Matadors Gentle Bronchos 22 to 14

A BELL RINGING in the early hours of Saturday morning announced the first 1970 victory for the Matador Matadors. It was the traditional victory bell at the First Baptist Church and being rung by students after their return from Meadow where the Matadors gentled the Bronchos 22 to 14.

The setup for the First Matador touchdown came when Lee Hurt carried the ball 29 yards to the Meadow 2 yard line. Quarterback Bill Barnhill plunged over from the 2 to give the Matadors an early lead. The try for extra points failed.

In the second quarter, Meadows' Melcher and Wilkes erased the Bronchos' zero on the scoreboard for 14 points. The half ended with a 14-6 score.

A cold north wind and a light mist didn't hamper the determined Matadors in the second half from drawing a tight rein on the Bronchos. Quarterback Barn-

hill dived between legs in the middle of the line to score a touchdown in the third quarter and again in the fourth quarter for the Matadors. He then finished the job with sparking keepers to score the extra points for a 22-14 Matador victory.

The Matadors' active defense made it possible for the offense to race inside, outside and through the Broncho lines for 17 first downs while holding Meadow to 6 Matadors' halfback Robert Elliott intercepted a Broncho pass and Bobby Simpson recovered a Broncho fumble. Barnhill gained the most yards with 84 and halfback Hurt hustled for a total of 78 yards. Other leading ground gainers for the Matadors were Kenneth Marshall with 54 yards, Donnie Jackson with 40 yards, and Robert Elliott with 20 yards.

The Matador Matadors will meet the undefeated Jayton Jaybirds here at Burleson Field Friday night at 8 o'clock.

A car-motorcycle crash at McAllen late Monday afternoon claimed the life of Daryle Fish, 18, and her companion, Preston Hal Coulter Jr., 22, both of McAllen.

Miss Fish is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Fish of McAllen, and a granddaughter of Matador residents, Mr. and Mrs. J. Farris Fish. She was a senior at McAllen High School.

Mr. and Mrs. Fish left early Tuesday for McAllen. They were accompanied by their housekeeper, Julia May Holt, due to Mrs. Fish's impaired health.

Other survivors include a sister, Darreese and a brother, James Alan, both of the home, and maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Gorman Fox of Raymondville.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in the First Methodist Church in McAllen. Officiating was the Rev. Charles Giesler, minister. Burial was in Roselawn Cemetery.

McAllen police said Miss Fish was a passenger on Coulter's motorcycle when it and a car driven by Kelly Owen Myers, 17, of McAllen collided at an intersection. The mishap occurred about 4:45 p.m., officers said.
