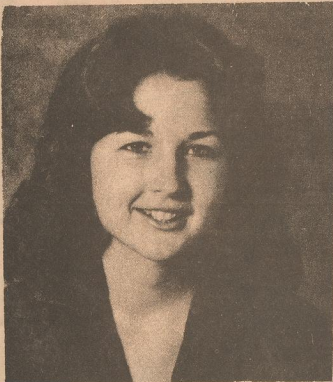

## Citizenship Report Is Given For Lions

Communists have planned to have accomplished their goal of world control (meaning the US) within 10 years, according to a report given at regular meeting of Matador Lions Club by Miss Kim Campbell.

Sponsored by the Motley County Farm Bureau, Miss Campbell attended a Citizenship Seminar July 20-24 on the Baylor University campus in Waco, an annual affair conducted by Texas Farm Bureau, and quoted several national figures in her report last Tuesday, to the Lions Club. Among the seminar speakers were Dr. Clifton Ganus, president of Harding University, Searcy, Ark., Alex Shekkel, a Russian immigrant, and Dr. Cleon Skousen, founder of the Freeman Institute in Provo, Utah.

The two main areas which will be used by the Communists in achieving their goal, will be "by corruption of the youth, involving them in drugs, alcohol and obsession with sex, destroying faith in God and mankind and breaking down the morals on which our nation was built; and second, they will attack the American Law

and Economy," Miss Campbell asserted. The second area, she said, was to destroy democracy and the free enterprise system.

"In the United States, citizens are given so many more privileges and freedom than in any other country. The American democracy and heritages must be preserved.

"The Farm Bureau seminar is great. It is very educational and interesting, and I wish that all high school students could attend," she declared.

Also attending the seminar was Rob Francis, sponsored by the Lions Club.

Guests introduced by Lion Tamer Bob Stanley were two representatives of the Social Security Regional office in Plainview, Misses Janet Jelion and Janice Ulmer. Miss Ulmer has been serving Motley County temporarily, and introduced Miss Jelion as the new service officer, who will be coming here the first Tuesday each month, to give Social Security assistance.

Lion president Alan Bingham presided at the meeting at the United Methodist Church and a delicious steak luncheon was served by Lion Walter Jones.

# Matadors Beat Paducah

The Motley County Matadors were 35 seconds away from a shutout here Friday night, but a never-give-up Paducah team managed to score. The Matadors were favored by one point over the Dragons Friday night in the Harris Rating system, but they surprised all the poll takers with a 34-6 thrashing of the Dragons.

Paducah was rated 76th in Class 2A, while the Matadors were rated 10th in Class A.

The Matadors rolled up 416 total yards to Paducah's 209.

Motley County defense set the pace of the game early when, on the second play of the game, Roy Thompson recovered a Dragon fumble on the Paducah 16 yard line. Three plays later Tim Shannon ran to the one yard line, but fumbled into the end zone where Paducah recovered it for a touchback, and got the

ball out on the 20.

The defense forced Paducah to punt on 4th down and on the next play from scrimmage Rob Francis broke a huge hole in the Paducah line and Harvey Lee ran through it, and went 48 yards to score. The point after touchdown (PAT) failed, and MC led 6-0 with 7:44 left in the first quarter.

The teams exchanged punts on their next possessions and then Paducah put together a 14 play drive and moved to the Matador's four yard line. The Dragons tried a field goal which failed.

Sparked by runs of 20 yards by Darrell Moore and 39 yards by Shannon the Matadors drove to the 5 yard line where Lee carried it in for the score. The PAT was a pass from Shawn Bearden to Wesley Stafford for 2 points, and the Matadors led 14-0 with 7:32 remaining in the first half.

Paducah controlled the ball for the next 7 1/4 minutes and drove from their own 25 to the Matador 9. As the half ended Paducah tried another field goal but were again unsuccessful.

Motley County received to start the second half but punted on 4th down. Jerry Long punted the ball out of bounds on the Paducah 6 yard line. Four plays later Shannon intercepted a Dragon pass on the 45 and returned it 19 yards to the Paducah 27. Shannon then ran for 11 yards, Harvey Lee carried for 9 yards, then Shannon carried again for 7 yards and a touchdown. The PAT failed with 5:39 left in the 3rd quarter and MC led 20-0.

Paducah was forced to punt after keeping the ball for 7 plays. The ball rolled dead on the MC 23 yard line.

Shannon carried for 15 yards, then Lee broke away for 62 yards for a TD. Glen Calvert kicked the PAT to make the score 27-0 with 2:24 left in the 3rd quarter.

