## Farabee Selected For 1982 Award


Senator Ray Farabee Wichita Falls has been selected to receive the 1982 Friend Education Award. Education Award. This award is presented annually by the Texas Classroom Teachers Association, a statewide teacher's organization, to a person outside the field of education who has made a significant contribution to educa-tion in Texas. Senator Ed Howard of Texark-ana has been named co-recipient.

In the last legislative session, Senator Farabee sponsored and passed bills providing for teacher competency testing and for improving the teacher retirement system. Senator Farabee said, "I am honored to

have been selected to receive this award.

Education is the single largest and most important part of the state budget. Improv-ing our education system while still trying to hold the line on spending should be a top priority of state government in the 80s." Senator Farabee presently serves as a member of the Select Committee on Public Education.

Suggestions for ways to make the most of these changes will be presented during a presented special one-day pro-gram at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, March 9 at the Fair Park Auditorium three blocks north of the Childress County

The program "Profitable Decision Making in 1982," is especially tailored to the needs of

agricultural producers.
"A panel of Extension
educators will spend the day addressing real-world problems of farming and ranching." They will cover farm policy, production and financial decisions, and

marketing alternatives.
The Childress meeting will focus upon conditions and alternaconditions and alternatives in cotton and wheat. It is one of 10 such meetings being conducted across the state by the Extension Service. The local meeting is being held in conjunction with the Rolling Plains Economic

Policy and marketing trends will be examined by Dr. Ron Knutson, economist and policy and marketing special-ist; Dr. Roland Smith, economist and market-ing specialist, and Dr. Carl Anderson, econo-mist and cotton marketing specialist. Knutson will discuss implications of the 1981 farm bill. Smith will discuss marketing outlooks for wheat, and Anderson will look at cotton prospects.

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
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
