## Gem Theft Foiled By Night Watch In Brief Gunfight

KINGSVILLE, Dec. 22. (AP)—A 71-year-old night watchman shot it out with thieves here early today to foil the attempted burglary of a downtown jewelry store.

The burglars got away after an exchange of six shots with Jack Farquhar, 71.

Here is the story as outlined by Farquhar: Making his rounds, about 1 o'clock this morning he drove up an alley near Weisman's Jewelry Store and saw two men hiding in some bushes.

He gave no indication of seeing them but drove on away. He waited five minutes, then slipped up to the back door of the jewelry store and there was a man trying to gain entrance to the place.

He had a canvas sack of tools. He had already opened a door of steel bars and was working intently on an inner door.

"What are you doing?" Farquhar asked the man. "I was in a mess then," said the stranger. "Just resting," said the stranger.

"What do you have in the sack?" Farquhar inquired. The stranger started walking off down the alley adjoining the store. Farquhar called to him, three times, to stop and then the night watchman drew his gun.

At that moment, a second man, an accomplice hidden in some nearby bushes, fired at Farquhar. "I was in a mess then," said the elderly watchman. "I didn't see any gun flash and didn't know where the shot had come from."

The night watchman sought cover behind a small frame structure, an abandoned outhouse. But he felt he was still in an exposed position, so he made a break for a couple of telephone poles a few yards away.

As he started running, however, the man with the gun fired again. "The bullet whistled right by my head," said Farquhar. "I thought I was a goner. And I didn't see any gun flash then either. I didn't know where it came from."

Farquhar dived to the ground and flattened out. There was a third shot. He saw the flash. He fired his own pistol three times in the direction of the flash, leaving himself two bullets to spare.

Right after this, the man with the gun sprang out of the bushes and started running down the alley with the second man. Farquhar heard one of the men ask the other: "Are you hit?"

"The other man either told him 'no' or 'I don't know,'" Farquhar said. The two escaped in an automobile which had been parked a block away.

Farquhar then ran to a howling alley where Dale Wasson, proprietor, was counting the day's take. Wasson phoned police and a search was begun immediately. No suspects had been arrested shortly before noon.

McKINNEY, Dec. 22. (AP)—Wreckage of a Tulsa plane missing since Monday on a flight to Dallas was found six miles west of here today. Bodies of all three Tulsa men aboard were found at the wreckage site.

McKinney police confirmed recovery of three bodies from the wreckage. The plane fell in a Blackland farming area, fairly level and with only a few trees. Radio-equipped police cars at the scene gave the plane's number as N2265A. The CAA in Dallas said that was the number of missing Tulsa plane.

There were three men aboard the Cessna 170 when it left Tulsa Monday. They were H. J. Happel, president of the Happel Construction Co., Tulsa; C. W. Healey, an engineer, and W. J. Crawley, the pilot, all of Tulsa.

A resident of the area telephoned McKinney police the first report of discovery of the wreckage, which had been sought by about 15 civil air patrol craft flying over North Texas.

## 1949 Is Record Safety Year For Nation's Miners

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 22. (AP)—This year looks like the safest in history for the men who dig the nation's coal.

Only a major disaster in the final week of 1949 can spoil what promises to be record year for safety in the coal pits.

Coal men declared today all the credit does not belong to the three strikes of 1949 which kept the country's 480,000 coal diggers idle for varying periods of time.

Spokesmen said safety programs, education and equipment are partly responsible. The fatality rate for the first 10 months of 1949 was 1.14 deaths for each million tons of soft coal mined.

That rate, while low in comparison with past years, represents the loss of 397 lives. Most of the victims died singly or by twos and threes in accidents involving falling roofs or mine cars which went out of control.

During the last 12 months, the Howard county tuberculosis association spent approximately \$1,200 in the treatment of some 100 cases of the disease here. An expanded program is planned for the next year, the executive secretary said.

