Matadors Outstanding Against Rochester

Tim Shannon scored 18 points Friday night to lead the Motley County Matadors to a 49-0 thrashing of Rochester. The Matadors are now 2-0

for the season. Harvey Lee scored 12 points, while Darrell Moore and Jerry Long scored one touchdown each. Glen Calvert kicked

seven of seven extra points to round out the Matadors scoring.

The Matadors dominated the game, rolling up 317 yards rushing and 79 yards passing on two completions.

Lee carried the ball only two times in the game but led the team in rushing with 79 yards. Clayton Sims carried 11 times for 74 yards. Shannon ground out 50 yards on seven carries, while Darrell Moore went 49 yards on four carries. Coke Barton carried nine times for 47 yards and Shawn Bearden when 15 yards on one carry. Brent Campbell carried three times for three yards.

Lee and Long each had one interception, Long returning his for a touchdown.

Rob Francis, Kyle Hardin and Calvert each recovered a Rochester fumble, and Todd Wash-

ington, Roy Thompson and Thomas Garst joined Barton, Calvert, Lee and Hardin, on defense in sacking the Rochester quarterback for minus yardage.

Other players who were outstanding on defense were Wesley Stafford, Joe Zarate, Craig Turner, Scott Read, Alex Guerrero and John Meador.

On offense Shannon caught one pass for 70 yards and Washington caught one for 9. Bearden and Campbell each completed one of two passes they threw.

Rochester players had 34 total carries for minus 26 yards, completed three of 14 passes for 19 yards for a total of minus seven yards.

The Motley County Matadors will go against the Spur Bulldogs at Spur Friday night beginning at 8:00 p.m.

Pickup Burns Near Matador

A Lubbock man was arrested near Matador Friday and charged with drunkenness after his pickup was discovered burning in a pasture south of town.

Robert Bogan, 55, was picked up by DPS Trooper Dude Speed, Sheriff Alton Marshall and Deputy Clyde Clifton at about 5:30 p.m. near the scene about 2 1/2 miles south of town, in Charlie Keith's pasture.

Matador firemen received the call that a vehicle was on fire at about 4:10 and believed the pickup had been burning about 50 minutes. The 1976 Dodge pickup had been stuck in deep sand two miles east of J. D. Spray's house, and Marshall theorized that Bogan became stuck, spun the tires until the vehicle caught on fire.

"Bogan's drivers license had been taken away from him in August for drunk driving," Marshall said. "We guessed he was driving from Floydada to Matador and saw Dude (Trooper Speed) on patrol. We think he got scared because he was driving while intoxicated, and turned south to get around town."

Bogan, who gave lawmen several stories as

to how he got in the pasture, including one version that he was kidnapped, couldn't remember how the pickup fire started.

Marshall said a cattle guard and several rope gates were damaged when Bogan entered the pasture. The Sheriff said Bogan had to pay Charlie Keith approximately \$200 in damages on the cattle guard and about \$25 for rope.

Bogan was on his way to Oklahoma to visit his grandchildren. The pickup, Bogan's belongings and presents for the grandchildren were all destroyed in the fire.

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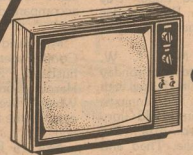

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of a residence homestead. The portion exempted may be as much as 40% for 1982-1984; 30% for 1985-1987; and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislation by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other applicable exemptions provided by law. An exception is made where a mill valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire state bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250,000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of additional bonds to finance the veterans' land program and to increase the maximum interest rate allowable on veterans' land fund bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 provides a constitutional amendment that would allow that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 3, 1981

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its development. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the improvement, development, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to

resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date of the amendment. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

House Joint Resolution 38 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

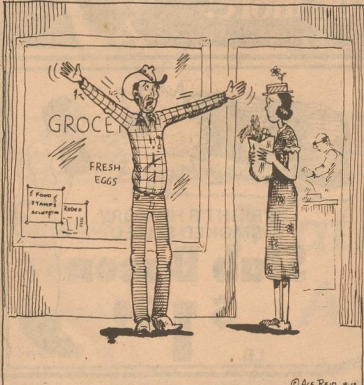

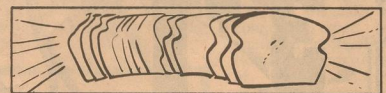
