Rain .55-in

FIRST measurable rainfall in about 30 days was recorded Tuesday afternoon and evening. Bob Stanley's gauge measured .55-inch, but reports of more than one inch have been received from an area north-east of Matador.

J. M. "Buzz" Thacker at Roaring Springs said yesterday morning that his gauge showed .70-inch, but that he heard reports of an inch in the area.

One report from Flomot said 2.6 inches had been registered in the community.

The rain followed a cold front which passed through the Panhandle earlier. The weather bureau issued tornado warnings but none was sighted in the South Plains area.

Mr. Thompson had descended the bridge embankment when he was observed by Bobby Jameson, on a tractor in the vicinity. Earlier R. E. Campbell Sr. and Carl Tardy had observed Mr. Thompson's car as they drove to Mr. Campbell's feed lots, and on their return were stopped by Mr. Jameson.

They brought Mr. Thompson to town where he was examined by Dr. A. C. Traveek Jr. and conveyed to Plainview by ambulance.

Mr. Thompson had lain on the embankment about two hours and had tried to climb to his car on his hands and knees, when first seen by Jameson. Mrs. Thompson accompanied her husband in the ambulance to the hospital.

Graduation Is Milestone Minister Reminds Seniors

"Graduation is a milestone which you have reached, but not without the help of parents and friends," Motley County seniors were told Sunday night in a Baccalaureate message by Rev. Douglas Gossett, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, where the service was held.

"Graduation is beautiful, but it changes things," he declared. "You will go separate ways, just as the Apostles did after Jesus left them."

The message was based on Christ's declaration, "I am the way, the truth, and the life," and Rev. Gossett discussed the meaning of the scripture as applied to today. "You can know the way by being a member of God's Kingdom... truth is a narrow gate and the way is hard... truth and honesty form the cement which

holds the country together. We need to stand for the truth, just as Jesus stood by the truth. Jesus gave a new life and men are in poverty without this kind of life... Life is intended to be sacred... life is so short... Jesus said, 'I am the life -- for Eternity.'"

Mrs. Duff Green, 93 Celebrates Birthday

THINGS HAVE changed since Mrs. Duff Green of Roaring Springs first came to the Afton area 73 years ago. She celebrated her 93rd birthday May 12, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Grady Webb of Roaring Springs. In addition to several children who attended the observance, friends dropped in throughout the day to visit the pioneer.

Mrs. Green was the daughter of a school teacher, Mrs. L. L. Kelly who taught the first school in Throckmorton. Mrs. Duff Green taught school about seven years.

She came to this country in 1900, and taught school in the Afton community. Mrs. Green named the Afton post office.

The former Myra Kelly, Mrs. Green was born May 12, 1880 at old Fort Belknap. Her father, Levi Loyd Kelly, was drowned while driving a herd of cattle across the Brazos River. Her mother later contracted pneumonia and died, leaving three young children, including Mrs. Green.

A neighboring family named Graham cared for the children for about three months, until a maiden aunt could make the long trip from Mississippi to care for them. The aunt later made her home with Mr. and Mrs. Green, until her death, and is buried at Afton. Miss Kelly and Duff Green, a cowboy on the Forbis Ranch, were married in 1901. They had seven children, all of whom are living

Forbis (Nell) of Canoga Park, Calif.

For one period of five years while Mrs. Green taught school, she rode horseback through all kinds of weather (school term was January to May) and did not miss a single day.

Mrs. Keith Has Longtime Record As Matador Teacher

Mrs. Charlie (Viola) Keith has a longtime record as a teacher in the Matador schools system. She has taught third generation pupils.

"One of my early pupils was John Briscoe. This year one of my pupils was his grandson, Joe Don Warren, whose mother, Mrs. Don Warren, the former Pat Briscoe, I had also taught."

Mrs. Keith is retiring after being a member of the school faculty continuously since 1943, but she has taught a total of 36 years in Matador.

All of her teaching experience, except one year as a high school teacher in Elvasville, Tex., has been in the Matador school system.

The former Viola Knight, Mrs. Keith started teaching in Matador in 1928, after her junior year in college, and went back the following summer and received her B.A. degree from Texas Woman's University, Denton, where she majored in social studies and education and minored in government.

She was married in August, 1930, to Charlie Keith in Montebello, Calif., (a native of Matador) and after two years on the West Coast, they returned to Matador.