With 3:40 left in the game Paducah's Burt House ran 60 yards for a would-be TD but a clipping penalty nullified the score. Eight plays later the Dragon's John Jones scored from the 3 with 35 seconds left in the game. The score was 27-6 after a failed PAT.

The Paducah fans had little time to cheer as Darrell Moore lit fireworks on the Motley County side again with a 76 yard TD run on the first play after the kick off.

The Matadors travel to Rochester Friday night where the game will start at 8:00 p.m.

## Hightower Press Agent Visits In Matador

Early last February Congressman Jack Hightower outlined his reasons for supporting the broad economic policy changes to be sought by President Reagan. Just recently, Congress passed the second half of his "economic recovery package," the hance-Conable three-year 25% cut in personal income tax proposal.

That was the message brought to Matador Tuesday by Steve Cotton, Hightower's Press Assistant. "As with the Phase I federal budget cuts known as Gramm-Latta, Hightower again supported the President as he felt this was best for the country and the district," Cotton said. "It represents a move toward lower government spending, lower personal taxation and toward a balanced federal budget, policies he has fought for since coming to Congress.

He believes this legislation is what the great majority of people in Northwest Texas wanted to see passed in the 97th

Congress." Several months ago, Hightower made an early commitment, in newsletters and personal letters to constituents, to support the general concept of a three-year cut instead of a one or two year cut. He indicated then that the final detailed Democratic and Republican proposals had not been worked out on paper but that the Reagan-backed Hance-Conable proposal would be more likely to have a three-year provision. At that early stage, Democrats were divided as to what number of years would be best for the country and the economy.

Creating and winning passage of this year's tax and budget legislation has involved some of the most complicated series of negotiations he has ever seen on any bill in Congress. The Hance-Conable version alone had some four or five major revisions, with key provisions added or deleted at one time or another on the way to the final vote.

## LIBRARY NOTES

Beverly Darsey, Librarian

We are happy to announce that Gerald Garst has been appointed lay representative for Motley County Library to the West Texas Library System by the Motley County Commissioners Court. Mr. Garst was recommended to the Court by the Library Board of Trustees. He will represent our library at various system meetings throughout the year.

The library room, located in Room No. 5 of the former elementary school building has had a face lift. We thank Darla Gwinn and Michelle Bearden for their work in the library last week, thus completing the painting of the library. And we thank the Matador Lions Club for providing funds needed for paint and painting supplies.

We are waiting for our shelving and card catalog cabinet to be shipped. The steel shelving, which will house approximately 6,000 books, and the cabinet are already several weeks overdue in shipment. This has caused a delay in our opening the library for check-outs.

Library trustee Ronnie Thacker and librarian Beverly Darsey attended an all-day West Texas Library System workshop in Plainview's Unger Memorial Library on Tuesday, September 1. The morning session covered Collection Development with emphasis on funding and policy.

The West Texas Library System has state and federal funds to benefit each library in the system for collection development with the amount depending upon the individual library's previous year's budget. Motley County Library will not receive such funds this year, but

will begin receiving funds in September 1982 based on our own 1981-82 budget for books. These funds may be spent in four areas of collection development: professional journals subscriptions, Paperback Parade, McNaughton Plan, and professional, adult, and children's non-fiction titles.

The afternoon session of the workshop covered the Audio-Visual Program with emphasis on the new statistical forms to be sent to the System office monthly, on young adult and adult filmographies, on film and filmstrip programming and publicity, and on film repair and projector maintenance. The System provides each community library with a film projector and a filmstrip projector. Motley County Library will receive its projectors and first packet of films and filmstrips at the System Meeting on September 23.

The films and filmstrips are rotated monthly from one library to another. Librarian Beverly Darsey will be contact various civic groups which may be interested in viewing on film or filmstrip a wide variety of topics such as health and safety, gardening, consumer education, comedy, history, literature, sports, travel and many more.

Plans are also being made to have a Saturday morning Children's Hour for preschool children once a month and another Saturday morning film session for elementary children also once a month. We hope to begin these programs in October. The Saturday morning sessions will be held in the former Senior Citizens room in the same building as the library. As children will be seated on the floor, we are looking for a used rug or carpet which might be donated to the library for this purpose. If you know of such, please contact Beverly at the library (347-2717).

The home of the Keith Marble's was the setting of an "old fashioned pounding" on August 16 for the couple.