## Gen. MacArthur Flays Russia, Asks Probe Of Japanese POWs' Fate

### Soviet Union's 'Hypocrisy' Is Hit By General

### Red Smokescreen to Distract Attention From Issue Charged

TOKYO, Dec. 22. (AP)—General MacArthur today denounced "callous" Soviet "hypocrisy" and started a move for independent investigation of the fate of 376,000 missing Japanese war prisoners captured by the Russians.

He said he had requested Washington to begin negotiations for an investigation either by a neutral nation or the International Red Cross.

The American occupation commander issued one of his strongest attacks against the Soviets after a Russian walkout of the allied council for Japan yesterday. This was followed by renewed Russian charges the United States was assisting the revival of Japanese fascism.

The Soviet mission was under determined siege by 200 Japanese representatives of anxious relatives of missing war prisoners. They were told the Soviet answer to requests for information on further repatriation "appeared in this morning's papers." Presumably this referred to a letter charging "oppression" by the Japanese government which Lt. Gen. Kazuma Derevyanko, head of the Soviet mission, addressed to Gen. MacArthur.

MacArthur said the letter showed "a callousness of hypocrisy I cannot fail to denounce." He termed it a smokescreen to distract attention from the repatriation issue.

W. J. Sebald, head of the occupation diplomatic section, earlier had termed the letter "unadulterated twaddle."

The Japanese crowd around the Soviet mission became clamorous at times. Once Russian guards pushed them back when they attempted to enter the compound.

The delegation went to the embassy to keep what its leaders said was an appointment made last week with Soviet officials who promised answers to questions on repatriation. The Japanese said they represented the "Tokyo chapter of the council for acceleration of the repatriation of Japanese abroad."

## SANTA CLAUS GOING ON AIR TO TELL RUSSIANS ABOUT CHRISTMAS IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—Now again Santa Claus is in on the conflict with Russia. The jolly old gent will play a leading role on the "Voice of America" broadcasts to the Russian people this Christmas season. The idea is to show the Russians what a fine season Christmas is in the land they are taught by their government to hate and fear.

Heavy emphasis also will be placed on the religious significance of Christmas. Around the State Department, where every aspect of Russian life is put under the microscope, some odd facts have been turned up about the official Russian attitude toward Christmas.

The theme, authorities here said, is to be found in the "large Soviet encyclopedia" which in the 1941 edition declared: "In the Soviet Union the celebration of Christmas by believers is a most harmful reactionary survivor of the old capitalist past. Like every religious holiday, Christmas is kept alive and supported among backward groups of workers by reactionary religious prejudices."

In the early years of the Soviet regime, an attempt was made to end the Christmas celebration completely. The sale of Christmas trees was forbidden and the familiar ornaments and decorations of the season were not offered in Russian stores. This attempt failed.

The next move of the Communists was to divert the pagantry and symbols of Christmas to new uses. Instead of holding the celebration on the traditional Russian Christmas Day of January 7 all the ceremonies are now focused on New Year's Day.

## FINAL PUSH NEEDED Chest Fund Poised To Go Over Top

A little Christmas spirit toward the Community Chest can get it over the top. This was the word Thursday from Ted O. Groehl, general chairman, as the current campaign came within only \$1,246.29 of the \$27,000 objective.

Gain for the week was \$1,036, practically all of it resulting from direct appeals by the general chairman via telephone. "I earnestly plead with all residents of Howard county who have not had a part in the Chest to mail in checks or phone me (No. 3030) today and tomorrow," he said. "We are close enough now that the inclusion of the Chest on Christmas gift lists will enable us to reach the goal."

It will be impossible for the chairman to make contacts on all who have not yet subscribed to support of the Chest, or those who now feel they can make a more liberal gift than at first. "It's your Chest," continued the chairman. "Won't you supply that last little but desperately needed push needed to put it over the top?"

With the total at \$35,833, or 96.4 per cent of the total goal, the Chest can be put over by Christmas. Gifts to it now would be Christmas gifts that would do good for 12 months of the new year. Checks may be mailed to the Community Chest or left with the Herald.

