## LIONS HEAR REPORT OF CONVENTION

HOLDING his first meeting Tuesday as President of the Matador Lions Club, James Stanley gave a report of the Las Vegas, Nevada International convention, which he attended two weeks ago. Lion Stanley was the only delegate from the Matador Club, but was one of the 50,000 representatives attending from throughout the free world.

He reported of the beauty, pageantry and goals of the largest civic organization in the world, while in convention. He said Lions International is moving to a new headquarters in the Chicago area and that the old downtown Chicago building has been sold. He said the organization is in good financial condition and that no advance in international dues is anticipated.

One of the plans of Lions International is to organize more Leo clubs, to enlist the interest of boys in order to help bridge the generation gap. At present 1300 Leo Clubs have been organized and sponsored by regular clubs.

Lion Stanley said the Lions parade in Las Vegas was colorful and well attended despite the 104 to 112 afternoon temperatures. It required 3 1/2 hours for the parade to pass a viewing point.

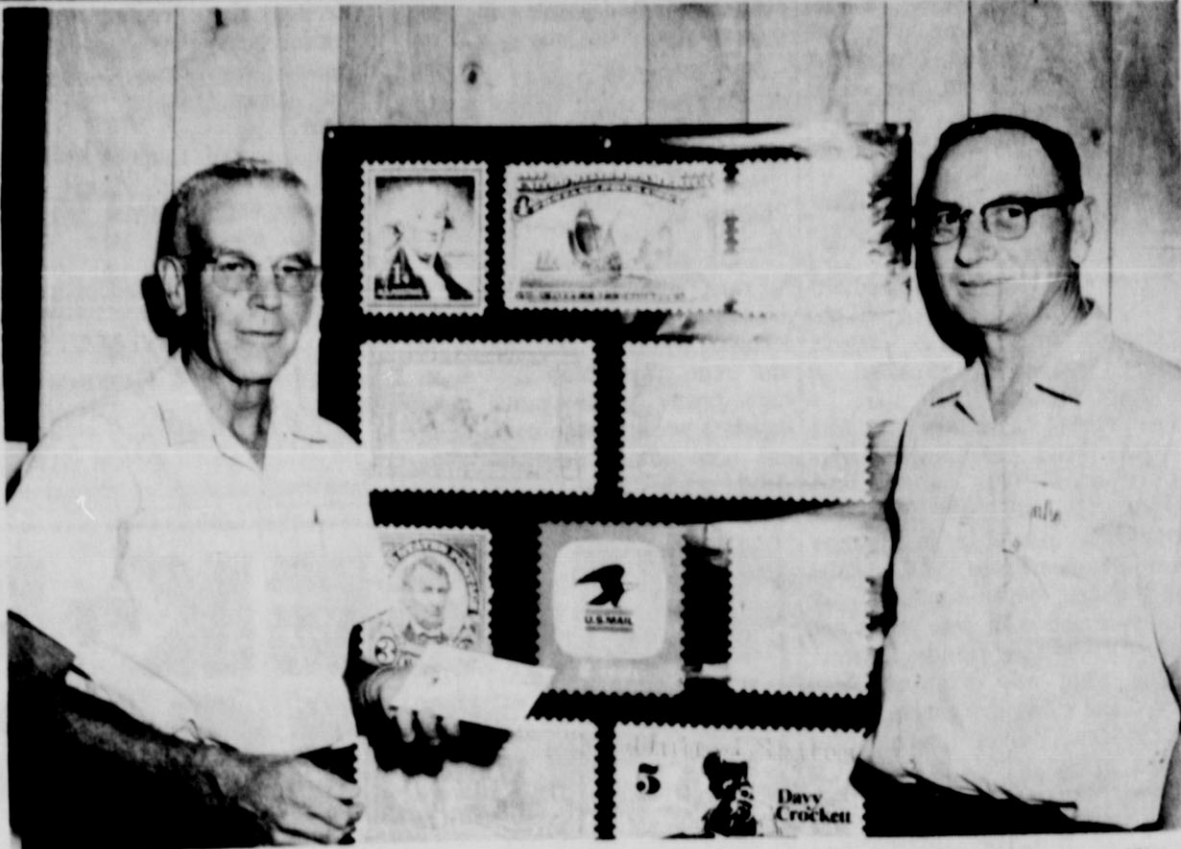

Of the 72 participants, Mr. Edwards, one of three from the Panhandle was elected president of the class. Mrs. Edwards was selected to audit the course in geology.

