Matadors Grab Big Victory In First District Game

The Motley County Matadors showed how good they are this year when they defeated a tough Crowell team 36-7 last

Crowell team 36-/ last Friday night. "We had a good game against Cro-well," Coach Danny Williams said. "They were pretty good but

we tired them out."
With 4:53 left in the first quarter Darrell Moore put the Matadors on the scoreboard with a four yard run, but the extra point try was blocked. In the second

In the second quarter Tim Shannon scored a touchdown with 8:22 left in the half, and Moore

scored the two point conversion, and MC led 14-0.

led 14-0.
Then Crowell struck. They scored on a 60 yard pass play and kicked the extra to close the gap to 14-

Shannon broke away before halftime and scored again on a 26 yard run, with 3:36 left, and then he kicked the extra point putting MC out in front 28-7.

MC's final score came in the 4th quarter when quarterback Shawn Bearden threw an eight yard TD pass to Max Bearden with 5:01 left in the game. Shawn hit Max again for the two

point conversion,

making the score 36-7.
"Offensive players
of the week were Roy Thompson, John Russell, Max Bearden and Tim Shannon," Coach Williams said. John "Defensive players were Darrell Moore, Coke Barton, Shawn Coke Barton, Shawn

Shannon rushed 34
times for 260 yards,
three TD's and kicked

three ID's and kicked two extra points. Darrell Moore carried 10 times for 24 yards, with some big gains called back on penalties. Moore scored one TD and one two point conversion.

The offense had a total of 323 yards.

Paul Hobby, son of Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby, stopped in Matador Tuesday during a campaign swing through the Panhandle for his fathor father. A graduate of Virginia University, Paul played linebackraul played lineback-er for them and was president of Delta Kappa Epsilon fra-ternity his senior year. "I am traveling across Texas, listen-ing to the people, and

ing to the people, and relaying their concern about the future of to the Lt. Governor," Paul said.

In 1972 Bill Hobby won the Democratic nomination for Lieutenant Governor against a large field of candidates and then was elected to a two wear term that year term that November. He was reelected overwhelmingly to four-year terms in 1974 and 1978.

In his present office he has served as the chairman of the National Conference of Lieutenant Gover-nors and on the Council of State Governments. His additional state responsibilities include chairmanship of the Legislative Budget Board, which submits spending recommendations to the Legislature, and the Texas Legislative Council, which conducts research on legislation. He is cochairman of the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council. additional state

Council.

This year he is a member of a legisla-

tive committee con-ducting a full-scale study on improve-ment of law enforce-

Another such interim panel -- the Special Committee on Higher Education Financing -- led to one of Hobby's most recent accomplishments. As chairman of that committee he helped mold a pro-gram for higher education that includ-ed faculty salary improvements to offset a 17% drop in purchasing power during the last

decade.

As presiding officer of the Senate and a skilled legislator in his own right, Hobby has own right, Hobby has given public and higher education first-priority throughout his service. More than half of the state's tax dollar is now devoted to education. Hobby has placed equal See Hobby Page 9

Hobby led the fight to keep Texas highways the best in the nation and help the state's fast-growing cities cope with the state's fast-growing cities cope with the traffic congestion and traffic congestion and inadequate arteries and bridges. He was one of the first state officials to warn of an "inhumane and dangerous situation" in Texas prisons because of severe overcrowding. In the last legislative session he led efforts to fund two new units in the two new units in the Department of Cor-rections. Long recogrections. Long recognized as an expert on welfare reform, Hobby also has worked for better services for the handicapped and for older Texans. He has strongly supported. strongly supported more effective pro-grams for the mentally ill and the mentally retarded.