## Young Murderer's Rites Held Today

COVINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—Covington's Baptist Church was the setting for the funeral today of George Clements, 19, who shot 18-year-old Marilyn Forston to death. Marilyn's funeral was held in the same church yesterday.

After he killed Marilyn in a hardware store here Tuesday, George wounded himself fatally. Marilyn and George had dated in school days but recently they had broken up. She was here for Christmas holidays from her studies at Texas Wesleyan College at Fort Worth, where she had moved to Fort Worth, had come here on a visit.

George's burial place is the Rio Vista Cemetery near Covington. Marilyn is buried in Rose Hill Cemetery at Cleburne—about 12 miles north of here.

## HAPPY NEW YEAR AHEAD

### Lower Pork And Egg Prices In '50 Seen

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—There were some signs today of a happy new year ahead for consumers—with money more plentiful, a drop expected in pork and egg prices, and the easiest installment terms since the war.

The good news for those who like ham and eggs came yesterday from the Department of Agriculture. It reported prospects of a record-breaking peacetime pork supply in 1950, along with a possible eight to 10-cent-a-dozen drop in the cost of eggs.

The Reserve Board followed that up today with a report that: "The tendency seems to be toward progressively easier terms for all borrowers" who are buying goods on the installment plan.

2. It expects an expanding money supply next year. This includes bank deposits (both checking and saving) and currency in circulation. It will be swelled by large public outlays by federal, state and local governments—made with the use of bank loans since tax income doesn't cover the cost.

It is probable that consumers will continue to pay the same rate of income taxes and also the cost of steel products and coal is expected to rise. However, these increases may be offset in part by the mounting congressional drive for a cut in the taxes levied on so-called "luxury items."

That would bring somewhat lower telephone bills, cheaper transportation, and a saving on such other things as electric light bulbs, cosmetics, leather goods and jewelry.

The Reserve Board said in its monthly bulletin that installment terms already have eased considerably since government credit controls ended last June 30—most notably in the cases of new automobiles and refrigerators.

## 5 BURN TO DEATH IN SHACK BLAZE

HOUSTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—A mother and four of her children were burned to death and four other children burned in an early morning fire in a frame shack at the John R. Kleinmann Dairy on Tanner Road, near Fairbanks about 7 miles from Houston.

Dead in the tragedy are Claudia Holcomb, 44, the mother, and Lillie Mae, 10; Floradene, 9; Louise, 5; and Willie Lee, 2.

Burned were L. L. Holcomb, 18, a son, who tried to break his way into the blazing shack; Ivy, 17; Doty Lee, 13; and Lucille, 6. The extent of their burns was not learned immediately.

Fire Chief E. P. O'Rourke of the Spring Branch Volunteer Fire Department, said the fire apparently started when Lillie Mae poured either gasoline or kerosene on a wood fire to get it started.

The father, Pete Holcomb is an employee of the dairy and was working in the barn when the fire began. L. L. Holcomb was working with his father, but rushed to the house and tried to beat his way into the fire to rescue his mother and brothers and sisters.

Chief O'Rourke said the fire probably exploded and showered the interior, causing the shack to go "up in one big puff."

He said the house was burned to the ground. "I don't know what happened inside the house, but they all must have got pretty excited," he commented. "The stove must have been close to the door to keep some of them from getting out."

Holcomb told reporters that his wife died with the youngest child, Willie Lee, in her arms.

The shack burned to the ground so quickly that it took the 10 firemen of the Spring Branch Department only 10 minutes to put it out.

## Big Spring Woman Is Hospitalized In Two-Car Mishap

Mrs. Oscar Martin, 1104 E. 12th street, was under observation at Malone & Hogan hospital this morning as the result of injuries received in a two-car mishap at 401 W. 4th street last night.

Extent of her injuries had not been ascertained, but nurses said she was undergoing x-ray examination. Her husband, slightly injured in the accident, was released from the hospital last night.

