

### Selective Service Signups Continue

Young men who rech their eighteenth birthday are required by law to register with Selective Service at any U.S. Post Office.

Registration is a simple process. Within 30 days of his 18th birthday, a man fills out a registration form which asks ony for name, address, phone number, social security number and date of birth.

The purpose of registration is to have available on a computer the names of men born in 1960 and later years, who could be contacted quickly if there ever were a national emergency and Congress were to declare an induction.

Peacetime registration will save the United States at least four weeks time in mobilizing its manpower in an emergency. This is especially important with today's all volunteer force. There are only 2 million


