WTU Files For Change In Wholesale Rates

West Texas Utilities Company filed Monday for a change in wholesale rates for total requirements electric service it supplies to 14 rural electric cooperatives, one municipality and one investor-owned distribution company, and for partial requirements

electric service it supplies to two municipally owned electric systems.

In its filing with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, WTU proposes rates which will produce about \$2.1 million in additional revenue for the Company during the

1983 calendar year. This amounts to an increase of approximately three per cent from these wholesale customers.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective January 1, 1983. Present total requirements rates have been in effect

since February, 1982, and the partial requirements rates have been in effect since 1977. Except for the rate level, no other major changes were proposed.

WTU officials said the rate change is needed to bring the Company's revenues from whole-

sale customers to a level equal to the cost of providing service.

Harvey Stanford Is Fighting Greatest Battle Of His Life

Dear Leon:
In the Fall of 1932, Harvey G. Stanford came to Matador as our football coach. He came from Electra where he has served as head coach for some time.

In the next four years, he molded a bunch of rag-tag kids into one of the most outstanding football teams in this area, if not the state. In the fall of 1935, Matador played Hereford for the regional championship at Plainview, and defeated them. (I believe the score was 12-7; hopefully you may have an old Tribune account of the game in November, 1935.)

To those of us who know him, he is a legendary figure, and has been an inspiration to every boy he coached, as well as many others.

I know there are hundreds of your readers who will be interested in the clipping I received from Mrs. Stanford, recently, and ask that you use it in your paper.

The man is a legend in this town, even if he chooses not to admit it. For the people who have been in this area since the streets were dirt, Harvey Stanford should be listed in the Las Vegas book of Who's Who.

When Harvey Stanford coached football at Las Vegas High School from 1936-49, a host of local attorneys and doctors were then punk kids who fought the summer heat by sleeping in sprinklers at the train depot or by sneaking rides on Calientebound freight

trains.

And you say kids nowadays have nothing to do? When Harvey Stanford was the man of the town, you either created your own fun or went bananas. With a population of 10,000-15,000 there weren't enough people to start a small brawl.

In the summer of 1944, District Judge John Mendoza was preparing himself to be a halfback on Stanford's football team. Lawyer Bill Morris of the Holiday Casino was rated one of the toughest street fighter-linebackers in town and dentist Rhen Call was throwing passes instead of pulling teeth.

Even Mendoza's bailiff, Al Rivero, was in on the act. When he wasn't catching Call's passes off the single wing, he was setting pins at the bowling alley.

Stanford engineered a success story, both on and off the field. His football team went unbeaten. No other team tied him. Better yet, no other team even scored against him.

Myron Leavitt, now a candidate for the governor's seat, was a little running back who made a habit of getting himself bruised and beaten. He still challenges the big boys, taking on everyone from Gov. Robert List to Attorney General Richard Bryan.

Lanky end Tom Bell, now an attorney, was a kid who had the best hands in town. John Foley, another Las Vegas attorney, was on the team and so was a kid who went on to become a psychologist in Pasadena.

Brothers Al and Gene Matteucci, both local attorneys now, were linemen who probably

gave Leavitt fits during workouts. They took people the size of Leavitt and taught the respect.

Teams from Needles, Boulder City and Kingman were a piece of cake. San Bernardino, Calif., High School, a defending league champion, fell twice before finally canceling Stanford from further play. It was tough to schedule teams against Las Vegas High School in those days and Stanford had to go all the way to Santa Barbara, Calif., to find competition.

And if ever a team had reason to be fired, Stanford's team did after riding a bus to San Bernardino. However, when you live in this climate where swamp coolers are luxuries, you learn to be tough. You treat black eyes with raw meat and you work for Harvey Stanford until you don't think you can work anymore.

Respect and minor use of alcohol in football have been replaced by the use of cocaine and strikes. Harvey Stanford still gets respect when he says drugs are going to ruin the game.

