## Mother and Son Named "Artists of the Month"

A mother and son, June and Terry Keltz are "Artists of the Month" with paintings on display in the foyer of the Citizens State Bank in Knox City.

Her paintings hang in homes and businesses throughout Texas and seven other states. One of her western scenes is exhibited in the Roy Rogers Museum in Apple Valley, California.

June has studied under such noted instructors as Lonnie Mason, Paul Wylie, Glenna Goodachre, Connie Martin, Ben Konis, and Jan Herring. She spent one summer in Taos, New Mexico, with the Texas Tech Art Department where she studied under Dr. Clarence Kincaid, Paul Hanna, and Juanita Tittle Pollard.

Her son Terry holds a bachelor of science degree in biological science and art from Wayland Baptist College.

He is a medical technologist by profession and manages a medical laboratory and x-ray department in Plainview.

Born and raised in the rough foothill country of Motley County, Terry's

early years were spent in and around the farming and ranching country near Matador. It was here where he spent much of his time astride either a good quarter horse or a Moline tractor that he began to appreciate the simple beauty found in every square mile of that part of the country. "A person can look in any direction and find a scene worthy of framing," he said.

Terry's artistic interest is not limited to the geographical area just off the caprock. His interest is in anything in view which portrays the West, particularly the weathered face of an old pioneer cowboy or Navajo Indian.

Because of his love for the West, its people, places and nostalgia, Terry devotes his talent to capturing the beauty of such through the media of oil, acrylic, water color, pen and ink, and bronze sculptures.

## Matadors Ranked 1st In Texas Class A

Not only is the 1981 Motley County Matador football team rated number one in District 2-A East this year, but also is rated number one in the state of Texas.

The Matadors were picked to head the list of gridiron favorites by Top-O-Texas Football yearbook.

"The Matadors have the size, strength and experience to challenge Valley and Happy for the loop title," the yearbook reads. "The hopes of the championship rests heavily in the hands of four outstanding players: seniors Glen Calvert, Harvey Lee and Wesley Stafford and junior Tim Shannon."

The Matadors also return other outstanding starters like Jerry Long, Shawn Bearden, Rob Francis, John Russell and Roy Thompson, plus many other talented boys.

Behind Motley County in the top ten teams in the state are Booker, number two, followed by Follett, third, and Valley is rated fourth in the state. Other schools in the top ten are McLean, Klondike, Sudan, Claude, Amherst and Anton.

In the District 2-A East picks, Valley is second behind Motley County followed by Happy, Lazbuddie, Silvertown and Nazareth.

Three of the state's top ten teams are in District 2-

A West. Sudan is first, Amherst, second, and Anton, third.

The Matador's first opponent this year will be Paducah, here on September 4. The final regular season game of this year will be here against Valley. Top-O-Texas says Valley will again operate from the Power I on offense and use a five man front on defense.

The Patriots should be very competitive the next few years. They aren't expected to win the zone this year because of powerful Motley County, but they may be undefeated when the two meet on the last regular season game.

ONE OF WEST TEXAS' most picturesque cowboys was Lon W. "Pelow" Vivian, who spent more than half a century in the saddle. He was born Feb. 1, 1877, in Dimmitt County in South Texas and grew to manhood near Eagle Pass. He came to Matador in 1901. His life as a cowboy on the Matador and other ranches in the area for over 30 years earned for him the unique role of "typical cowpuncher".

At the time of his death, January 19, 1949, his survivors included his wife, the former Maud Finch to whom he was married May 20, 1905, at Matador; four daughters, Mesdames Gertrude Reeves, Opal Horsley, Lois Stancell and Ruby Calk; and two sons, Bill Vivian and Tom Vivian.

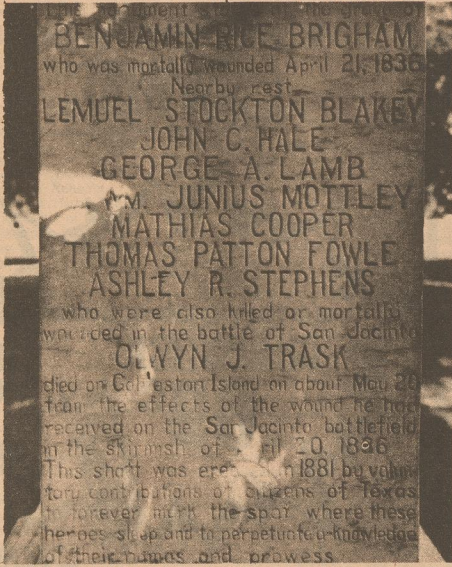

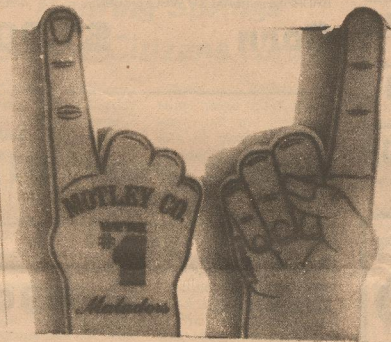