T. A. Brown received treatment and was released from Cooper hospital for injuries sustained in the mishap. The accident occurred about 10 p. m. when cars driven by Martin and Brown were in collision, police said.

The injured were taken to hospitals in Eberley and McDaniel-Bouillon ambulances.

## Bill for Reallocation Of Unused Cotton Acreage Is Planned

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—Rep. Wickersham (D-Okla.) said today he will introduce a bill next month to permit the Agriculture Department to reallocate unused cotton acreage quotas.

Just back from Oklahoma he told a reporter that he favors the agricultural support program but that acreage inequities should be adjusted.

Numerous farmers have protested allotments under the new acreage law. Reallocation of unused allotments has been proposed by members of the House Agriculture Committee. But the Agriculture Department said it lacks authority under law to do so.

## Kansas Pipeline Blows Up with Roar

HUTCHINSON, Kan., Dec. 22. (AP)—The Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Co.'s 24-inch line, which carries Texas gas to the Detroit industrial area, blew up at 4:45 o'clock this morning with a report that frightened residents of Belpre, ten miles away.

No one was injured and the snow blanket prevented fire. Pipeline workers were rushed to the scene to cut valves and repair crews are en route from Kansas City.

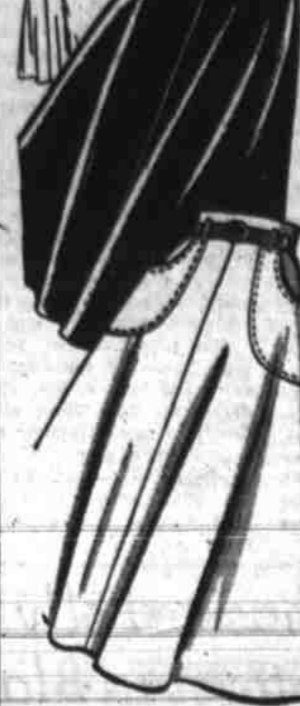

**Scurry County Play Is Big 1949 Oil Event**

AUSTIN, Dec. 22. (AP)—Scurry County's apparent billion-barrel oil pool development is the outstanding oil event of 1949 in Texas, Railroad Commission Member Ernest O. Thompson said yesterday. In a press memorandum reviewing the Texas oil situation at year's end, Thompson found that "the one good thing about the oil picture is that there certainly is no shortage."  
 With Texas production sharply curtailed because of slackened market demand, Thompson had this to say:  
 "With imports reported on the increase and our oil exports on the decline, the prospects for 1950 do not look very bright for the oil producer."  
 He said the reported 20 per cent recovery of oil in place in the Scurry County pool was very conservative and declared an increase in the percentage of recovery should be possible.  
 Thompson said the latest big oil discovery in Texas now covers 40 to 45 thousand acres, with the north and south ends still open.

**BIPARTISAN POLICY LAUDED**

**Ives Scores Administration's Handling Of Foreign Affairs**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22. (AP)—Sen. Ives (R-NY) said today the best sign the bipartisan foreign policy is effective lies "in the mess the administration has made in handling affairs where it doesn't apply."  
 In an interview, Ives criticized the administration's decisions on Nationalist China and some of its actions with regard to Israel.  
 Both, he said, are outside the scope of the bipartisan foreign policy which Sen. Vandenberg (R-Mich) defined yesterday as "a mutual effort under our indispensable two-party system to unite our official voice at the water's edge."  
 Vandenberg said he expects to continue support of the policy in the next session of Congress. He added that every impending decision must be "totally debated" in Congress before it becomes final.  
 Ives said he has no doubt that party colleagues will take advantage of this opening to make some vigorous attacks on this government's failure to keep the Nationalists in power in China.  
 He said the continuing disension involving Israel also merited attention.  
 Vandenberg apparently foresaw something of the sort in laying down the conditions under which he might support recognition of the Chinese Communist Government.  
 The Michigan senator said that government would have to demonstrate that it controls all of China and would have to show—in some way he didn't specify—that it will observe international law. He said that applied to treatment of diplomats.  
 Vandenberg's assertion that the Chinese Communists don't now meet those requirements left Sen. Knowland (R-Calif) and other critics of the administration's China policies free to toe off.  
 Similarly, Vandenberg's observa-

