## Volunteer Fire Dept. To Host Fish Fry and Fireworks

The Matador Volunteer Fire Department will be host to a combination fish fry and fireworks display Saturday night, July 4.

The activities will begin with the fish fry at 8:00 p.m. on the football field. Tickets for the festivities are on sale now and can be

obtained from any department member, or at the gate on Saturday.

The prices of the tickets are \$3.50 for adults and \$1.50 for pre-school children; and this covers the price of the meal which includes fish, french fries, cole slaw, bread and cold

drinks and the fireworks show.

The fireworks will be set off by department members after the fish fry.

Proceeds from this benefit will go toward the building of a new fire station. The location of the new fire station will be

on the vacant lot north of Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Company and members have begun work by clearing the lot.

Everyone is urged to come out Saturday night and have a good time and help support the fire department.

## Safe Driving Habits Urged For July 4th

The Department of Public Safety has estimated that as many as 44 persons may die in Texas traffic accidents during the upcoming July 4th weekend unless drivers exercise extreme caution.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS Director, urged motorists to maintain safe driving habits during the holiday to help minimize the loss of life.

"Texas is well on its way to yet another record year for traffic fatalities," Adams said. "We can put a stop to this dangerous trend if more motorists will slow down, refrain from drinking and use the most readily-available safety precaution—seat belts."

"In Texas, the chances of being killed in an accident during 1980 were four times greater for persons not wearing seat belts than for those wearing the belts," Adams pointed out. "The odds are clearly in the motorist's favor when everyone in the

vehicle remembers to buckle up."

Adams said DPS Regional Commanders will deploy additional troopers where heavy volumes of traffic are expected.

The DPS will be conducting "Operation Motorcade" during the holiday period to call attention to the dangers of holiday driving. The Department will tabulate traffic fatalities and release totals three times daily at 10 a.m., 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. The first report will be made at 10 a.m. Friday, July 3.

The 78-hour counting period will begin Thursday, July 2, at 6 p.m. and continue until midnight, July 5.

Fifty-two persons died from traffic injuries received during the July 4th holiday period last year. Texas traffic deaths in 1980 totaled 4,424, a record high for the fourth consecutive year.

## Library Is Accepted As West Texas Member

Motley County Library has been accepted by the Texas State Library Commission as a provisional member of the West Texas Library System, and has three years to meet the requirement of having 7,500 materials in its collection to become an accredited member.

Motley County Commissioners Court also passed a resolution in a special session on June 15 to accept our library's designation as a community library member of the WTLS.

System membership will provide us with many additional services and resources offered by the West Texas Library System headquartered in Lubbock's Mahon library. The System will receive state and federal funds which will provide for such projects as collection development, access to a 16mm film library, and continuing education and consulting services for staffs of member libraries.

Also, system membership insures that our library will participate in the planning of future services and programs for the system. Each year our

County Commissioners Court will appoint a lay delegate to represent Motley County Library at a meeting of citizen representatives from all system libraries.

System membership should augment the services and resources that Motley County Library will offer the community. It does not jeopardize our library's local autonomy; it is a means by which Motley County citizens can benefit from many additional services and materials.

## State 4-H Horse Show Set For Waco

The Texas 4-H Horse Show, one of the world's largest and most competitive youth horse shows, will be held at the Heart of Texas Coliseum in Waco July 13-18.

The annual show is the premier event for almost 12,000 4-H members across the state who raise and show horses as their 4-H project.

Princess Skaggs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Skaggs, will represent Motley County at the State Horse Show. Princess qualified to attend by placing 4th in pole bending at the District Horse Show held last week in Vernon.

More than 300 young men and women will qualify for this grandest of 4-H horse shows and the opportunity to vie for a coveted state championship. In addition some 400 youth will participate in open show competition.

4-H'ers from across Texas will compete in 28 different classes and divisions during the six-day event.

Actual competition will begin on Tuesday, July 14,

with all roping events, hunter under saddle, cutting and the first go-round of all futurities.

Roping events include calf roping, a judged event; breakaway roping, a timed event; and team roping, a new event in the 1981 show. Fast-paced action continues throughout the day and into the night as 4-H'ers compete to make the finals in the futurity classes.

Friday night is the payoff time for many 4-H members; that's when the annual 4-H futurity sale is held. Some of the best western and two-year-old western pleasure horses available in Texas will be auctioned to the highest bidder.

These horses, selected, purchased and trained by 4-H members, are excellent buys for ranchers, horse producers and pleasure riders.

The sale is open to any qualified buyer, and the entire show, from Tuesday's opening to Saturday's finals, is open to the public.

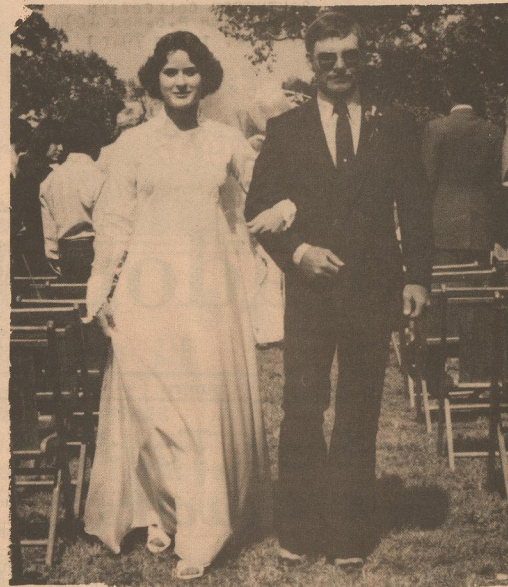

### STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

The new rate schedule will increase the Company's gross annual revenue derived from local service by no more than three percent. ## Dr. Pascal Fish Dies In Electra

Dr. Pascal Ennis Fish, 78, of Electra, died June 24, in a Wichita Falls hospital. A native of Matador, Dr. Fish was a son of pioneers of Motley and Floyd counties, the late Mr. and Mrs. I.F. Fish. The Fish ranch bordered both counties.

