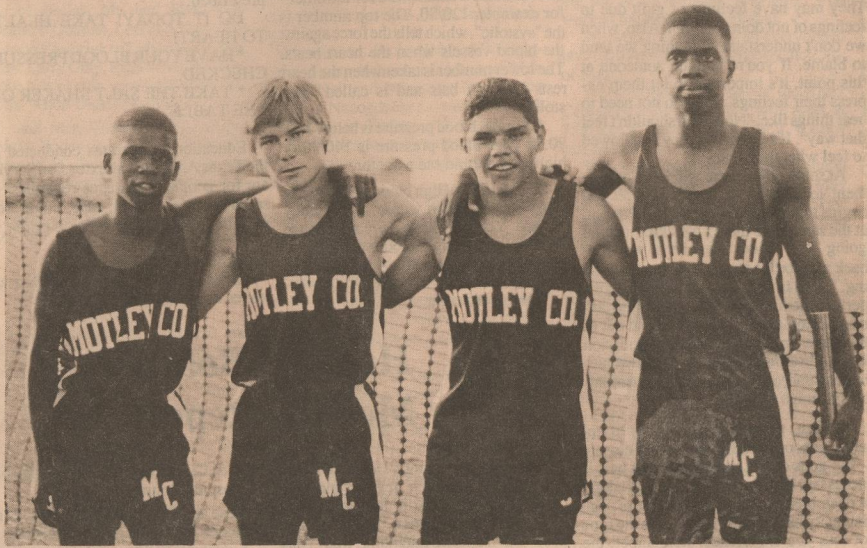

Relay Team Qualifies For State

The 400 meter relay team placed second at the Region 1-A Track Championship at South Plains College in Levelland. They came in behind a Memphis team which had set a regional record the day before. The relay team will run at Abilene this Friday in a State Qualifiers Meet. Then they will travel to Austin on

the 14th. Chris also placed fourth in the 100. Jennifer Beshirs placed seventh in the 1600 meter run. She had also participated in the 800 meter dash the day before. Kammia Pitts ran in the 200 meter dash.

Coach Jerry Bass stated, "I would like to take time to express my appreciation to

these fine group of athletes. They have worked extremely hard and put in time-less extra hours of practice. I would also like to thank the people from Matador who traveled to Levelland to show their support. It means a great deal for our athletes to hear you yelling for them."

School Board, Hospital Board Have New Members

A total of 371 voters turned out for the May 2nd election.

The School Board had three candidates for two places. Totals are as follows:

Jeff Thacker - total 316, absentee, 38, Matador, 156, Roaring Springs, 91, Flomot, 24, and Northfield, 7;

Bill Luckett - total 286, absentee, 30, Matador, 156, Roaring Springs, 72, Flomot, 23, and Northfield, 5;

Alvin Alexander - total 63, absentee, 9, Matador, 41, Roaring Springs, 10, Flomot, 3, Northfield, 0.

The Hospital Board had three places with 4 candidates, James Stanley, incumbent, total 270 votes, with 34 absentee, 146 Matador, 65 Roaring Springs, 20 Flomot, and 5 Northfield, Jo Ann Durham, 252 total, absentee 28, Matador 131, Roaring Springs 71, Flomot 17, Northfield 5; James Gillespie, 249 total, absentee 30, Matador 144, Roaring Springs 53, Flomot 20, Northfield, 2; Bob Davis, Incumbent, total 105, absentee 10, Matador 56, Roaring Springs, 33, Flomot 3, Northfield, 3.

The city elections had no opponents:

Matador Mayor, Gary Lancaster, 178 total, absentee 26, Matador 152; Council members, two places, Pete Williams, total 179, absentee 28, Matador 151; Shane Jones, 175 total, absentee 26 and Matador, 149.

Ninety-nine voters turned in Roaring Springs to re-elect Mayor Joey Thacker with 66 votes. Council members, two places with one candidate, Mary Webb, incumbent, had 53 total votes and Gene Brannon, write-in, had 36 votes. This place was open by Mark Wason, who did not run again.

The UTEP Women's Basketball office is pleased to announce the signing of Kathy Mangram, a 5-9 guard from Matador and a graduate of Motley County High School and Howard Junior College.

For Howard JC's team, ranked in the top 20 all season long, Miss Mangram, the team captain, started all 32 games, averaged 9.5 points per game, shot 45-percent from the field and shot 114 - of-251 from the floor. She also averaged 5.8 rebounds per game, with 101 offensive boards and 83 defensive, and had 72 assists.

Head coach Sandra Rushing said, "Kathy's a tremendous athlete. She can

run, jump and is exceptionally quick, plus she sports a 3.1 GPA and had an 800 on the SAT."

To emphasize Mangram's quickness, her 113 steals last year at Howard would have broken the UTEP single-season school record by 30.