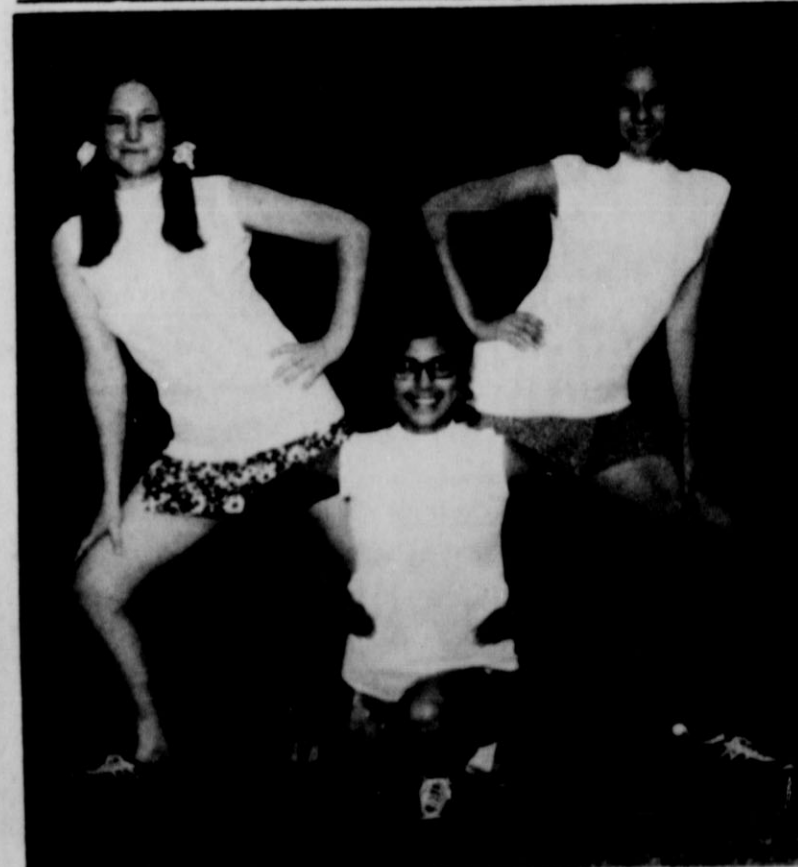

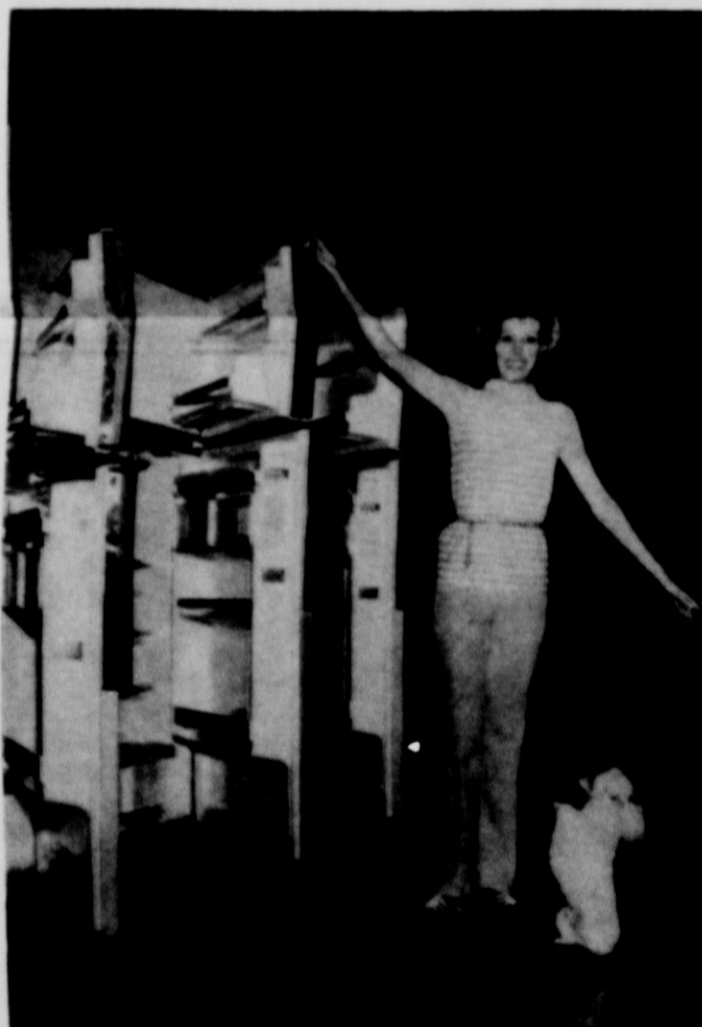

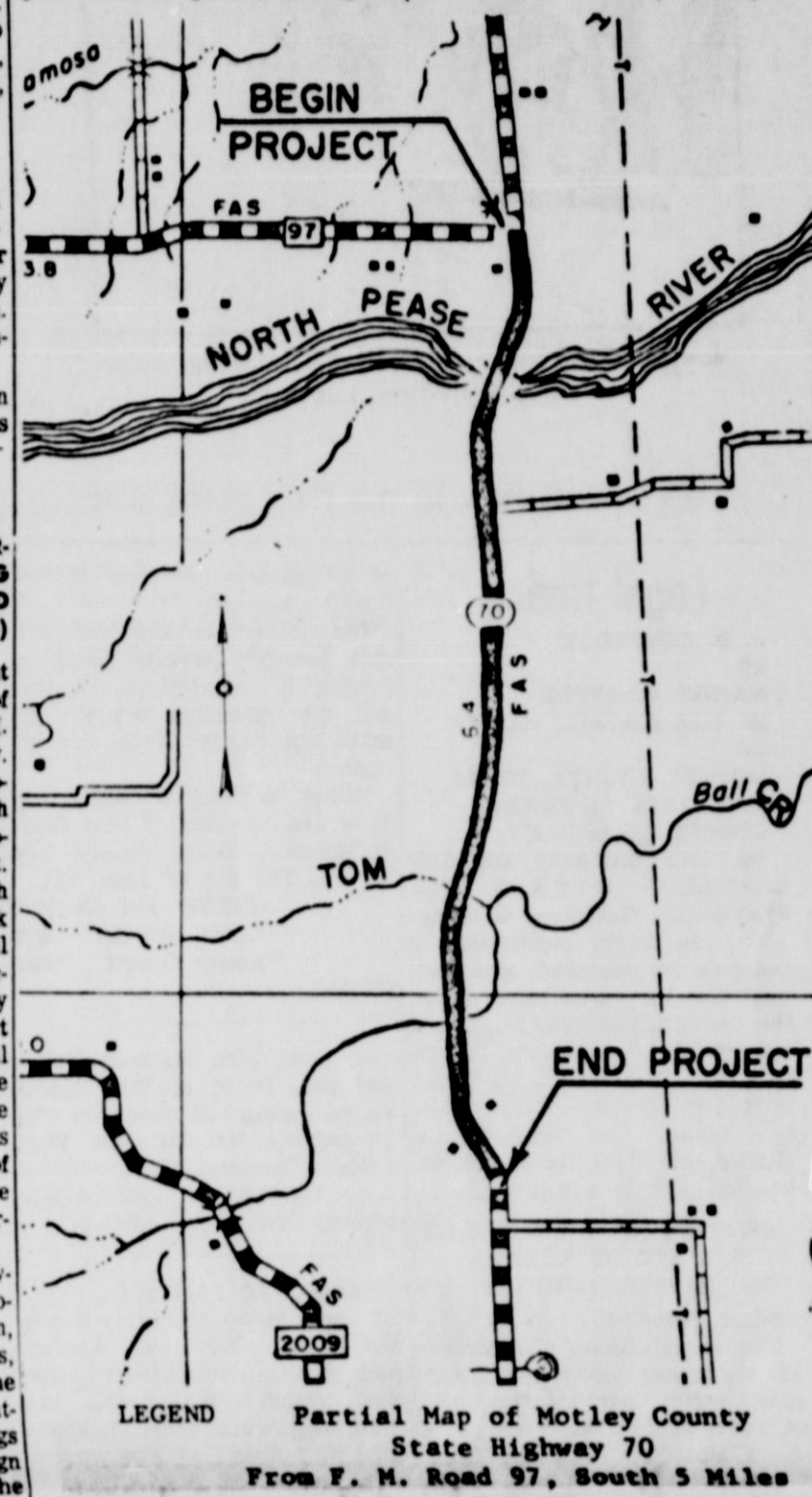