Mrs. Keith retired in 1935 to rear their two sons, Charles Robert and David, and was out of school for eight years. She was called back to teach in high school during World War II when only one man, Supt. B. F. Tunnell was left in the school system. She taught two years in high school, then the sixth grade, and finally, the fourth, which she has taught ever since. She taught under four

superintendents, Jack Overton, Mr. Tunnell, Bert Ezzell and Charlie Johnson.

During the depression years, Mrs. Keith helped organize the Matador Child Welfare Association, which was badly needed to help underprivileged school children. Later she assisted in organizing the Parent-Teachers' Association. She held offices in both of these organizations, as president, vice-president and secretary. She is presently a member of the Texas State Teachers' Association.

Born In Alabama

Born in Empire, Alabama, Mrs. Keith came to Texas at an early age, with her parents. She was five years of age when her mother died and she, with her brothers and one sister grew up in the State Home at Corsicana. It was here that Mrs. Keith received her early training in grade school and high school. After graduation from high school, she attended Westmoreland Methodist College in San Antonio (now a part of Trinity University), and received an A.A. degree.

In 1959, the Matador schools' year book, "La Arena" was dedicated to Mrs. Keith in recognition for her years of service as a teacher, and of her 25 years of faithful service to the Matador school. In 1961 she was selected as the "Teacher of the Year" from the Matador School system.

Mrs. Keith is a member of the First United Methodist Church, Matador and has taught in Sunday School at least 20 years.

Her early life as an orphan created a tender feeling and concern for all children, which she has shown in many ways through the years of dedicated teaching, and which earned for her a Life Membership in the Texas Parent-Teacher Association.

When the 1959 annual was dedicated to Mrs. Keith, the late R. C. Jeffers, one of her first pupils wrote her that, "This younger generation has more good sense than I've been giving them credit for having. I can remember when you were one of the nicest 5th grade teachers a kid could possibly have."

Mrs. Keith plans "to rest up, take care of my home and Charlie, read, and TV leisurely - without grading papers. And enjoy my children and grandchildren every chance I get."

Major Charles R. Keith is in the Marine Corps, stationed at Cherry Point, N.C., and he and his wife, Julia have two daughters, Merrie Lynne and Elizabeth, while David Keith and his wife, Tommie have two sons, Bryan and Michael Keith. They live at Lingo, N.M., where he is engaged in ranching.

Garden Club Has Closing Luncheon

Matador Garden Club closed the current year with a spring luncheon, Monday, May 21, in the home of Mrs. Edgar Lee, with Miss Viola Stinson of Flomot as guest.

Miss Stinson presented a most interesting program on rocks, and displayed many varieties. She explained the process of polishing, grinding and sawing the rocks and stones, and exhibited the finished product. She also brought several pieces of petrified wood which had been found in this area. These included palmwood, which, she said, is known as the Texas native petrified wood.

Among gem stones found in this area are jasper and agate. Miss Stinson had one piece of petrified jasper which she had picked up on the Barton Ranch, where she lives. She had pieces of Bruno Jasper from Australia, also fern and lace agate which came from Mexico. She also had an agate stone which came from Brazil, and several pieces of quartz.

Miss Stinson started her rock collection hobby while recuperating from surgery in 1963. She has purchased a number of rocks and stones, and included in her collection are several geodes. The ball-shaped rocks, when sawed in half, reveal interesting crystal formations. Although she has found several solid geodes on the ranch, those she displayed had been found below Mexico City.

Like many other rock "hounds," Miss Stinson uses many of her polished rocks and stones, in jewelry settings for pins, belt buckles, necklaces and bracelets.

The club members were each

given a polished and an unpolished rock as a souvenir. Following the program, Mrs. Bill Pipkin, president, conducted a business session, and reported on a recent City Council meeting she had attended, in the interest of installing flower boxes in the downtown business area. She said that although the club had offered to fill the containers, no action was taken by the councilmen to assist with the project of getting them installed.

"The club is making an effort to beautify Matador in a manner similar to several area towns, but we need financial backing, as well as cooperation of the citizens," Mrs. Pipkin pointed out.

Mrs. Carl King announced that the Floyd County and Surrounding Counties, Fair Association had asked the Matador Garden Club to be in charge of the horticulture division for the fair this fall. The club voted to do this, and also to sponsor a candidate in the Queen's contest.

