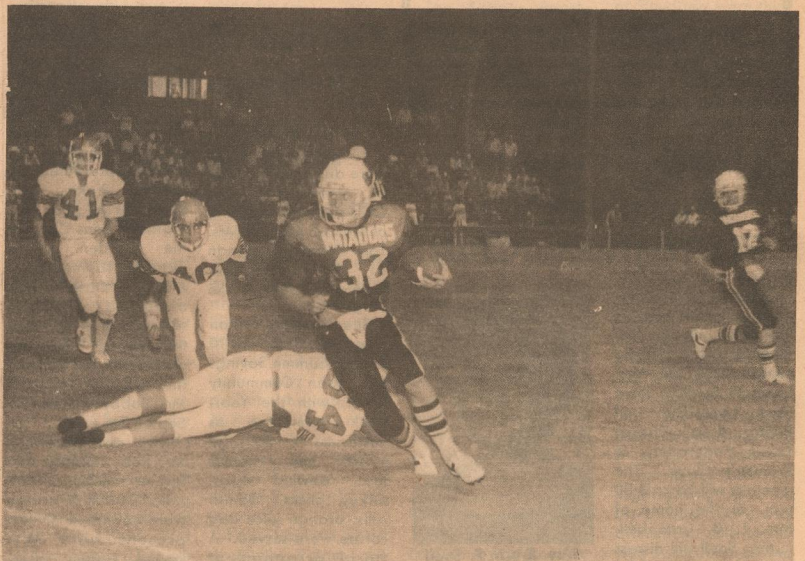

Matadors Crush Owls During Impressive Show

The Motley County Matadors blanked the Silverton Owls 28-0 last Friday night, ending the Owls undefeated season, and moving their own record to 2-1 for the year.

The teams exchanged punts the first time each got the ball, then Silverton put together a drive on their own 45 and marched to the MC 19 in nine plays. But at that point the Owls fumbled and Joe Zarate covered it for the Matadors.

"We started the game slow and Silverton was fired up," Coach Danny Williams said. "Our offense and defense was not playing up to their best ability in the first quarter."

Silverton Coach Marvin Self said the Owls matched MC play for play in the first quarter, but "We just could not stop Shannon in the second. We held

Shannon to 167 yards, the least he has been able to gain this season. They are as tough as nails. You watch, there is going to be some upsets with this team. They play tough ball."

In the second quarter, with 10:54 left, Shannon ran 79 yards to the end zone, but the play was called back on a penalty. But three plays later he scampers 61 yards for a touchdown. The extra point was good.

Brent Campbell ended another Owl drive on the Silverton 19 when he recovered a fumble for MC. Behind the running of Shawn Bearden and Bill Luckett the Matadors moved to the five yard line where Shannon took it in for another TD with four minutes left in the half. Bearden hit Campbell with a pass in the end zone for the two point conversion and MC led 14-0.

The Matadors received to start the second half and began play on their own 42. Junior back Darrell Moore and Senior Luckett were instrumental in a drive which moved the ball to the two yard line in nine plays, then Luckett crashed in for a TD, with 7:32 remaining in the third quarter. Shannon kicked the extra point to give the Matadors a 21-0 lead.

MC held Silverton on the next series but fumbled a punt return, giving the Owls a first down on the Matadors 40. A pass completion and roughing the passer penalty gave the Owls another first down on the 15. The Owls couldn't move forward, and the MC defense pushed them back to the 25 where the ball went over on downs to MC.

Second Glance

In a letter to the Motley County Farm Bureau, the members were encouraged to help support Proposition Three of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted on in the General Election, November 2, 1982.

The message read: "Proposition Three, the Constitutional amendment to exempt agricultural machinery and equipment from property taxes, needs your help."

"This amendment must pass by a strong vote as a message to the Legislature as to how voters feel about tax exemption for farmers and ranchers. It will have an effect on all our efforts during the next Legislative Session. It will provide tax reduction of \$2

million now and tax prevention of up to \$10 million per year in the future.

"What can you do to help? Most votes will be cast in the big cities. We cannot assume that voters in large cities understand or favor a tax exemption for agricultural machinery and equipment. Be sure everyone in the county votes to offset the metropolitan vote."

Strake Talk

CRIME: IT'S THE VICTIMS WHO ARE LOCKED UP

I want to talk to you this week about an issue that troubles me greatly and which I know is of great concern to Texans. It seems that whenever I have spoken about crime in the past 12 months I have gotten a strong and troubled response. No matter where I am—Jewett, Roma or Dalhart—people tell me they are angry and afraid about crime in our state.

This anger and fear concerns me for two reasons. First, because this kind of anger and fear serves as a sort of "jail" for innocent people. They are the ones locked in their homes at night while criminals go free. The second reason I am concerned is because unless something is done to stop the crime epidemic, people will be ripe for the kind of politician who will play on citizens' fears. The result could be that Texans lose their liberty in return for their "safety." In that sense, the crime problem is like a cancer gnawing at democracy.

The incumbent Lt. Governor's response to the crime issue has been shameful. While

he has been in office the crime rate has risen 131%. He has done nothing to attack crime in a substantial way. In fact, he has fought stronger anti-crime measures. He openly opposed the new wiretapping law designed to catch drug dealers.