When his old football players gather for reunions, they watch over their shoulders. When "Coach Stanford" walks through the doors, the cigarettes are put out and the booze is hidden. Respect is still evident on the team of '44, even if it isn't on many teams of '82.

It's been a long time since Harvey Stanford came here from Matador, to put the Las Vegas High School football team on the map. He's 78 years old and not many of his former players will

forget his birthday September 4.

The days have been tough for Harvey Stanford for the past few months. An "old back injury" failed to respond to treatment as was expected and the man is up against a battle tougher than the San Bernardino defense.

The "back injury" is worse than originally thought. Harvey Stanford is entangled in a war with the "Big C," otherwise known as cancer. He's spent 50 days in the hospital since last October. He's spent so much time fighting the "Big C" that he hasn't had time to have Call do his dental work.

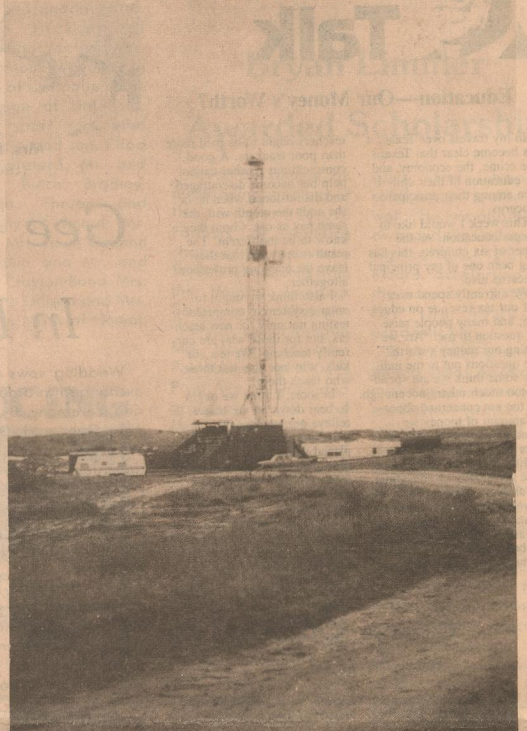
But Harvey Stanford isn't giving up, even though he's partially disabled. He walks one mile each day from his home on Franklin Avenue, even though he has pleuritis in his right leg. He says he's maintaining his weight and you won't see him feeling sorry for himself.

When the coaching staff of Las Vegas High School heard several months ago that Harvey Stanford was ill, they sent him a card. Harvey was surprised that people at LVHS still remembered him, considering that he hadn't coached at the school for more than 30 years.

But once you're a legend, you're always a legend. If you don't believe it, ask somebody like Bill Morris or Myron Leavitt or Tom Bell or...

Education—Our Money's Worth?

In my travels over Texas, it has become clear that Texans rate crime, the economy, and the education of their children among their principal concerns.

This week I would like to discuss education. As the father of six children, this has long been one of my principal concerns also.

We currently spend over half our tax revenue on education, and many people raise the question to me: "Are we getting our money's worth?" The questions put to me indicate some think we are spending too much; others, not enough.

I too am concerned about the amount of money we spend on education, but I am more concerned about the quality of that education. I believe the quality of education our children receive can be improved by making some fundamental changes in the way we pay and treat our teachers.

I believe in merit pay for teachers. Frankly, I think good

teachers ought to be paid more than poor teachers. A good, conscientious teacher cannot help but become discouraged and disillusioned when he or she ends the month with the same pay as one whom they know to be indifferent. The result is apt to be that they leave the teaching profession altogether.

I also think we ought to enter a system of competency testing not only for new teachers, but for those who are currently teaching. We test our kids, why not also test those who teach them?

In short, I think we ought to bear down on the basics, relieve our teachers of burdensome paper work now placed upon them, and recognize and reward our better teachers with better pay, for the sake of our children, and our future.

machine with which he was working came loose and struck the side of his head. It had been a direct hit it would have been instant death. He is reported to be recovering just fine.