One of the few surviving pair of hand-made boots made by Matador artisan Houston H. Schweitzer have been donated to the Motley County Museum by Dick Dirickson. With most of Schweitzer's efforts directed toward creating saddles, bridles, chaps and tack, he made only a few pairs of boots which are considered real collector items.

Worn by Mr. Dirickson for nearly thirty years, these "Sunday" boots have trod the dust at the World Championship Rodeo at Pendleton, Oregon, and Calgary, Canada, at the Calgary Stampede.

Still sporting original shoe leather after fifty-seven years, they have walked the gang plank on the Queen Mary, sailing from New York City to London, England on sightseeing jaunts by train that touched Holland, Belgium, Germany, Denmark, Sweden, Norway and across the North Sea to Scotland.

If these well traveled boots could talk, they would tell of walking on the white

beaches of the Caribbean and the Hawaiian Islands, and trekking across the burning sands of the Holy Lands, Athens, Greece, Turkey, and Egypt.

Mr. Dirickson tells of the time he and his friend Schweitzer were attending the Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show and Rodeo. Sightseeing on the streets of "Cowtown" they had spied some flashy blue boots in a shop window. During the rodeo's performance Dick slipped out and returned to the shop where he purchased the boots, replacing his Schweitzer-made pair with the blue ones. Nonchalantly, Dick took his seat at the rodeo and awaited his friend's reaction.

Before long Schweitzer noticed the switch but didn't say anything, just got up and moved about ten rows away. When questioned, the saddle maker replied that he wouldn't have anything to do with a fool that would buy a pair of boots like that.

In addition to the boots, Dirickson donated a maroon satin shirt which was worn by participants in the Shannon Davidson Day parade in 1939, which

Mental Health

GRIEF IS NOT AN EASY PROCESS. Grief is experienced by anyone who suffers a loss. The loss may be a death, job, status, self-esteem, divorce, moving, etc. There are normal reactions that can be expected.

Accepting the reality of a loss involves shock and a feeling of numbness. Shock helps us to be buffered from reality for awhile. If you're helping someone in this stage, it's best to just be there. They may ask a lot of questions about "Why?", but they are usually not ready for answers.

After a while they move into experiencing the pain. Lots of emotions are

evident. People are usually angry at others, God and those who tried to help. They may have feelings of guilt due to feelings of not doing enough. Also, when we don't understand something we tend to blame. If you're helping someone at this point, it's important to let them express their feelings. They do not need to hear things like, "Now, you shouldn't feel that way". It's important they be allowed to feel what they feel.

At some point, there will be an adjustment to change. A sense of direction begins to develop. There's a sadness but, at the same time there's a picking-up and going on. There may be a waiving back and forth between pain and adjusting. There is not a clear cut line where a person moves from one stage into another. People usually move in and out of the stages, making a steady progression toward healing. People in this state are normally accepting of encouragement and suggestions.

At last, there is a reinvesting of energy, a reconstruction, a sense of closure - life goes on. Letting go of the past is necessary in order to heal. It's like taking a deep breath and facing the future. The intensity of grief will depend on the type of loss you experience. Remember, the light at the end of the tunnel is not always an on-coming train!

Home Economically Speaking

MAY IS NATIONAL HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE MONTH...

- * get little or no exercise
- * eat foods that are high in salt
- * are under a lot of stress
- * use birth control pills.

Blood pressure is what causes blood to move through the blood vessels to all parts of your body. As your heart beats, the blood is pushed or forced along the blood vessels. Sometimes this push or force can become too strong. When this happens, you have high blood pressure (also called hypertension).

THE FACTS: You cannot usually tell if you have high blood pressure. There are no warning signs. It does not hurt, and you will not feel sick, dizzy, or nervous. Anyone can have it - tense people as well as relaxed people. The only way to know for sure if you have high blood pressure is to have a trained person check for it.

A blood pressure reading gives you two numbers written one over the other - for example, 120/80. The top number is the "systolic", which tells the force against the blood vessels when the heart beats. The lower number is taken when the heart rests between beats and is called "diastolic."

A normal blood pressure is below 140/90. If your blood pressure is 140/90 or higher, or should see a doctor.

THE RISKS: High blood pressure can cause strokes, heart attacks, and kidney disease. You may have a greater chance of developing high blood pressure or making it worse if you —

- * smoke
- * are overweight

WHAT YOU CAN DO: If you have high blood pressure readings, see a doctor. High blood pressure cannot be cured, but a doctor can help you keep it under control. The doctor may suggest that you do any or all of the following:

- * stop smoking
- * lose weight if you are overweight
- * use less salt
- use less salt in cooking
- leave the salt shaker off the table
- use spices and herbs for seasoning
- use fresh or frozen fruits and vegetables and those canned without added salt.
- * exercise
- * take your blood pressure pills as prescribed.

ASCS CONSUMER UPDATE

You've all heard talk in recent months that higher farm prices for wheat are forcing bread prices higher. Wheat prices did jump more than 50% from the low July 1991 price of \$2.47/bu. to the February 1992 price of \$3.78/bu. It would appear that this increase in wheat prices received by farmers would cause some increase in the price of bread. How much?