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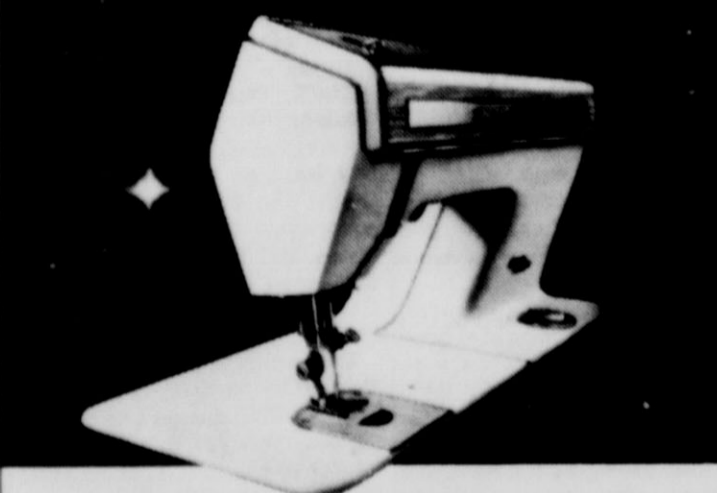

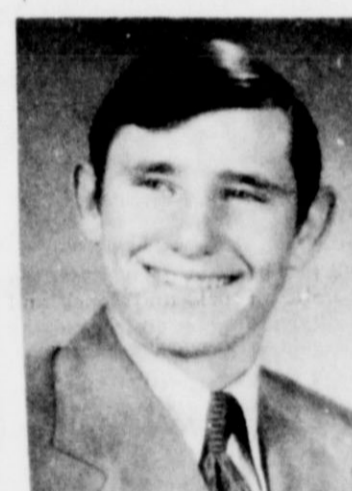

Let us obey the rules and regulations. No garden is complete without turnips ...

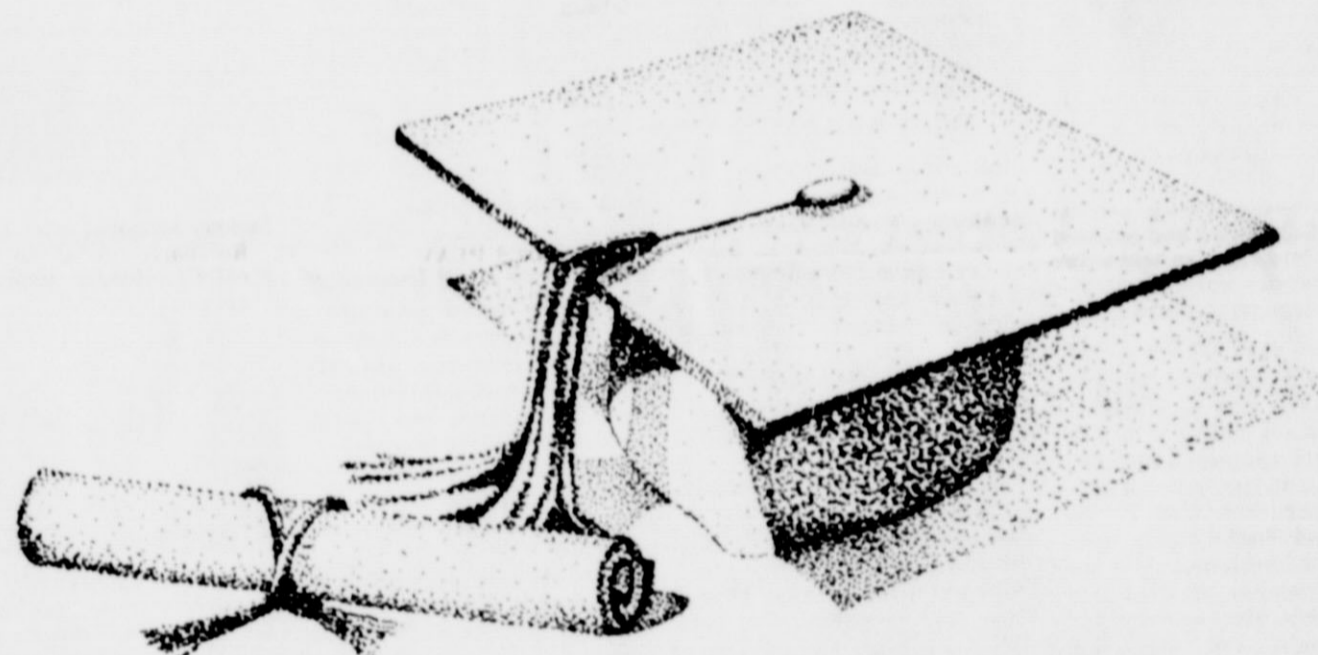

This year there is an exception to the rule about not wiping a tear from your eye or blowing your nose when the child snakes down the aisle

