Baseball Meeting Set For Tonight

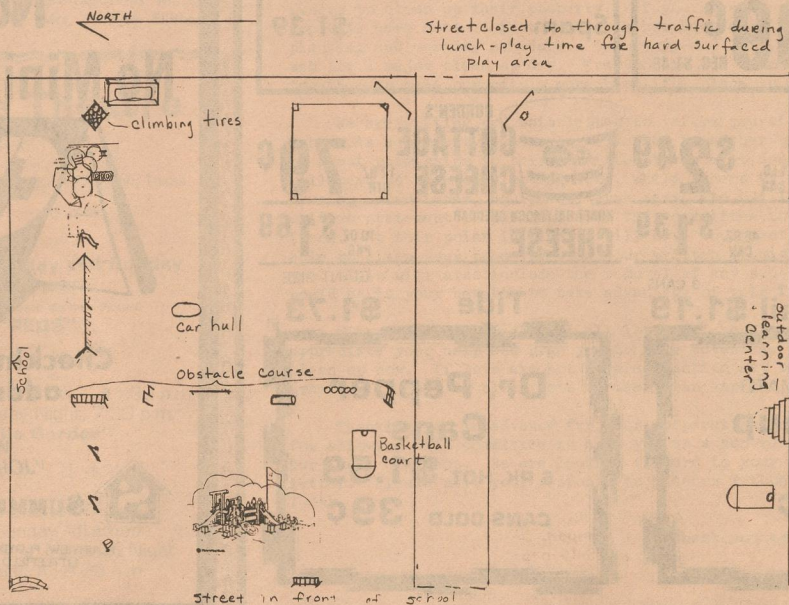
A meeting will be held Thursday, April 15 (tonight), at 8:00 p.m. in the school cafeteria to organize the summer baseball program.

Green Thumbers Attend Confab

GREEN THUMB workers in Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Lubbock, and Motley counties met Monday, April 5 in Ralls at the Ralls Senior Citizen's Center for their bi-annual training meeting.

They learned of the changes affecting them in the social security system from Terry Richardson, Assistant Manager of the Lubbock social security

office. Visiting from Waco to discuss proposed changes in the program and other policy was Green Thumb Assistant State Director, John Willingham.

Wendy Brown, Area Supervisor for the Green Thumb program in thirteen south plains counties, was coordinator for the session. She felt the workers were able to take some useful information home from the training meeting.

"The future of the social security system and of employment programs for older persons has been of real interest to the Green Thumbers, since they will be the direct and immediate recipients of any changes in both of these areas," says Brown.

Texas Farmer's Union Green Thumb, and equal opportunity employer, is an employment and placement program for rural residents age 55 and older, who meet a low income guideline. Besides the counties already listed, the program operates in 101 other counties in the state of Texas, in 44 other states, and two territories of the United States.

Funeral services for Joe R. Meador, 79, of Paducah were conducted at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church there. Rev. Martin Foster, pastor of the First Christian Church and Rev. Jerry Griffith, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiated.

Burial was in Garden of Memories Cemetery under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Mr. Meador died Sunday, April 11, at 8:30 a.m. in Richards Memorial Hospital, where he had been a patient the past month. He had been in failing health for several years. He was the brother of the late Ben Douglas Meador, longtime publisher of the Matador Tribune.

He was born April 10, 1903 in Texhoma, Okla., where his parents, Jennie Belle Quanton Meador and James E. Meador, pioneers of Motley County, had moved after leaving Matador and living for a short time in Moore County. The family later moved to Quanah, and in 1910, to Cottle County.

As a young man, Meador worked as a cowboy on the Matador Ranch, and on a dude ranch in New Mexico, later returning to Paducah. He was married to the former Lola Ray Grayum.

For several years he was engaged in constructing tanks and dams on ranches and farms in this area, and also as a dirt and gravel contractor before going into ranching. He was a retired rancher and

cattleman, and was a member of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. He had been in charge of the chuck wagon for the Cattle-King Rodeo Association for the past 29 years. The association last year presented him with a plaque in appreciation for his longtime services.

He was widely known for the entertaining stories which he told of ranchers and cowboys with whom he had worked.

Survivors include his wife, Lola; a daughter, Rochelle, Larry Thompson, Derr Johnston, Doug Yarbrough and Bruce Slover.

Motley County boys' track team edged New Deal by one point to win the Division I title at the Abernathy Invitational, Saturday, April 10 with 80 team total points.

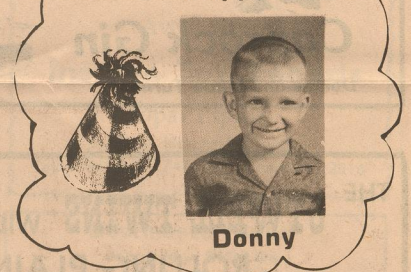

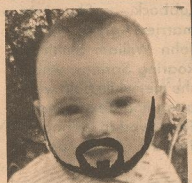

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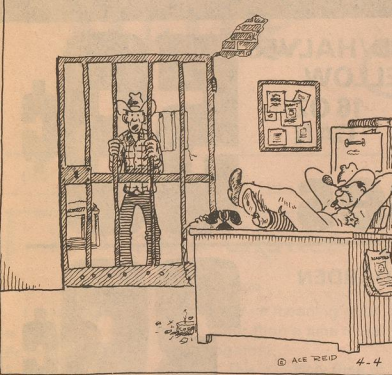
Recent Rites Held For Sister-In-Law

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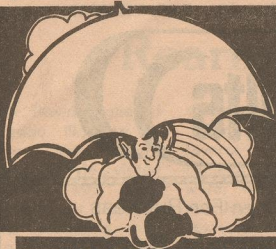
