

UIL Changes MCHS District Alignment

Motley County will move from District 2-1A to District 3-1A for the 1982-83 and 1983-84 school years due to district realignment by the University Interscholastic League (UIL).

Motley County's district foes next year will be Aspermont, Chillicothe, Crowell, Jayton, Knox City, Rule and Throckmorton.

District 2-1A expanded from 12 to 16 teams with the addition of five new schools and the loss of one. Motley County will move into District 3-1A while Vega and Ropes drop one classification

from Class 2A and New Home, Meadow and Wilson move over from District 3-1A. They will join Silvertown, Lazbuddie, Nazareth, Amherst, Anton, Smyer, Sudan, Sundown, Valley, Whiteface and Happy in District 2-1A.

There were no changes in District 1-A six-man. In other changes involving area districts, Class 3A had the most alterations.

In District 2-3A, Abernathy and Tulia have moved over from District 3-3A to join Littlefield, Muleshoe, Friona and

Dimmitt while Olton dropped a classification and is now in District 3-2A. Post and Slaton have been added to District 3-3A where they will join Childress, Floydada, Lockney and Idalou. In Class 2A, Olton joins Kress, Hart, Bovina, Springlake-Earth and Farwell in District 3-2A with current member Vega dropping to Class 1A.

There were no new additions to District 4-2A, but New Deal and Shallowater were both removed and put in District 5-2A. The loop will now have just Hale Center, Petersburg, Crosbyton, Lorenzo, Ralls and Spur.

The UIL dropped Pampa High School one division into Class 4A and merged District 3-5A and

4-5A into one nine-school district.

The new alignment for the Panhandle-South Plains 5A schools, District 3-5A, will include Plainview, Hereford, Lubbock, Monterey, Coronado, Palo Duro, Caprock, Tascosa and Amarillo.

West Texas Utilities Files For Change In Rates

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a change in wholesale rates for electric service it supplies to 14 rural electric cooperatives, one municipality and one investor-owned distribution company.

In its filing Friday, October 16, with the Federal Energy Regulatory

Commission in Washington, WTU estimated that the new rates will produce about \$4.3 million in additional revenue for the company during the 1982 calendar year. This amounts to an increase of approximately 10 per cent from these wholesale customers.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective on December 15. The present rates have been in effect since June, 1980. WTU also proposes to change to a fuel adjustment clause similar to the one applied to its retail customers. No other major changes were proposed.

WTU officials said the rate change is necessary to bring the Company's earnings on sales to wholesale customers to a level that will help WTU maintain a sound financial condition and attract new capital for growth required to meet future needs of electric customers. The previous wholesale rate increase proved insufficient because of inflation, higher than anticipated interest rates, and the delay in making the rates effective.

(which supplies Southwest Rural Electric Association—, Brazos Electric Power Cooperative, Inc. (which supplies B-K Electric Cooperative, Inc., Comanche County Electric Cooperative, Inc. and Ft. Belknap Electric Cooperative, Inc.), City of Sonora and Texas-New Mexico Power Company.

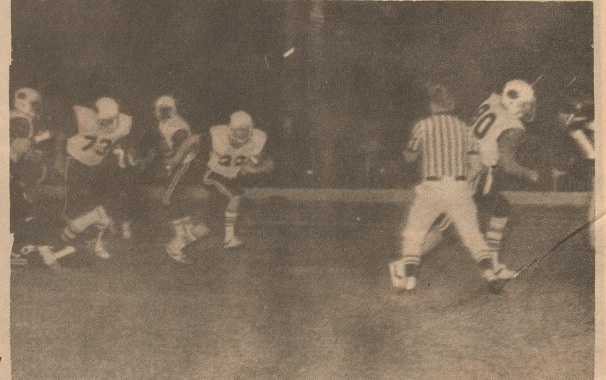
Campbell Receives Promotion

Matadors Are 9-0 After Happy Win

The Motley County Matadors pushed their district record to 4-0 last Friday as they took a 29-12 victory over the Happy Cowboys. The Matadors are now 9-0 for the season, with the tough Valley Patriots coming to town this week for the final district game.

Valley has a 3-1 district record and are 6-2-1 for the season. The Patriots hope to upset the number one ranked Matadors to tie them for the district 2-A North crown.

"The boys played extremely well last Friday to beat Happy," Coach Gene Griffin said. "It possibly was our best effort of the season. We have to have that same kind of effort to beat Valley."

Last week Valley was upset by Nazareth 22-0, a team which the Matadors have beaten. But the Patriots always play Motley County tough.

"We will have to play well, and we need a lot of fan support to win."

Happy received the opening kickoff last week but failed to move the ball. For the second week in a row MCHS blocked a punt, and the Matadors took over on the Cowboy three yard line. One play later Tim Shannon ran in standing up for six points. Glen Calvert kicked the PAT and with 10:18 left in the first quarter MC led 7-0.