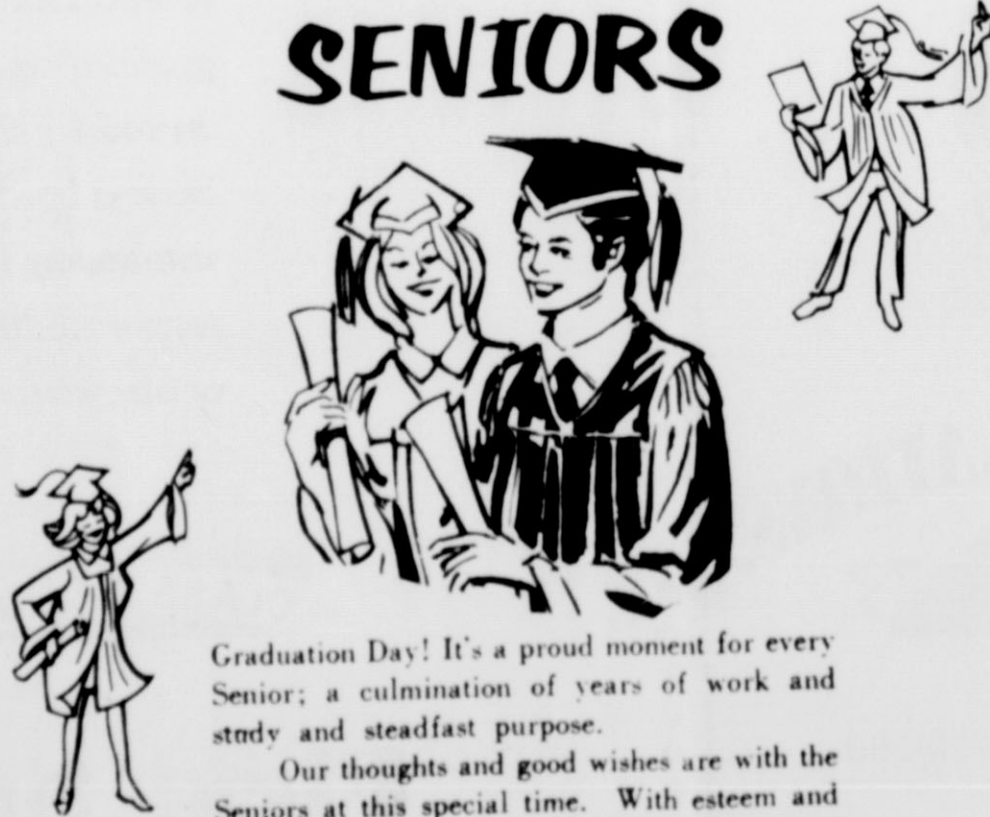
because this building and auditorium is to be demolished. Some of our parents made this same sentimental march down these same aisles so the tears could be for memories of years

KOOK'S KORNER

LEMON CREAM SHERBET
By Mrs. Robert Darsey

Juice and grated rind of 4 lemons; 2 cups sugar; 2 eggs; 1 cup white corn syrup; 2 cups cream; dash salt; 1 1/2 qts. whole milk.

Grate rind of lemon, cover with 1 cup water, bring to boil. Boil for 3 or 4 minutes, strain. To liquid, add lemon juice, sugar, syrup, salt. Let stand. Beat eggs, add milk and cream, pour into freezer and add lemon mixture. Freeze.

Serve with Apricot Sauce

Two cans apricots (drained). Put in blender a few at a time until they are blended. Add 1/2 cup apricot juice, 1/4 cup honey, 1/4 cup lemon juice and salt. Blend and chill. Serve over sherbet.

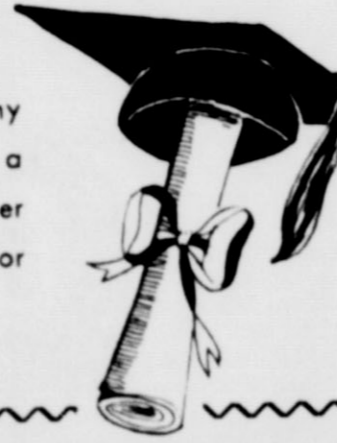