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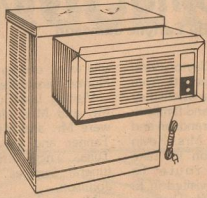
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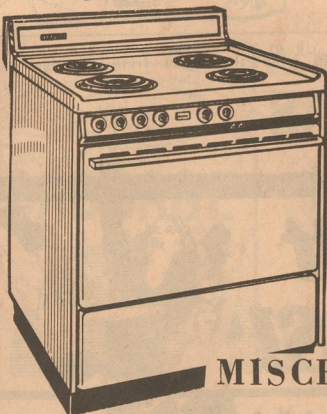

## PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 3, 1981

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

above the spending limit provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assistance Fund to be used as provided by law, including projects for water development and conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these purposes.

The amendment also provides \$500,000,000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%.

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 40 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 41 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a proposed estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

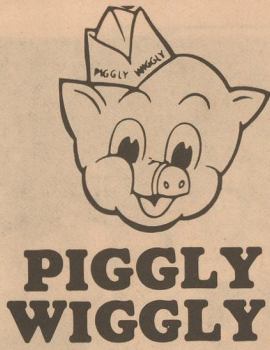
House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."

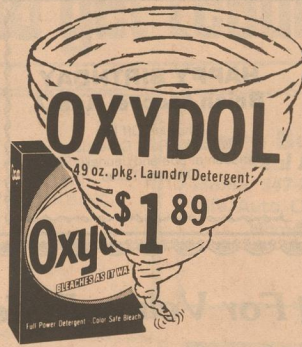

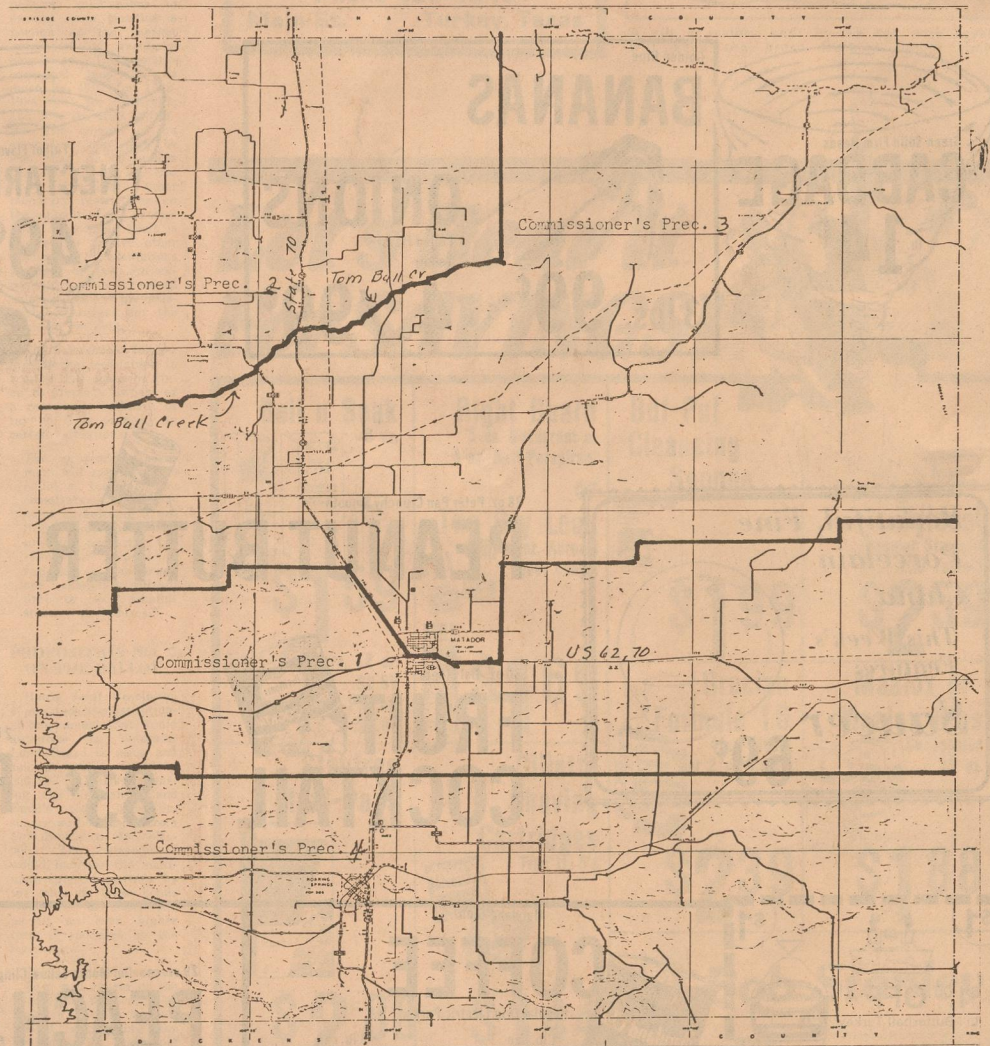
