Matadors Begin Training For Rugged 1981 Season

Two-a-day football workouts began Monday morning for the 1981 Motley County Matadors and Coach Gene Griffin had logged in 26 players so far on the roster this year.

Nine seniors head the list of rugged state contenders with 10 juniors backing those up. Five sophomores and two freshmen polish off the list,

but Griffin said the final roster could go up to 28 or 29 because some of the boys were "out of pocket" earlier this week.

"We are working on basic fundamental things this week," Griffin said. "It is those picky little things that forms the basic things the boys will have to learn."

The Matadors have

begun with ball handling drills and play learning. They will put on pads Friday morning and begin inter-team scrimmages and working on blocking assignments.

"The young men are working hard and are in the proper frame of mind," Griffin said.

The Matadors frame of mind is centered on one thing as they enter the new season; to win district and move on to state playoffs. But before they can do that they will have to get by powerful Valley in District 2-A (East). Valley is ranked fourth in state.

Then in 2-A (West) Sudan, Amherst and Anton are all in the top ten in the state. Motley County will face Sudan on September 25 and probably again in bi-district playoff action should the Matadors get by Valley.

Griffin will test his slot-I formation next Friday (Aug. 21) in a scrimmage here against Smyer. The Matadors will scrimmage Jayton there the following Friday (Aug. 28).

The first regular season game will be here against Paducah.

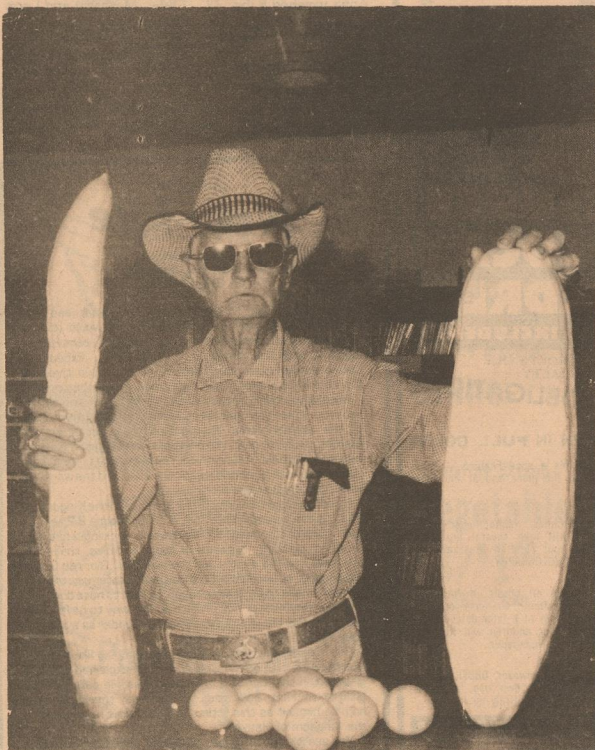

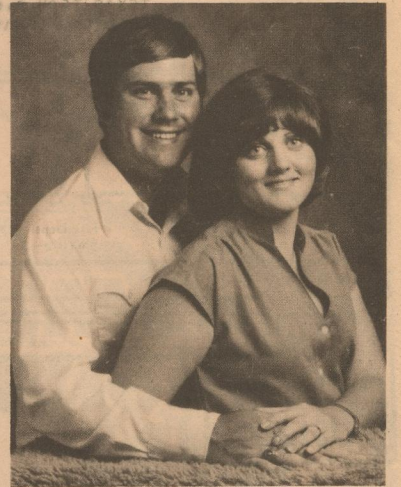

Floyd County Fair Parade To Be Held September 12

Annual Floyd and Surrounding Counties Fair Parade will be held Saturday, Sept. 12 at 10:30 a.m. That is a departure from past years when the parade was held on fair opening day.

Theme is "Autumn—the best time of the year". Floats will be judged on adherence to the theme, attractiveness and originality. Prize money will be awarded in three divisions, commercial, community clubs, school and youth groups. First place in each division will receive \$35; second place, \$25, and

third place, \$15. Partial judging will be done prior to the parade so floats should be in line on Saturday by 10 a.m. Trophies will be awarded for antique cars and for riding clubs. The riding clubs will be judged on a point system used by the American Association of Sheriff's Poses and Riding Clubs.

Ribbons will be presented for first, second and third places in the bicycle-riding category. Also to be judged this year are clown costumes. Bicycle riders and clowns will be divided into two groups, kindergarten through second grade and third grade through fifth grade.

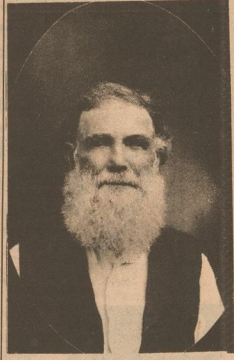
Letter To The Editor

Selective Service Signups Continue

Young men who reach their eighteenth birthday are required by law to register with Selective Service at any U.S. Post Office.

Registration is a simple process. Within 30 days of his 18th birthday, a man fills out a registration form which asks only for name, address, phone number, social security number and date of birth.

The purpose of registration is to have available on a computer the names of men born in 1960 and later years, who could be contacted quickly if there ever were a national emergency and Congress were to declare an induction.

Peace-time registration will save the United States at least four weeks time in mobilizing its manpower in an emergency. This is especially important with today's all volunteer force. There are only 2 million

men in the armed services today, but we would need many more men quickly should an emergency arise. For example, in World War II we had 10 to 16 million men bearing arms depending upon the stage of the conflict.

Registration and revitalization of the Selective Service do not signal a return to a draft. They are simply emergency preparedness measures. President Reagan is firmly committed to making the all volunteer force a success, supporting incentives to recruit and retain volunteers.

To date, nearly 6 million men have registered. Failure to register is a felony, punishable by a maximum penalty of a \$10,000 fine and/or five years in prison.

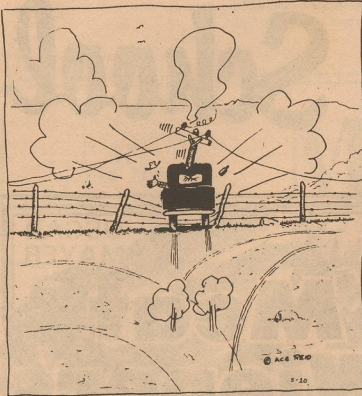

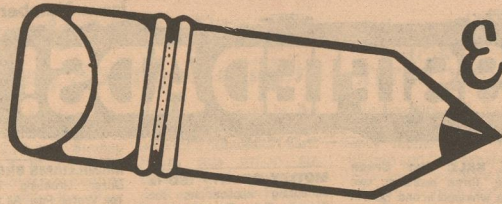