office of the County Judge of Motley County.

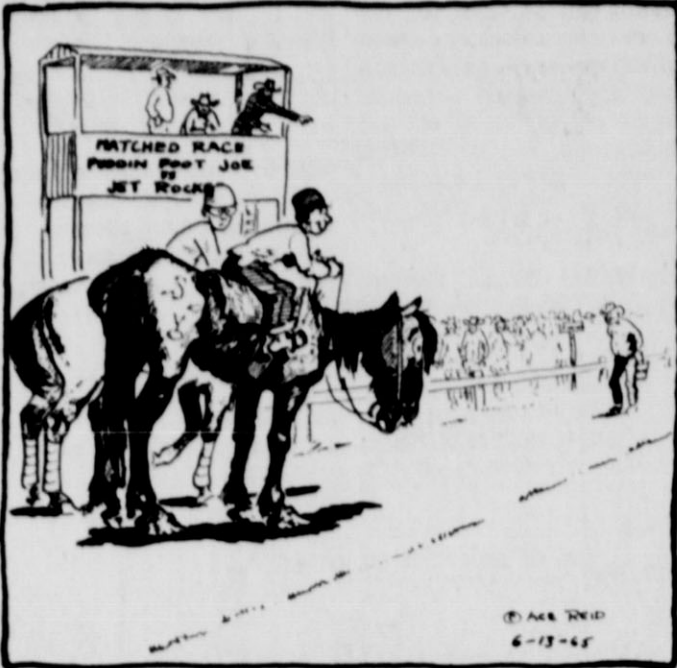
