Stockholders, friends and employees of Rolling Plains Production Credit Association met Friday, April 23, in Childress and Saturday, April 24, in Stamford for their 48th Annual Stockholders Meeting.

During the business session of the meeting, W. H. Williams of Spur was re-elected to serve a three-year term. Other PCA directors are W. J. Boykin of Northfield, B. H. DeBusk of Anson, Dan Henard, Jr. of Wellington, and Garon B. Tidwell of Munday.

He reported that the Board had given much consideration to credit policies and procedures to be followed in the current lending season. He said the most difficult financial problem facing some operators is the principal and interest required to service debts created through one or both of the following broad categories: (1) capital purchases beyond the capacity of the operation to repay; (2) carryover debt from

operating losses. On behalf of the Board and Association Staff, he expressed appreciation to each stockholder for doing everything possible to keep his business acceptable during this time which is trying for all of us.

Texas Caves Explored At El Progresso Meeting

Mrs. W. F. Jacobs explored and described Texas caves, grottoes and sink holes in a program on conservation for El Progresso Club Thurs., April 22 at Plainview Savings and Loan Community room. Hostess for the meeting was Mrs. Joe Campbell.

Mrs. Phil Meeting presided at 1st vice president, and Mrs. Frank Pohl served as leader.

The members were engrossed as Mrs. Jacobs gave data as evidence that many of the caves had been used for camping by early Indians, buffalo hunters, Indian scouts and even early settlers, because of their locations near watering holes.

As an example she cited the falls at Roaring Springs, pointing out the miniature grotto behind the falls and signs left of old campfires. Other evidence here are the holes in the nearby rocks where Indians ground their corn. Other caves and grottoes in this area were brought to mind, the most picturesque being at Linguish Falls in the caprock foothills in the northwest part of the county. Mrs. Jacobs recalled several class picnics there which she attended while in high school, but said it is now closed to the public.

Texas has some 3,000 mapped caves; mostly in Central and West Texas, she said, quoting from an article in Southern Living magazine. However, only seven of the caves are open to the public. Most of them are located in a narrow band reaching from Georgetown south to San Antonio.

Conservation of the caves did not start until after 1940 when a

society was formed to open Longhorn Cavern, near Burnet. Work was suspended for several years until interest was renewed in 1957.

Others now open to the public include Cascade Caverns and Cave Without a Name, both near Boerne; Inner Space Cavern, Georgetown; Caverns of the Sonora; Natural Bridge Caverns, between San Antonio and New Braunfels, and Wonder Cave, near San Marcos.

Mrs. Jacobs also brought several Texas Highways magazines containing articles and

photographs of various caves, for the members to view.

The very interesting program was concluded with an Inspirational Thought by the leader. Mrs. Campbell served refreshments of cake and coffee.

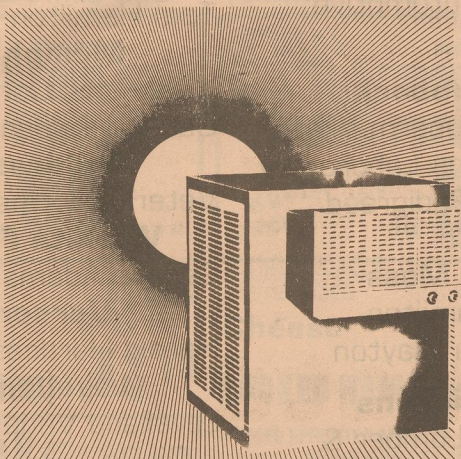

New Vehicle Law Explained At Lions

The new Texas law which went into effect January 1, requiring that all vehicles registered and operated in the state be covered by liability insurance, was explained in detail for Matador Lions Club at its April 20 meeting at the First United Methodist Church. Speaker was Highway Patrolman Dudley (Dude) Speed with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The insurance policy, or either a receipt or identification card verifying that the owner has liability insurance should be carried in the vehicle at all times, Patrolman Speed reminded the audience. The identification card or receipt must show description of the vehicle, the amount covered and the person to whom it is issued, he said.

"Penalties for not complying with the law are imposed by the JP Court," he warned. "Minimum fine for a first offense is \$75.00, and maximum is \$200.00. The license can be suspended and the plates confiscated. The minimum fine for a second offense is \$200."

A state-wide survey made from January through March revealed that 92% of vehicle owners in Motley County displayed proof of insurance, the patrolman said, noting "We have had good response locally." He discussed other aspects of the law, and answered questions from the audience.

Boss Lion Alan Bingham presided and led the club in applauding the Methodist women for an enjoyable lunch. He announced upcoming events at that time, being the Lions district convention (the past weekend) in Lubbock and presented Queen Shelley Jackson with a Lions pin; and the light bulbs sale (conducted this Tuesday).

Tailtwister Larry Hoyle escorted Roy Hobbs to the front, where Lion John M. Russell presented him with membership credentials and pin, as a new member.

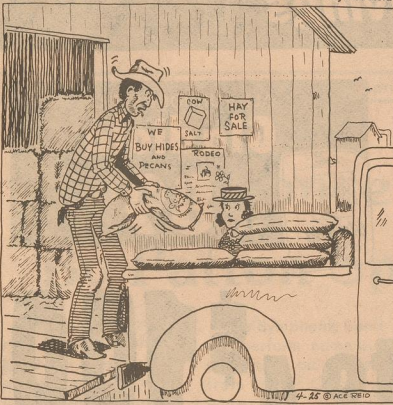


