

Early Day Oil Well Brings Wealth To County

The summer of 1918, was a long hot dry one. Henry Hobbs, who was running cattle on his father's ranch west of Matador, together with W. Oscar Williams, decided to go to Burkburnett, Texas, soon after the Fowler well had come in as a good producer in or near the edge of Burkburnett, and had caused much excitement in that part of the country. They went to Burkburnett, on the chance of running on to something, as they had everything to gain and

nothing to lose. During the summer and fall of 1918, they checked around in the region near Burkburnett, and formed the opinion that the field was spreading toward the North West. Around the first of November of 1918, they found a one hundred sixty acres, at a price of twenty thousand dollars. Going to the First National Bank, to borrow that amount, Mr. C. E. McCutchen, who was a vice president of the bank, and who before

becoming associated with that bank had been a State Bank Examiner. He from that position was fairly well familiar with the men of Motley County. Mr. McCutchen made a list of eleven men of Motley County, and told Hobbs and Williams, if they could get those eleven men to sign the note, he would let them have the \$20,000.00 dollars. It was during a very unusually cold spell of weather that Mr. Hobbs came to Matador, to try to secure the names on the note. He was

successful in getting the signatures of the following men on the note: A. B. Echols, F. C. Bourland, I. F. Fish, A. D. Beauchamp, W. R. Derrickson, Jack Luckett, T. G. Duncan, W. A. (Raldo) Newman, J. R. Moore, Henry Hobbs, and W. Oscar Williams. The note was for 30 days. Returning to Wichita Falls, just prior to the expiration of the option, he was able to secure the \$20,000.00 necessary to purchase the lease on the 160 acres of land. Before

the note came due, they had sold one forty acre tract for a sufficient amount to take up the note with several thousand dollars to spare. At this point, it was decided to organize an oil company on twenty five acres of one of the fourth acre tracts. The Texas Chief Oil Company with a capitalization of \$80,000.00 was organized, and agents sent to various parts of the country to sell stock. The stock was a par of ten See Oil Well Page 2

New Farm Road Construction Is Planned

Bids to construct a new farm-to-market road near Matador were scheduled to be received January 12 by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Childress District Engineer Lewis White said the new road, FM 1380, will be built from FM 94, two miles east of Matador, southward 2.1 miles.

FM 1380 will follow the route of an existing county road and will provide a safer, more efficient and more economical connecting link between US 70 and FM 94. The new highway will serve local traffic, school buses, emergency vehicles and transporters of agricultural produce.

Included in the project is construction of a bridge-class culvert across Ballard Creek.

DHT's engineer supervising the work is James G. Freeman of Childress. Construction, once under way, is expected to take 120 working days to complete.

"I have tried to serve the people in this precinct to the best of my ability and will continue to work for the best interests of all people in this precinct and Motley County if I am elected," he said.

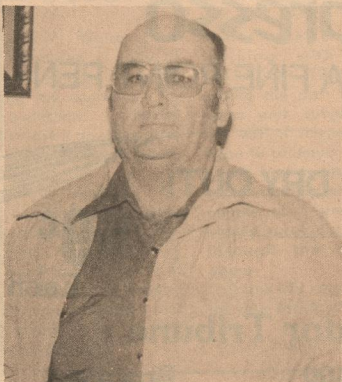
"I appreciate all votes and influence in my behalf."

dollars. Some of the stock was sold in Motley County, to other parties than the eleven men who had signed the note. As appreciation for the use of their credit, each of the signers of the note was given fifteen shares of the Texas Chief stock. He also had an interest in the other activities surrounding the rest of the land. Two 50-50 drilling contracts were let on two forty acre tracts, and the drilling of the Texas Chief well began. In the latter part of the fall of 1918, the Burk Waggoner well near the property of the Texas Chief, had come in flowing ten or fifteen thousand barrels of oil a day.

