Moisture Here Near 2 Inches

WINTER returned for an encore in West Texas early this week after a month of spring-like temperatures. Ahead of the back-hand slap of cold weather was the all-important soaking rains that brought moisture to the entire county.

The slow rainfall started here about 8 p.m. Thursday, continued through the night and until late Friday. The moisture registered in Matador by Bob Stanley was 1.74 inches. Some points in the county reported more but it is believed the average in the area was between 1.50 and 2 inches.

The badly-needed rains did not cover the entire Panhandle and South Plains, but some points reported much heavier precipitation. Amarillo, however, on the north boundary of the rains received only 1.7-inch. Paducah reported in the neighborhood of three inches.

A thunder storm east of here about midnight Thursday interrupted power service for about six minutes. Freddie Welling, local manager for the West Texas Utilities Co., said there was a break in the lines between Paducah and Crowell.

Cold weather moved into the Panhandle Monday afternoon and dropped the mercury rapidly. The thermometer registered close to freezing most of the day Tuesday and dropped a little lower Tuesday night.

Light snow began falling yesterday morning and had covered the ground by noon.

Some observers believed most of the fruit crop would be lost before the cold weather passes, since almost all fruit trees were in full bloom.

The value of the unusual March moisture, on the other hand, will far offset the value of whatever damage may result to fruit. Wheat, rye and other pasturage has been greatly benefitted as has the general farming and ranching outlook. Snow moisture 15 in.
