, Matador; She has served since 1964. The director will select a place for the contest and name a pronouncer.

Gene Parker, director of placement, WTSU, and bee coordinator for the Amarillo newspaper, has announced the continuation of the educational program for students in the public and parochial schools in the 46-county area which covers four states.

"For a number of years the university in Canyon has strongly supported and believed in this educa-

tional program and we take a great deal of pride in helping to recognize the academic accomplishments of the young people who come to us in April as county winners," Parker said.

"We are delighted to work with all of the school officials in this area who share with us a desire to teach the best understanding of English -- not just a memorizing of spelling, but a knowledge of the structure of words and what they mean," he said.

In order to participate in the Bee students must not have passed beyond the eighth grade at the time of their school finals and must not reach their 16th birthday on or before May 27, 1984 (date of the national finals).

The 36th Regional Bee will be held on April 28 in the Mary Moody Northern Hall on the

WTSU campus in Canyon. Previously the event was held in Amarillo.

All county directors are to report the names of their champions to the Amarillo Globe-News by April 7. The 1984 district winner will go to Washington, D.C. in late May for the 57th national competition. In 1983 there were 137 finalists from across the country and already the national sponsors, the Scripps-Howard Newspapers, are predicting about 150 area contenders.

Most schools in the program use the booklet, "Words of the

Champions", and copies are available from the Amarillo Globe-News for 40-cents each. Address your order to Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166. The 1984 booklet contains more than 500 word changes.

A Junior Bee for the younger students, grade six and under, will also be conducted in each county. The county junior champs will be special guests of the sponsors in April. Jeanne Bartlett is spelling bee editor for the Amarillo Globe-News.

Future Of Jail Discussed At Meeting

A county-wide meeting held Tuesday in the District Court room in Matador to discuss plans concerning the county jail was attended by only 26 area residents, leaving the question as to whether county residents realize

the seriousness of the problem faced by local lawmen.

The jail in Matador was shut down two years ago because it did not meet Texas jail standards and since then lawmen have been transporting prisoners to Floyd County at a cost of \$30 per man per night, provided Motley County can pick up the prisoners the next morning if possible.

With new D.W.I. laws in Texas, local lawmen are required to lock up second offenders for 15 days. There are people roaming the streets of Matador, according to local lawmen, who should be in jail but are roaming the local streets because there is no jail here.

These were a few of the problems discussed at the meeting and the Motley County commissioners agreed with the lawmen that a jail was needed here.

The problem is, how to get a jail. Commis-

ioners were asking for public input for suggestions.

After lengthy discussion it was decided the old jail could not be rebuilt to meet standards, partly because it is a historical building.

The cost of a new jail, minimum, would be approximately \$165,000. This cost was estimated for the building alone, not including insurance or other cost.

A bond election was discussed, but the commissioners agreed that with the economy the way it is, the bond issue would not pass now.

The main item agreed on was the county has a problem, the lawmen have a problem and the tax payers have a problem.

Another meeting will be set to discuss these problems at a later date, and all county residents are urged to attend.

Matadors Lose First District Game

The Motley County Matadors remained winless for the 1983 football season as they fell 27-12 last week in a close game against the Crowell Wildcats.

"We lost the game, but it was a lot closer than the score indicated," Coach Danny Williams said. "There was a lot of hustle and our intensity was good. We are getting better each game."

Crowell moved to 3-0-1 for the season, scoring first on F.A. Newman's 9-yard run with 9:25 left in the first quarter.

Shannon Winn scored from 10-yards out for the Matadors, but the kick failed, making the score 7-6.

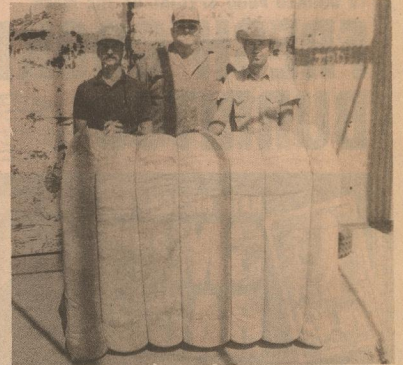
Newman scored a 10-yard TD in the second quarter and the Wildcats never looked back.

Darrell Moore returned a punt 45-yards in the final period for the Matadors, but it was too little, too late to save the Mats.

"We travel to Rule this Friday to play the Bob Cats," Williams said. "I want to thank our loyal fans for supporting us."

Cotton Ginning Season Begins Monday In Flomot

The cotton ginning season began with a bang Monday in the Flomot community as both the Caprock Gin and the Flomot Co-Op Gin rolled out bales of cotton, the first this year for Motley County.

Several Flomot area farmers were trying to be the first to have a bale in the county, but as it turned out Rogene Bethel of South Plains in

Floyd County had the first bale to be ginned in Motley County.

Bethel's bale came into the Caprock Gin yard at about noon Monday and was ginned at 1:30. Then Yeary & Sons of Cedar Hill brought in a bale ginned at 2:30.

The first cotton raised in Motley County to be ginned was at the Co-Op Gin. Ronald Clay,

who stripped a bale about seven miles east of Flomot, had his cotton ginned at 3:30 Monday.