The Texas Chief Oil well came in on the 25th day of May, 1919, was a good well, flowing more than two thousand barrels of oil per day, but pipe line facilities were not able to take the full production of the well, and for some time it was prorated in its production.

The Texas Chief Oil Company paid several dividends of approximately 500% before it was decided to sell that, and the other properties on which several producing wells had come in. Mr. Hobbs made a trip to New

York, and made a sale of the total remaining property, including the Texas Chief, this sale was to be based upon being able to make so many barrels of production per day. A test was run during the Christmas holidays, and the first few days of 1920, with the result that the Texas Chief property was sold at a price of ten dollars for every dollar invested. This in addition to the dividends that had been paid prior to the sale. Each of the signers of the original note,

had an interest in the total sale price, and to each full unit, was paid over the period of a year, or little more, something over \$100,000.00

The sale of the Texas Chief Oil Company and the other properties, were to Ex Governor Haskell of Oklahoma,

who had gone to New York after his term as Governor of Oklahoma. He engaged extensively in the oil business in New York.

F. C. Bourland is the only survivor of the original owners. He now resides at 5502 4th Street, Lubbock, Texas 79416. He is 92 years old.

Farabee Seeks Re-Election

State Senator Ray Farabee announced his candidacy recently for re-election to the Texas Senate representing the 30th District. The 30th Senatorial District will cover a twenty-nine county area, plus part of Denton County, in North Central and Northwest Texas, if the proposed redistricting plan is approved. This will include Motley

County. Farabee, who is 49 and a Democrat was elected to the State Senate in 1974 and is now completing his second term of office.

Senator Farabee has served for 6 years on the Legislative Budget Board which has primary responsibility for preparation of the State Budget. He was appointed by Governor Clements to the Texas

2000 Commission where he serves as Chairman of the Agriculture Committee. He was appointed by Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby to the Select Committee on Public Education and was recently appointed to the Finance Subcommittee of the Water Task Force.

Over the past seven years, Senator Farabee has sponsored legislation to benefit this area as well as the entire State. As a result of his legislation, broad and significant changes can be expected in areas of taxation, education, and criminal justice:

Taxpayers will save \$18 million in 1982 because of the repeal of the state inheritance tax.

Taxpayers will save \$8 million in 1982 because of the exclusion of livestock and poultry from property taxes.

Small investors will save at least \$4 million annually through the prevention of fraud in

the sale of business opportunities.

Prospective public school teachers will have to pass a standardized test demonstrating their competency in basic subject areas, such as English and Math.

Retired teachers will be better able to keep up with inflation due to increased benefits ranging from 7% to 21%, depending on the date of retirement.

Street traffic in prescription-type drugs will be reduced as much as 40% because of stricter record keeping requirements on prescription drug dispensing.

Convicted major drug dealers will serve a minimum of 10 years in prison and will forfeit to the state all property purchased with illegal drug profits.

The backlog in handling criminal appeals after trial, currently 4 years, will be reduced by at least 50% because 14 courts are now able to hear criminal appeals instead of just one.

In October Motley County received a direct benefit from Farabee's lateral road fund bill in the amount of \$41,113.44.

"Texas is on the right track and we want to keep it there," Farabee said. "As Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, I will work to maintain the healthy economy in Texas and provide solutions to the problems which will be facing us in the 1980's. I would like to continue my public service for the 30th District and the people of Motley County to deal with these challenges."

Farabee has been cited twice by TEXAS MONTHLY as one of the top ten legislators in Texas.

County Agent Explains

Control Of Boll Weevil

Lions and their guests learned all about boll weevil and boll worm control from County Agent Lion Jerry Cummins, last Tuesday, at the first monthly meeting of Matador Lions Club.

The traps used in determining the habits and peak periods most destructive agents of a cotton crop were displayed by Lion Cummins as he described the methods of catching the weevil and moths in the spring and in the fall.

