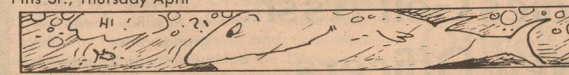

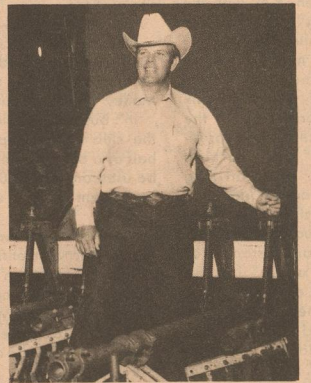

The clubwomen were surprised to learn that there are instances of child abuse in this county, as Mrs. Bearden explained that the malady was not confined to physical injuries, but could be verbal, emotional and even neglect, on the part of the parents.

"Any of these conditions can be brought on by stress," Mrs. Bearden said. "So many parents ignore their children and are not aware that they are abusing them emotionally. And surprisingly, it is not always the children in low income families who suffer from neglect and abuse. Many of the more affluent parents are guilty."

"Most children feel insecure," she pointed out, continuing, "An abused child generally grows up to be an abusive parent. Everyone has the responsibility of reporting cases of child abuse and getting involved. If authorities think a child's life is in danger, they take the child from the parents. After counseling, if the parents are given the child back, they are checked often."

Mrs. Bearden said that there is a penalty of six months in jail and \$10,000 fine for failing

to report child abuse cases. The nearest agency is Parents Anonymous in Lubbock, she said.

Mrs. Bearden showed a film on the subject of child abuse, provided as a courtesy of the Matley County Library.

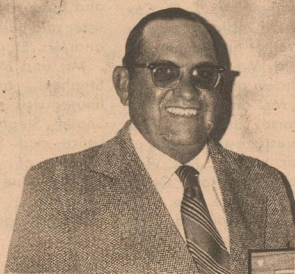