Caprock Gin's first bale weighed about 520 pounds and produced 850 pounds of seed, with a 22 percent turn out. Flomot Co-Op's first bale weighed 560 pounds and produced almost 1000 pounds of seed.

Bill Jones had been trying to have the first bale this year, but rain forced a delay. He began stripping the cotton Tuesday.

Other gins in the county should begin seeing action the latter part of this week or early next week, although most of the local cotton is still very green.

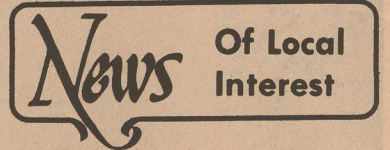
1. Don't wear shirts with ragged sleeves, or pants with ragged legs, or ragged shoes near any kind of machinery or in a factory.

Social Security News

A person's Social Security number is the key to his or her lifetime protection under Social Security. All earnings that a person has over his or her working lifetime are recorded under that number, and if an incorrect number is used, that person may not receive proper credit for all of his or her earnings.

People should always carry their Social Security card with them when they get a new job and make sure the employer copies the name and number just as it is shown on the card.

A person should keep a record of his or her number in a safe place. Then if the original card is lost, a new card with the old Social Security number can be obtained easier than if the number were not known.

If a person ever becomes aware that he or she has more than one Social Security

number, he or she should contact a Social Security office right away. The people there will help get the situations cleared up so that the person gets full credit for all earnings.

It is against the law for a person to use someone else's Social Security number. It is also against the law for a person to give false information when obtaining a number. Penalties include a fine or jail sentence or both.

It is a good idea for a person to check his or her Social Security record every 3 years or so to make sure earnings are being correctly reported. This is especially important if the person changes jobs often.

Jacobs Rites Eulogizes Devotion To Friendship

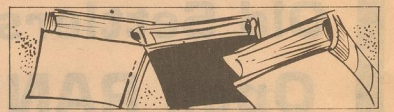

People wishing to purchase tree seedlings through the Texas Forrest Service for windbreaks may pick up order forms in the County Extension office.

There will also be some new equipment on display. Location for the symposium will be the Wilbarger Auditorium, Vernon, Tx., at 8:30 a.m. -- 3:30 p.m. More information and pre-registration forms can be picked up at the County Extension Office.

A Horse production-course training Short Course has been slated for October 11 in Stephenville, TX, at the Tarleton State University Animal Pavilion. There will be discussions on horse nutrition, foot care, and brood mare management. Also a little on the Horse Program at Tarleton. Demonstrations will be given by trainer Larry Reeder on "Starting young horses and maintaining performance in older horses."

Wildlife Leasing To Be Main Topic Of Seminar

Farmers and ranchers can increase their net income in excess of \$3.00 per acre with a resource readily available, according to George Fore of Paducah, a cooperater with the Cottle County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Cattle and surrounding counties are naturally endowed with high populations of dove and quail. There has been an increased interest in hunting these game birds within the past few years. As much as \$3.00 per acre is being received from hunters for the privilege of hunting these birds on private property.

"It boils down to the simple fact that there is a very limited amount of prime dove and quail habitat available, and a steadily increasing demand for good places to hunt," stated Fore at a recent meeting of the Four

Winds Resource Conservation and Development Area at Paducah. "Many hunters are willing to drive or fly long distances and pay good money for the opportunity to hunt quail on good habitat."

Fore was recognized as the Outstanding Wildlife Conservationist in 1982 by the Cottle County SWCD. He plants strips of german and proso millets and other seed-bearing plants to enhance the natural habitat provided by the rangeland on his farm. He has also planted kleingrass on terrace ridges on his wheatland. This serves the dual purpose as a food crop for game birds and as escape cover.

"The hunters willing to pay a decent lease are going to expect the very best...", said Fore, "They are willing to buy a Lincoln Continental at any price, but they won't be interested in driving a used car."

How can farmers and ranchers attract hunters? How can good dove and quail habitat be managed to produce excellent habitat?

To address these questions, a Wildlife Leasing and Management Seminar, hosted and sponsored by the Cottle County SWCD and the Four Winds RC&D council will be held on Tuesday, October 11, 1983 at the Paducah Senior Citizen Town Hall, located immediately south of the Cottle County Courthouse. The meeting will start at 7:00 p.m.

Representatives from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Texas Tech University, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and USDA Soil Conservation Service will serve on the program.

All interested parties are invited to attend. For more information, contact your local Soil and Water Conservation District Office at Matador or contact James Gillespie, District Conservationist, SCS at 347-2263.



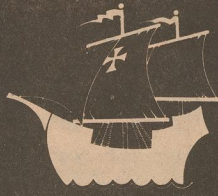

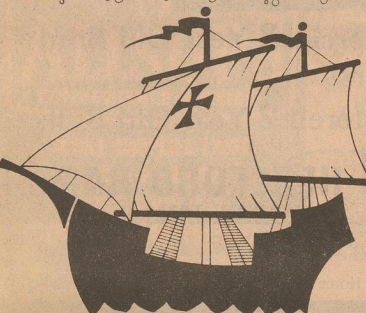