According to Jerry D. Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee, in 1990 a \$1 loaf of white bread contained just over 5 cents worth of wheat. So if the 1990/91 average price of \$2.61 for a bushel of wheat was doubled to \$5.22, that would give credence to raising bread prices by making the wheat in a loaf of bread worth a dime.

But wait, what happened when the price of wheat fell. Farm wheat prices in 1991 were 14.4% lower than in 1985, but

1991 bread prices were 31.7% higher than in 1985.

What does this mean? One should be wary of blaming the increase in bread prices on the nickel that wheat adds to breads price. In fact, between 1981 and 1991 the farm value of all farm commodities in the USDA "market basket" increased only 6% while retail prices of these commodities increased 45%.

Harris reminds consumers that USDA farm programs administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service continue to ensure all Americans an adequate supply of food and fiber at a reasonable price.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is the United States Department of Agriculture agency that administers farm programs passed by Congress. This includes programs that effect many local farmers and ranchers.

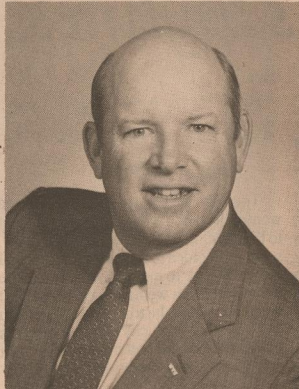
"We will continue to abide by that philosophy, as we strive to meet the credit

Huntsman Shares Experiences, Sends Flag To Museum

"Tally Ho!" was the cry when Geoff Parkes of Hinton Charterhouse, Bath, England, visited for a week with the Frank Potts family in late March. The Huntsman of the Huckworthy Hounds of Dorset shared his experiences of fox hunting while visiting and sightseeing in the area.

The Oxford graduate spoke to Lou Burleson's history classes at Floydada High School, struck up and acquaintance with another Dick Francis mystery fan, Glenn Woodff, and endured a sandstorm at the opening of the new circle track at Hub City Speedway in Lubbock.

Upon his return home Parkes, a thirty-two year old employee of a maritime ship design company, sent a packet to the Motley County Museum relating to the Scottish era of the Matador Land & Cattle Co. Received were a Union flag of the United Kingdom, maps of the Dundee and Forfarshire area, and magazines

Countyweek, Fox Hunting, and Hound. Parkes related "with immense relief" that during the recent election, 80% of the electorate went against all the opinion polls and defeated the Labour party which had, among other things, proposed a ban on fox hunting.

According to the former "forester," fox hunting serves a legitimate purpose by helping farmers keep the predator in check while supporting equestrian sports, a major industry in England.

Although no species is endangered or destroyed, the blood sport of fox hunting faced opposition from animal rights groups and possible legislation banning the field sport had the Labour part won the election.

Proponents argue that over 200 years of fox hunting has produced a keen and healthy adversary. Stemming from a need to cull the destructive fox from the countryside, fox hunting has strict rules and high standards that assure, if caught, the fox is afforded a swift and honorable

death.

With a population that is primarily urban and insulated from the real animal world by "cling wrap," fox hunting, once the sport only for the rich, is now popular with millions in all walks of life. Serving as a nursery for equestrian sports, fox hunting is very much a social occasion, involving those that ride, those that follow the pack on foot, and those who just come out for the day.

One of the reasons it is important for fox hunters to have horses that jump hedges and fences bordering pastures and farms is to keep up with the pack of trailing hounds. Riders that must go through gates miss out on the action.

Many Englishmen believe that fox hunting is a matter of individual choice which should not require parliamentary action. They contend it is no more necessary to eat meat, than to hunt, shoot, or fish. If one is banned, all are likely to follow.

Since the beautiful British countryside is primarily a man-made landscape, dependent upon continued well-being of its grangers, some express the opinion that it is "the country dweller who feels part of an endangered species." Though separated by an ocean, this is a sentiment with which the farmers and ranchers of Motley County readily identify!



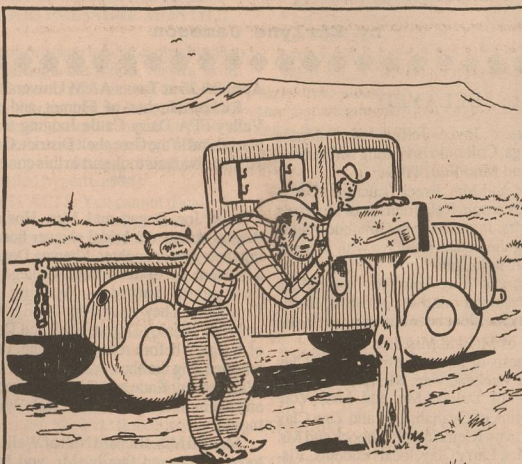
