"... to Timothy, my true child in the faith" 1 Tim. 1:1. " . to Philemon 1:1. "... to the Philemon 1:1. " James 1:1 to Philemon our beloved brother and fellow-worker 1:2. " . to the twelve tribes who are dispersed abroad .

From the book of Romans to the book of Jude, we have with us today these inspired letters which tell us what to believe, how and what to teach, how to worship God in this era, how to organize converts into a church, how to convert all races and creeds, to Christ, and tells us ALL the good works which God has asked His people to do. These letters give detailed instructions on "living the life of a Christian." Christ came into a world dominated by pagan religions. There is a great difference between living as a pagan and living a life edicated to Christ. These twenty-one letters were written by five men of God: Paul, Peter, James, John, and Jude.
