Stanley Brooks Promoted To Game Warden Captain

The only game warden ever stationed in Dumas, Stanley Brooks, formerly of Roaring Springs, has been promoted to the rank of captain and will assume duties with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Austin next month.

For almost 16 years, Brooks has policed sportsmen in Moore and Sherman counties and has mixed feelings about leaving the area.

"Leaving here is the hardest decision I ever had to make. But, the promotion is too good an opportunity to pass up," he says.

Brooks will be one of five captains in the TP&WD Austin headquarters and will oversee trapping regulations, protection of non-game and endangered species and the newly-legislated "Operation Game Thief" program.

"It's more of a coordinator type job," reports the veteran game warden. "I will work on new legislation and statistics in my area and spend a lot of my time working with legislative committees in the area I'll be coordinating."

In short, Brooks is going to trade his uniform for a suit, tie and briefcase.

"It's going to be quite a change, moving from the field to an office," he notes.

Brooks served two hitches in the U.S. Army, getting drafted, discharged and recalled.

His first tour, for two years, was with the Second Armored Cavalry patrolling 60 miles of border between Czechoslovakia and West Germany.

Brooks was discharged in 1961, but was recalled three months later into the 49th Armored Division just prior to the building of the Berlin Wall.

"I was dug in on the border on August 13, 1961 when the wall was built. Russian troops were on the other side of the border and has

us outnumbered," he recalls.

His second tour of duty was for a year.

Shortly after completing his army duty, Brooks joined the TP&WD as a game warden at Vega. He quit the department for six months in 1966 to become an agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation, but did not like the Washington, D.C., area.

The veteran game warden went back to work with the Texas department after his FBI stint, was stationed at Seminole for a short time then was transferred to Dumas.

Brooks is the only game warden ever stationed to Dumas and reports that his assignment was based on an increasing population of pheasant and quail in Moore and Sherman counties and the opening of Lake Meredith in 1965.

In 1979, Brooks helped form the Texas Game Warden Association and was elected its charter president. He is currently serving on the organization's board of directors as immediate past-president.

The Dumas warden also worked to get the new "Operation Game Thief" program started this year. The program,

which pays cash rewards for information leading to the arrest and conviction of game violators, was passed by the last session of the Texas Legislature.

"I spent a lot of time on the road to Austin working on legislation during the last session," he says.

Brooks, who was rated a Warden II, skipped the rank of lieutenant in his promotion to captain.

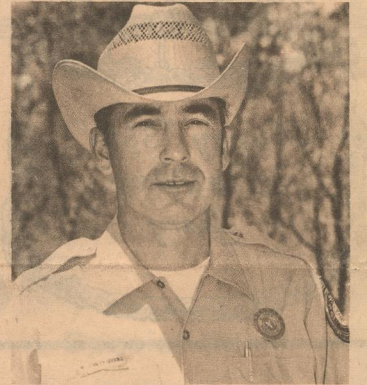
The promotion makes the veteran game warden one of only 15 captains in the department. Five of the captains are at the Austin headquarters and 10 are assigned in the field.

Only two TP&WD officials outrank a captain, a major and the department director.

"I've known about the promotion for a couple of weeks, but decided to take it this week," the 20-year department veteran says.

No replacement has yet been named for the Dumas area.

Brooks and his wife, the former Janie Waybourn of Matador, have three sons, James, 20, Barry, 15, and Quinn, 12. The family will not move to Austin until sometime after



Captain Stanley Brooks

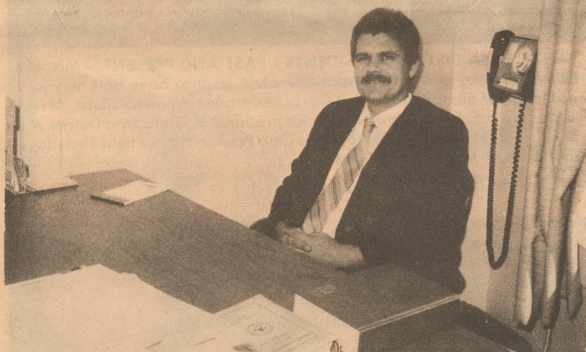

The Association will furnish the drinks, plates and silverware.