tion that he always has favored full diplomatic recognition of Spain may spur many of his GOP colleagues to renew demands in this direction.  
 The administration has been under heavy fire from some Democratic lawmakers, particularly from the cotton-growing South, to take steps which will make it easier for Americans to sell their wares in Spain. But thus far the Export-Import bank has rejected Franco's overtures for a loan.  
 While Vandenberg was fairly specific on foreign issues, he lapsed into generalities when he stated an objective for the Republican Party:  
 "To restore the American system to safe foundations before it is too late and to gear dependable progress with national solvency and individual freedom."  
 This smacked of recent Republican attacks on the "hand-out" state which Sen. Taft (R-Ohio) says the administration wants to bring to America. It fitted the groove of Republican demands that the government stay within its income.

**Robot 'Saboteurs' In Enemy City To Steer Guided Missiles Seen**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Military scientists are considering the possibility of planting robot electronic "saboteurs" in an enemy city to steer a guided missile to a target.

A hint of this was contained in a pamphlet issued today by the Defense Department's research and development board. It is a new edition of the "Glossary of Guided Missile Terms."

The reference was tucked away in a technically-phrased discussion of "semiautomatic guidance" in which a missile seeks out a target which has been "illuminated from a source other than the missile."

As untangled from such complex phrasing in explanation by one expert, this means that a missile follows a radar beam from a transmitter either located in, or pointed at, a city or factory. In the case of pointing, the radar beam is aimed at the target and reflected off at an angle. The missile would "ride" the beam of this reflected radar impulse and then blast the target with an atomic or conventional warhead.

The "suitcase" transmitter to illuminate the target for the electronic eyes of the approaching missile could be deposited by agents. However, variations of this plan also are possible, among them the use of a "pathfinder" plane to fly high above and beyond an enemy city. A whole fleet of missiles could be headed for the target, following a radar beam sent back across the target by the pathfinder plane.

Scientists are making progress toward development of missiles which will reach across oceans or continents, but there has been less progress toward attaining a missile which could pinpoint even a large city at those ranges. In the final phase of flight, a device to "home" the missile to the exact target will be required.

**SLAIN WOMAN ANIMAL TRAINER'S SON PLANNING TO TAKE OVER ACT**

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif., Dec. 22 (AP)—True to circus tradition, an 18-year-old boy who endangered his own life in a futile attempt to save his mother from death in the jaws of a lion will take over her animal act.

"Mother was training the act for me and I know she would want me to go through with it now that she's gone," explained grief-stricken Michael Kovar.

Mrs. Kay Kovar Schafer, 42, widely known animal trainer, was "breaking" a powerful and newly-acquired lion named Sultan, when the beast sprang at her and bit her in the neck, severing the spine.

Michael and his sister, May, 14, rushed into the cage and tried to beat the enraged animal off with clubs. But the lion ignored them.

An elephant trainer, Rudy Muller, 59, ran to their aid and stunned the animal with a blow from a heavy pipe. He dragged Mrs. Schafer out of the cage but she was dead when a doctor arrived.

That was on Tuesday. Yesterday her husband, Fred Schafer, 44, also an animal trainer, reached here by plane from Fort Worth.

"If I had been here this never would have happened," he mourned.

DALLAS, Dec. 22 (AP)—Fred Estes of Grand Prairie was released yesterday on \$1,000 bond until the U. S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals rules in his case.

He was jailed Monday for contempt of court by Federal District Judge W. H. Atwell of Dallas.

The judge held Estes refused to obey an order that Estes tell immigration officials anything he knew about possible Communist connections of seven Dallas aliens seeking U. S. citizenship. Atwell gave Estes a \$100 fine and 30 days in jail.