"The traps are set around the first of May through June. The catch doesn't reflect the number of weevil in the field, but the peak period for worms. Basically, what these traps do is make it possible to determine the pheromone of the insects," Lion Cummins explained. He also told how to distinguish between the male and female moths.

Several meetings of interest to cotton growers are scheduled

in Matador, Crosbyton and other area towns, Cummins announced.

Lion Alan Bingham, president, reported action of the directors Monday, December 28th and announced the winners in the Lions Christmas lighting contest, also the date, February 25, of the Father-Son banquet. Lion Larry Hoyle reported that contributions to the Community Chest are about \$50.00 short of last year's donations, and that expenditures last year exceeded the amount of contributions.

Area Cities Receive Checks From State Comptroller

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$41.4 million to 802 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for December.

This final payment for 1981 brought to \$656 million the total collected and returned to Texas cities during 1981. Bullock said this total is more than 17 percent over last year's \$560 million.

The December months payment is \$7.9 million more than the cities received during a comparable period in 1980.

Matador's payment for December was \$641.63 bringing the 1981 payments to date to \$17,807.17, a 10.77 per cent increase over 1980.

Roaring Springs received \$7,739.52 for 1981, a 21.02 per cent increase over 1980.

Paducah received a total of \$53,838.15 for 1981. Quitaque's payments were \$13,095.85, Turkey received \$10,955.74, Floydada got \$91,980.75, Spur received \$37,793.17 and Dickens received \$17,008.89.

Yearly totals in Texas metropolitan cities include Houston, \$137 million; Dallas, \$72.4 million; San Antonio, \$35.2 million; Fort Worth, \$24 million; Austin, \$21.3 million; El Paso, \$16 million and Corpus Christi, \$14.8 million.

Metropolitan Transit Authorities in Houston and San Antonio also received payments from local transit taxes for December.

San Antonio's payment from the half-percent local MTA tax came to \$1.1 million. Houston's payment

from that city's one-percent MTA tax was \$9.9 million.

By city, December monthly payments were: Houston, \$9.2 million; Dallas, \$4.4 million; San Antonio, \$2 million; Fort Worth, \$1.4 million; Austin, \$1.2 million; El Paso, \$973,000 and Corpus Christi, \$804,000.

The optional one-percent city sales tax is collected along with the state four-percent sales tax by merchants and is rebated each month by the Comptroller to cities where it is levied.

Parallel Terraces Aid In Controlling Erosion

"Parallel Terraces constructed in Motley County are aiding in controlling wind and water erosion along with boosting crop yields," says Rodney Williams of the Soil Conservation Service. Several advantages can be realized from parallel terraces.

One advantage is the ease of farming achieved with the parallel layout of the terrace ridges. Terrace intervals (area between ridges) can be farmed with even numbered trips of four, six, eight and twelve row equipment, or any variation or rows to suit the individual needs. Many point row areas are eliminated in parallel terraces as is not the case with standard terracing.

Another advantage, possibly the most important, is the holding and spreading of rainfall for crop use. Rainfall is spread evenly throughout the field by parallel terraces to be used by the crops. This is accomplished by leveling or altering the slope of the land during

construction. This additional available moisture will increase crop production and help the producer realize greater returns per acre.

Many Motley County farmers have begun to sow the terrace ridges of small grains. Crops such as rye or wheat and even forage sorghum, will reduce wind erosion and prolong the life of the terrace system. This is proving to be a good practice in accomplishing both objectives. The growing crop on the terrace ridge will greatly reduce soil loss from blowing. Blowing, if not controlled, can burn crops and reduce fertility of the land. This practice also increases the lifespan of the terrace system by reducing the number of tillage trips on each terrace ridge. This allows the terrace to remain effective longer and costly rebuilding of ridges is avoided.

Assistance in design, layout, and construction of parallel terraces is available to anyone from the Soil Conservation Service in Matador.

USDA Offers Career Opportunities