He openly opposed the Governor's anti-crime package by putting it in a legislative committee run by a hostile Senator, who promptly bottled it up. Much of the package passed anyway and now Mr. Hobby has the gall to go around the state taking credit for it!

His sympathies in the fight against crime are evident. Not long ago he allowed the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) to hold a fundraiser in his Houston mansion and he proudly defends it. The ACLU has consistently opposed laws that would make it easier to deal with the crime problem.

I think such two-faced maneuvering is disgraceful. It is obvious that if we are going to attack the crime problem, if we are ever going to give law officers, judges and prison guards the tools they need to make us safer, Bill Hobby will have to go.

General Increase Filed For WTU Rates

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a general increase in its rates for retail customers.

The official application was filed Monday, September 13, 1982 in incorporated towns which have retained local jurisdiction over electric rates and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for customers in rural areas, unincorporated towns and in 13 towns which have ceded jurisdiction. Matador and Roaring Springs are two of the towns which has ceded jurisdiction and will depend on the PUC to handle its case.

The principal reasons cited for the request were the cost of WTU's construction program, high interest rates and the effects of general inflation on the cost of providing service.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total retail revenue of \$20,404,166. This amounts to 9.4 per cent.

No major changes in rate structure are proposed except for some adjustments of allocations among customer classes. For residential customers, the average electric bill, including fuel costs, would go up by about

10 per cent, although the actual increase would vary with the amount of usage.

WTU's last rate case was filed in the fall of 1981 and settled early in 1982 without a hearing and for an amount considerably less than had been requested. WTU had asked for 15.2 per cent but received 8.3 per cent. Company officials said at that time that another increase probably would be necessary within the year.

The Company had to spend over \$55 million this past year on new construction and must spend even more in the years immediately ahead to assure a continued reliable supply of electricity. The construction program includes a new coal-fired power plant of Oklaunion, as well as new transmission lines and distribution facilities over the system.

WTU built its last power plant in 1977 and since then has been able to lag behind most other utility companies in new construction and in rate increases. A recent survey by the Public Utility Commission of Texas shows that WTU's customer bills are lower than the state and national averages.

MARE/FOAL CLINIC PLANNED FOR THROCKMORTON

Horse producers across the Rolling Plains will hear the latest information from a faculty of experts at the Rolling Plains Mare/Foal Clinic, Thursday, September 30 at the R. A. Brown Ranch west of Throckmorton.

The program will focus upon economical breeding and reproduction programs and health care, and should be of interest to anyone involved in horse production.

The clinic is being sponsored by the Rolling Plains Economic Program, a regional economic development effort under guidance of the Extension Service. Registration begins at 9 a.m. with sessions starting at 9:30 a.m. and concluding at 4 p.m. A registration fee of \$10 includes a lunch and printed proceedings.

Advance registration by September 24 is requested in order to plan the luncheon. To register, send your name and address with a check for \$10 to Dr. William W. Smith, TAEX, Box 2159, Vernon, Texas 76384-2159. Checks should be made payable to Rolling Plains Economic Program.

Following a welcome from host rancher Rob Brown, Dr. Doug Householder, Extension horse specialist from College Station, will discuss economical programs for feeding broodmares in ranching situations. Factors affecting reproduction in mares under extensive management conditions will be examined by Dr. Jack Kreider, associate professor of animal science at Texas A&M University, College Station.

A panel of Rolling Plains horse producers will discuss ranch pasture breeding programs. Panel members will be Wes O'Neal of the Waggoner Ranch, Vernon; Brown; Bob Moorhouse, Pitchfork Ranch, Guthrie; and John Gaither, 6666 Ranch, Guthrie. B. F. Yeates, Extension horse specialist, College Station, will moderate.

Body condition scoring of broodmares will be discussed by Yeates. Live animals will be used, and during the lunch break participants will have an opportunity to score a group of broodmares. Official scores will be given by a panel at the beginning of the afternoon session.

Health programs for broodmares and foals

will be presented by Dr. Mike Ward, Bowie veterinarian. Practical supplemental (creep) feeding and weaning systems for foals will be presented by Dr. Gary Potter, professor of animal science at A&M.

Dr. Jim Heird, associate professor at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, will discuss the importance of early life experiences on foals and will demonstrate handling techniques.

A demonstration of foal trimming and a discussion of the care of feet and legs of mares and foals will be presented by Burney Chapman of Lubbock, professional farrier. Smith will summarize the sessions.

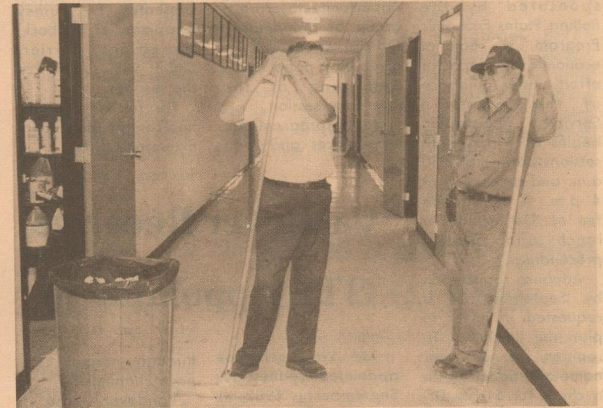
