Hightower Featured Speaker At Annual Homecoming

"We can't afford to cut down on taxes, unless we cut down on spending," Congressman Jack Hightower of Vernon, told homecoming ex-students and teachers Saturday,

during a speech at the association's annual school reunion.

Introduced by Roger Vinson, president of the association, the U.S. Representative from the 13th district of Texas was

guest speaker during an afternoon program and business meeting. He talked about the economy of the nation, but declared, "There's no way some of the problems can be solved except by the government. This is what we have to say when our constituents write and express displeasure with the way things are being done."

Some letters his office receives simply state that they don't want the government involved in various aspects of national economy. "Some of the letters," he said, "Say simply, 'I know you won't answer each and every letter which I receive. Many people are in favor of cutting down on expenses, but no one wants Social Security included in these cuts.'"

Congressman Hightower is on the appropriations committee, occupying the place formerly held by Congressman George Mahon.

"There are so many services that need money, but there are also some that are not needed. We need to keep the agricultural program going, as it is most vital to our economy. We also need to support the military program. It is vital to our defense. It will not be easy to fight inflation, so long as we have high interest rates. Keep your letters coming, and we will keep trying in

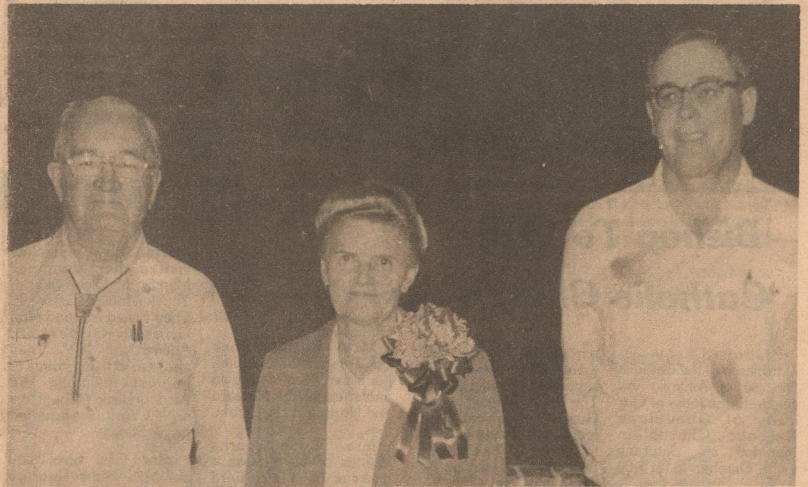
Washington. The task of appropriating funds and appeasing our constituents just isn't that easy." He was accorded a standing ovation at the conclusion.

Matadors Beat Claude 21 - 15

The Motley County Matadors managed to hold off the Claude Mustangs long enough to be saved by the final buzzer Friday night before a Homecoming crowd as they won their fifth straight football game this year, 21-15.

Claude had driven to the one yard line and had 36 seconds left in the game. But three plays later Claude still had not crossed the goal line and

time had expired. Claude scored first after MCHS received the opening kickoff, then fumbled on the second play on their own 35 yard line. Claude was helped by two penalties to move to the MC seven, then scored with 7:52 left in the first quarter. The point after touchdown (PAT) made the score 7-0.

MC received again and Clayton Sims ran it back to

mid-field. Eleven plays later Jerry Long completed a pass in the endzone for a TD. The try for PAT was a fake kick and Brent Campbell passed to Shawn Bearden for two points, with 3:44 left in the first quarter MC led 8-7.

Claude received and drove from their own 27 to the MC 35. Then Bearden intercepted a Mustang pass and ran it back all the way. However a clipping

penalty called the TD back. Six plays later Tim Shannon ran 31 yards for another TD and Glen Calvert's PAT made the score 15-7.

Both sides exchanged punts during the third quarter until the final minute. Claude capped an 11 play drive with a two yard TD then ran the PAT for two points to tie the game 15-15.

Sims ran the next

quarterback for minus nine yards, back to the 14, and then with two seconds Claude completed a pass to the six yard line. That was all the time Claude had. MC walked away victorious.