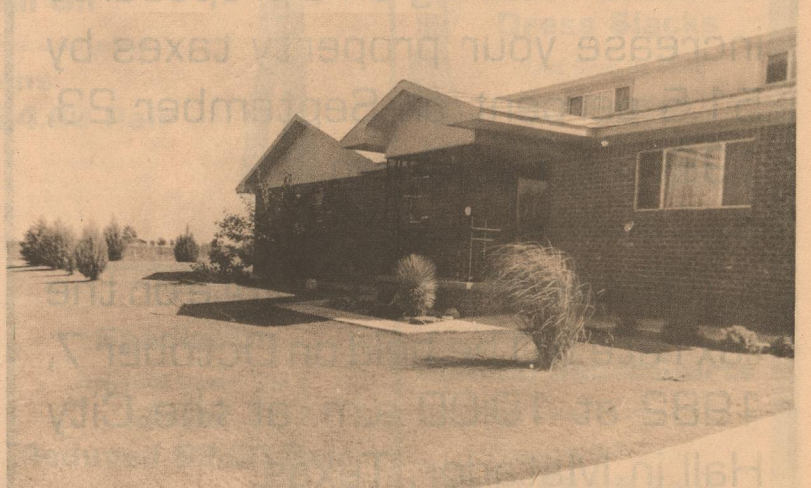
EMT's View Demonstration Of Anti-Shock Trousers

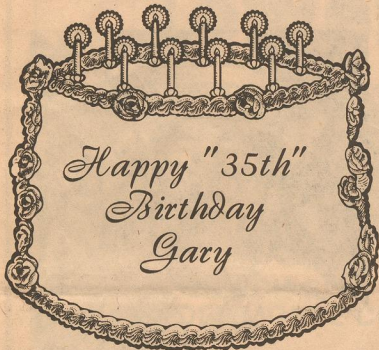
The program followed an enjoyable meal served by women of the Methodist Young Adults Sunday School class, for which, Boss Lion Donnie Jackson led an applause.

October Is Designated As National Stamp Collecting Month

"Discover Stamp Collecting - The Hobby of a Lifetime," is the theme of the second annual National Stamp Collecting Month, to be observed October 1-31, 1982, Postmaster Nell Clem, of Matador, said today.

"The fall observance will include issuance of a special souvenir card, unusual post office lobby displays and a number of new philatelic items especially designed to attract newcomers to the hobby," Postmaster Clem continued.

"Millions of Americans recognize that stamp collecting generates increased knowledge of geography, history and science. Children who engage in this hobby have a good time acquiring new or used stamps, and the hobby stimulates their intellectual growth. Teachers tell us that boys and girls frequently use their stamp collecting information in preparing and presenting class projects, especially American history, current events and science."

The Postal Service is sponsoring the month-long observance in cooperation with the

Council of Philatelic Organizations (COPO) which includes over 200 national, regional and local organizations involved in all aspects of stamp collecting. A number of local collateral activities are also being planned by Matador adult and youth stamp clubs, school and library administrators, community service organizations and government leaders.

Your local post office will have on display many of this year's program support materials that graphically demonstrate how stamps help sometimes dry educational subjects like old world explorers, black heritage and space achievement come alive and become easier to learn in the classroom.

"An adult who introduces a youngster to the hobby is giving that child a lifetime gift," Postmaster Clem said, "because stamp collecting does not depend on age, stamina or the weather."

"Many families treasure stamp collections, work on them together, and pass them along as family heirlooms from genera-

tion to generation. In an age when all too many of us spend our leisure time solely as spectators, stamp collecting is a hobby in which everyone can participate. That's the

message the Postal Service wants to get across in October during National Stamp Collecting Month," Postmaster Clem concluded.

THREE ADMIT RUMOR SPREADING WAS WRONG

Three persons recently admitted that they were wrong to have associated the Procter & Gamble company with satanism and to have encouraged others to stop buying P&G products.

The three have signed agreements not to spread the false rumors. As a result, P&G dropped charges it had filed against them in Federal Court. The company said it is still pursuing three other similar lawsuits, and added additional suits are possible.

"Our sole purpose in filing these lawsuits was to stop the spread of false and malicious stories about our company's moon and stars trademark," said P&G spokesman Donald Tassone. "Since these people have publicly stated they were wrong to have believed and spread the rumors, there is nothing to be gained by continuing these two lawsuits, and they are being concluded."

Tassone said in the past seven weeks, telephone calls to the company about the trademark have decreased dramatically, and the decline is continuing.

"It's apparent that the problem is diminishing as

people involved become aware of the facts," the spokesman said.

P&G went on the offensive in June to stop false stories linking its century-old trademark with devil worship. The company attributes part of its success in putting down the rumors to the public support it received from several nationally prominent religious leaders.

The Reverend Billy Graham said, "I urge Christians everywhere to reject these false rumors." The Reverend Jerry Falwell and others also have called for an end to the false statements.

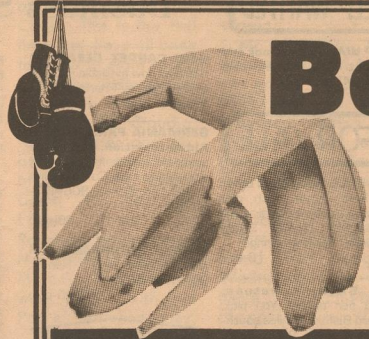