Services for Dr. Fish were conducted at 2 p.m. Saturday, June 27, at the First Baptist Church in Electra. Officiating were Rev. Joe Ainsworth, pastor, and Rev. William G. Etheredge of Wichita Falls. Burial was in Electra Memorial Park under direction of James B. Totten and Son Funeral Home.

Born June 4, 1903, in Matador, Dr. Fish graduated from Southwestern Military School of Dallas in 1920. He attended the University of Texas at Austin, Southern Methodist University and University of Minnesota. He graduated from University of Texas Medical School at Galveston, in 1926. He married Ava Elizabeth

Shaw on October 1, 1931, in Electra.

He was a member of First Baptist Church, Electra, Wichita Falls Medical Society, Texas Medical Association, American Medical Society, Delta Sigma Phi fraternity at University of Texas, and Alpha Kappa Kappa at University of Texas Medical School.

Dr. Fish built Electra Medical Clinic in 1940, and was Chief of Staff at Electra Memorial Hospital. He was a member and past president of Electra Lions Club, a member and past president of the Electra school board, and served on the board of directors of the Electra Chamber of Commerce and the Electra Library, as well as other civic and community organizations.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Francine Rowe of Electra and Suzanne Kinnebrew of Naperville, Ill.; a brother, Homer B. Fish of Fort Worth; a sister, Allie F. Nelson of Fife; and five grandchildren.

Bible study for the June 23 meeting was given by Mrs. Garrison. The lesson was an outline of the book of Romans.

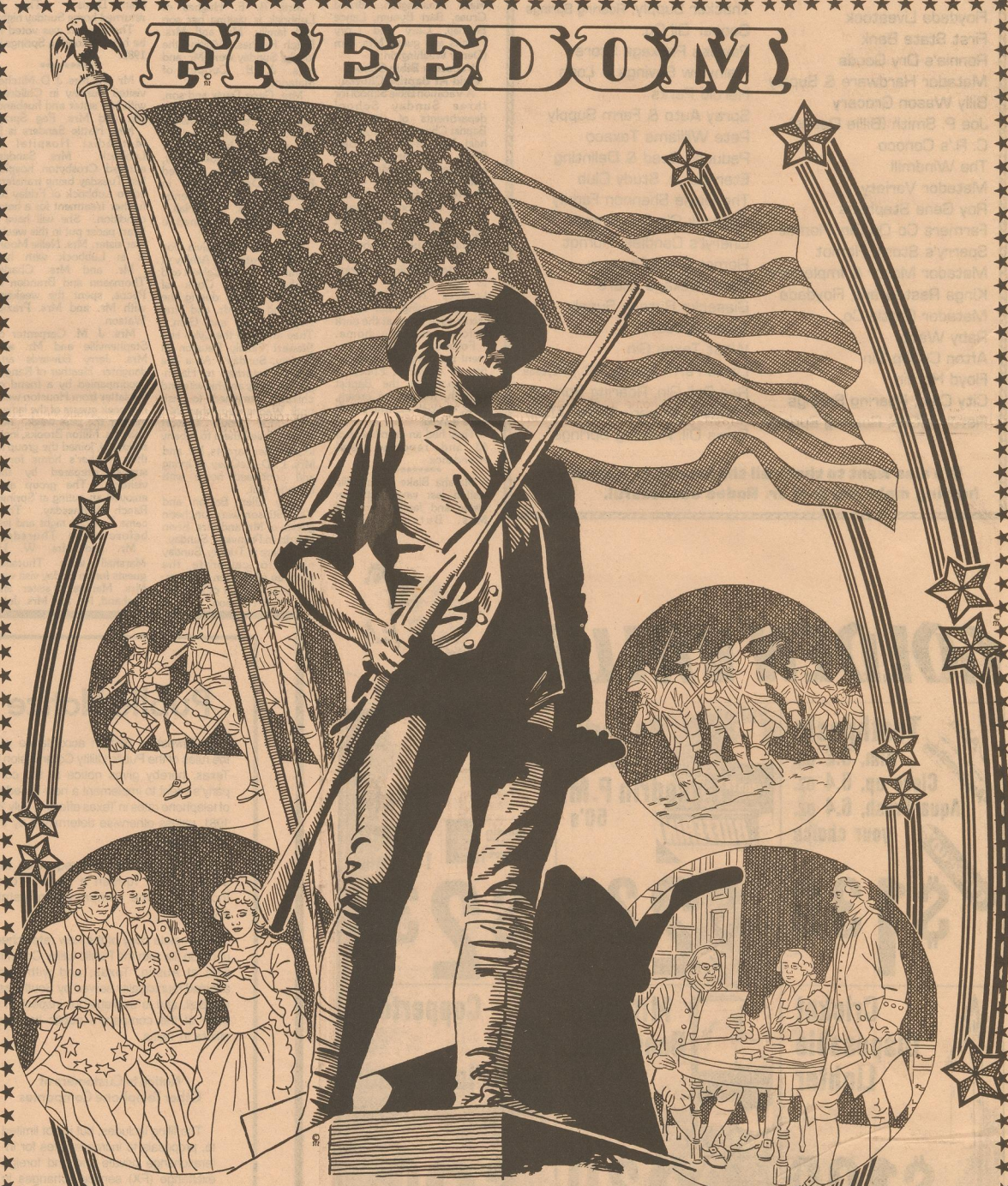