Again Happy failed to move and punted on fourth down. The Matadors took over on their own 24 and then drove 76 yards in 17 plays to score. The TD came when quarterback Shawn Bearden went over from the three yard line. With 1:25 left in the first quarter MC led 14-0, following another kick by Calvert.

Happy was stopped again and punted for the third straight time.

Bearden hit Jerry Long with a 33 yard pass to the Happy 32. Then Darrell Moore ran 32 yards for another score. MC led 20-0 with 11:32 left in the first half after the PAT failed.

For the fourth time MC stopped Happy and the Cowboys punted. MC drove down to the 11 and Calvert booted a field goal with 3:35 left. At the end of the first half MC led 23-0.

MC had scored one other TD in the second quarter but it was called back because of a penalty. Then just before halftime Calvert tried a field goal and the ball hit the cross bar and bounced back.

In the third quarter Long intercepted a Happy pass on the Cowboy 49 but a series of penalties prevented the Matadors from moving. Long then punted the ball out of bounds on the Happy 10 yard line.

Happy was held on their own 30 and the ball went **See Matadors Page 6**

GTE Changes Local Policy

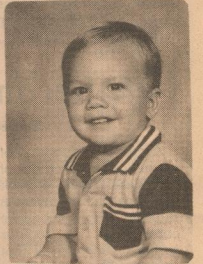

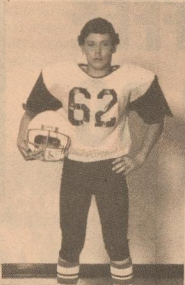

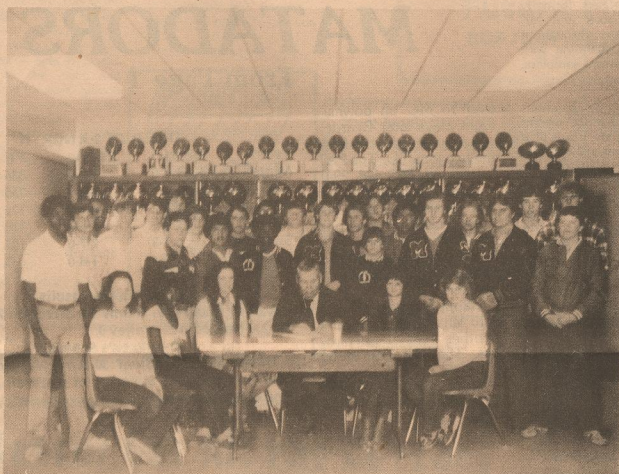

Some highlights from the life and the presidential term of President Lyndon Baines Johnson, the only United States President from Texas, provided Mrs. J. E. Edwards with some most interesting program material which she presented Thursday, Oct. 22, to members of El Progreso Club.

Club president, Mrs. Furman Vinson, presided, and Mrs. Ted Elliott was hostess for the meeting in the Community Room of Plainview Savings and Loan. Mrs. Vinson also served as leader of the program on "Americanism."

Business included a report by Mrs. Harold Campbell, President of Santa Rosa District, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, on the fall board meeting, Oct. 17, in Quanah, which she and Mrs. L. B. Campbell attended.

"How do I begin to discuss Texas' only contribution to the presidency of the United States?" Mrs. Edwards said as she introduced her subject. "Here is a man who is at once admired, maligned, idolized, criticized, loved, hated, ruthless, compassionate -- and much more." And she continued a research with an objective viewpoint without, as she said, "getting into politically controversial matters," as she traced his career from 1931 when he went to Washington as a secretary to Texas Congressman Richard M. Kleberg, through his steady climb up the political ladder from December of that year, to the memorable date of Nov. 22, 1963 when he was sworn in as the 36th President of the United States.

Mrs. Edwards continued with a summary of events during his term and re-election to office, until 1968 when he announced he would not seek the nomination for another term as president. Her

concluding remarks were from Lady Bird Johnson's description of homecoming back to Texas Jan. 20, 1969 (from her White House Diary) quoting from a poem, India's Love Lyrics: "I seek, to celebrate my glad release, the Tents of silence and the Camp of Peace."

In her report of the fall board meeting, Mrs. Campbell said 52 women registered and described the meeting as enjoyable with good fellowship and delicious luncheon prepared by two Quanah clubs: 1904 Club and the Century Study Club. Mrs. B. M. Sims of Wellington, President of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs was guest speaker at the luncheon. Mrs. Ervin Soell of Iowa Park displayed the cook book compiled by the Santa Rosa District club women, and Mrs. Campbell brought a number of the books back to Matador for the local club members. The cook book is a money making project for the district.

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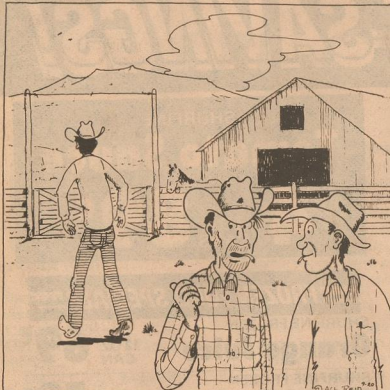