This week the Matadors will host Silverton here in the first district game. Play will start at 7:30 p.m. at Burleson Field.

With 36 seconds left in the game Claude moved from the MC 48 to the one yard line on a long pass play. With first and goal-to-go they tried to run but lost four yards. With 10 seconds left MC defenders sacked the Claude


Vegetable Rice Salad
2 packages (1-3/8 ounces each) sour cream sauce mix
1 cup milk
3 cups cooked rice
1/4 cup minced green pepper
1/4 teaspoon salt
6 lettuce cups
1 cup diced pickled beets
2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped

Blend sour cream sauce mix with milk to a smooth sauce. Add rice, green pepper, and salt. Spoon onto lettuce leaves and top with beets and eggs. Makes 6 servings.

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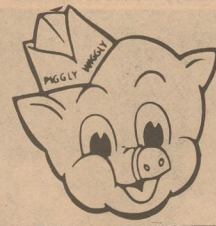

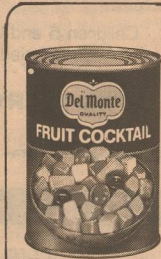

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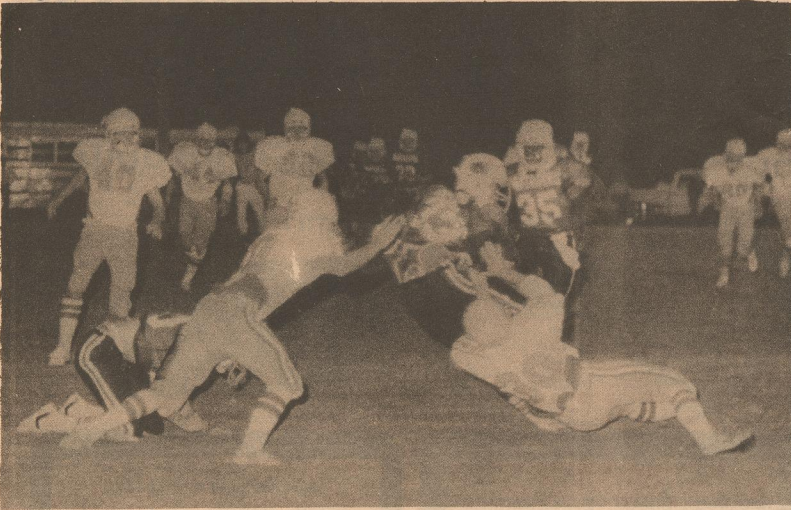

HI, MOM: GREETINGS FROM SPACE VIA S-BAND

Astronauts aboard future Space Shuttle flights, like camera-conscious running backs on Monday night football, can say "Hi, Mom" or anything else via a versatile new communications system developed by TRW Inc.

The S-Band Communications System will furnish primary voice, television, and computer data communications from ground tracking stations throughout the flights, from liftoff to reentry.

Unlike communications systems made for the Mercury, Gemini, or Apollo spacecraft, the S-Band is designed to be reusable, just as the Space Shuttle is. With proper maintenance, the system will function for at least 12 years, and will add to the cost-effectiveness of the Space Shuttle program.

While there is no 55 mile per hour speed limit in space, the S-Band system will tell both the astronauts and the ground controllers the exact speed of the Space Shuttle. It's more than a speedometer, though: it provides exact altitude and direction information, too.

Eventually, communications to and from the Shuttle will not be routed through the ground stations; instead they will be handled by communications satellites, called Tracking and Data Relay Satellite System (TDRSS) satellites. TRW is building six TDRSS satellites, the largest yet developed. The satellites will be in geosynchronous orbit, that is, they will circle the Earth precisely once every 24 hours so that they re-pulses, which will be compared, in effect, over one vertex to ordinary TV pictures of the globe.

The S-Band system is in essence many radios have the urge to say "Hi, Mom" during their flights, blended into a very complex transmission system. For example, the television pictures from the Space Shuttle will be transmitted back to Earth as a series of digital greeting.