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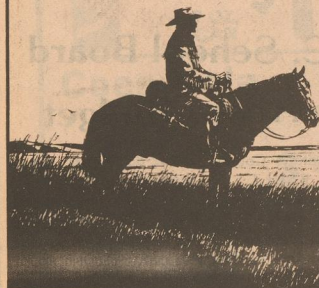

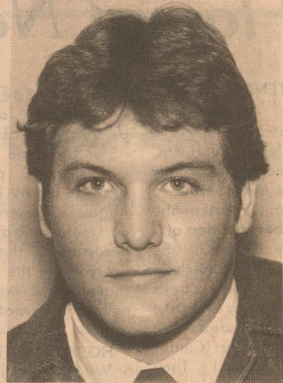
Monk Family Observes 35th Annual Reunion

Doug Terry, Edwaine Terry, Loys Campbell and Roy Stephens were on one team, and Alfred Barton, Jeff Thacker,

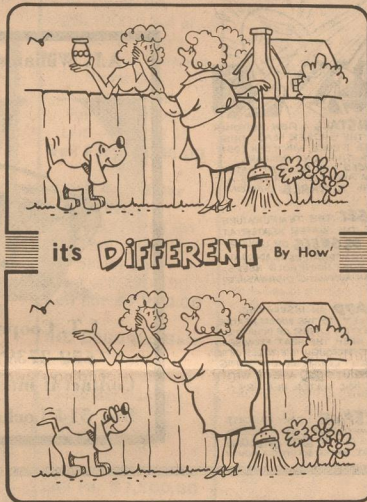
Jim Terry and Irma Terry of Quannah were on the second team.

72-Year Old Widow Searches For Lost Love

MATADOR, TX - It has been more than 50 years since that "nice fellow" took young Catherine Cornell Henderson out to the movies and serenaded her with "Springtime in the Rockies".

Mrs. Henderson, now 72 and a widow, has never forgotten Fred John Jock, a young Brooklyn soldier stationed in San Antonio in 1929.

"If you're not with the one you love, things just aren't as interesting," Mrs. Henderson said Tuesday.

"We got lost from each other. When you love somebody, you'll really hunt for them. He was a nice fellow".

Mrs. Henderson, a mail subscriber to the New York Post, recently included a note with her

subscription, asking the newspaper to help her locate Hock.

Mrs. Henderson told the Post she was only 20 and "just a plain old country hick" working in an ice cream parlor when she met Hock 53 years ago.

"He was 5 feet 10 inches tall with steely gray eyes and talked with a brogue" because his parents came from Germany, she said. "He always took me to the nicest places, even though I couldn't dance."

The last time they saw each other was Labor Day 1930, when she could not go with him to the boat races because she had to help her pregnant sister in

Bryan, Texas.

When the Army transferred him to New Jersey, she "was too embarrassed to try to follow or trace" him, she said.

Now, she looks after her garden and her dog in Matador, a small farming community about 60 miles north-east of Lubbock - an area she describes as "miles and miles of nothing but miles and miles," where "there's not much news unless someone's cow dies or a barn roof gets blown off."

Mrs. Henderson had hoped to trace Hock through his military records but she was told they were destroyed in a fire July 12, 1973.

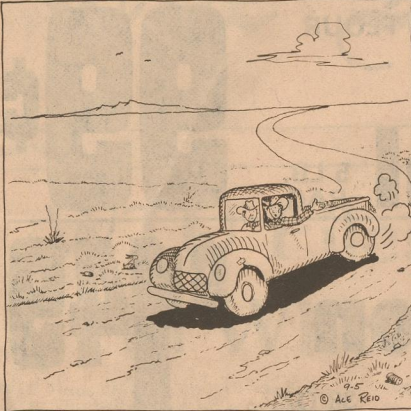
