Texas Congressional Delegation Commended For Defense Leadership

As the first session of the 98th Congress drew to a close, The American Security Council and its Coalition for Peace Through Strength commended the Texas Congressional delegation for its strong support of the rebuilding of America's national security. John M. Fisher, President of the American Security Council said, "The support of members of both parties in the Texas delegation for a national strategy of Peace Through Strength reiterate the fact that a strong America is a secure America. Weakness only invites aggression".

The Council cited the leadership of such Members of Congress as Representative Phil Gramm and Senator John Tower, both of whom scored 100 percent marks in the Council's annual ratings on defense and national security issues. Tower is chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. Gramm holds a seat on the House Budget Committee and serves as the only Texas congressional co-chairman of the Coalition for Peace Through Strength.

Gramm was praised for his long standing, staunch support on defense issues in general and in particular for authoring the two Gramm-Latta

budgets "which re-ordered national priorities and took the first steps toward rebuilding American national security."

Tower was credited with having been the architect of the defense authorization measures that improved pay and working conditions and which provided the weapons for America's military to deter aggression and guarantee world peace.

The American Security Council has given the Texas delegation generally high marks in its annual ratings on defense issues, with seven current Texas Congressmen drawing

perfect 100 percent scores for the most recent rating period. They are Democrats Ralph Hall, Marvin Leath and Abraham Kazen, and Republicans Bill Archer, Jack Fields, Phil Gramm and Tom Loeffler.

Republican Senator John Tower received 100 percent and Democratic Senator Lloyd Bentsen scored 88 percent.

Only two Texans in Congress scored lower than 65 percent -- Republican Ron Paul who was rated at 10 percent, and Democrat Mickey Leland, who drew a zero rating.

Caution Urged For Customers Who Use Butane And Propane

In local communities, liquified petroleum gas (LPG) continues to be a main source of fuel for heating homes. As winter approaches, the Railroad Commission's LPG Division has issued a warning to LP gas users and dealers concerning unprotected and improperly positioned regulators on home propane and butane tanks.

The regulator should be located underneath the protective dome cover of the tank. Each regulator has a small vent opening which must be kept free of dust, dirt, insects, rain,

or snow.

Whenever the regulator vent is blocked by an accumulation of debris or frozen precipitation, it can be disabled, allowing 200 pounds of pressure from the tank to shoot into home appliances.

This sudden force causes 3/4" flame to become a two or three foot torch igniting walls, furniture, drapes, or whatever is nearby.

During the summer months, the tank's dome area provides a perfect nesting spot for wasps, hornets, and mud daubers. These pesky insects are

He also has held offices of chief and president of the fire department, and has been president of the Matador Water Board. He also is a past-president of the Lions Club, has held all local offices in the Masonic Lodge and been a

Scout Master.

Turner comes to Matador after over seven years at Quitaque and 16 years with WTU. A native of Wheeler, he worked for WTU in Vernon and Shamrock before moving to Quitaque.

Everyone is invited to take advantage of these longer shopping hours and various special prices.




Jeanette Robison Robison Joins Firm

Bible holds many answers

ONE OF our most respected psychiatrists, Dr. Smiley Blanton, was an avid Bible scholar.

When a new patient expressed surprise at a psychiatrist reading the Bible, Dr. Blanton said, "It's the greatest textbook on human behavior ever put together. If people would just absorb its message, a lot of us psychiatrists could close our offices and go fishing."

"Take your own case," the Dr. said. "If you really have tried every possible solution, Biblical advice would be, 'Having done all, stand.'"

According to the Dr. that means let God and your subconscious mind take over—

but quit worrying about it.

Dr. Blanton said, "It does seem foolish not to make use of the distilled wisdom of 3000 years. Centuries before psychiatry, the Bible said, 'The kingdom of God is within you.' Psychiatrists call it the unconscious mind. But only the words are new, not the concept."

Then the Dr. gives a few of his favorite passages: UNDERNEATH ARE THE EVERLASTING ARMS. He reminds us a baby is born with the fear of falling and a desperate need for the human touch.

His prescription is to recite that divine promise at bedtime, and "you may find it

more effective than any sleeping pill."

LOVE THY NEIGHBOR AS THYSELF. "Lack of self-esteem is probably the most common emotional ailment I am called upon to treat."

Though impossible to undo the deeds causing their guilt, the Dr. encourages his patients to ask God's forgiveness, make amends if possible—then forgive themselves and get on with their lives.

"Do you love God and your neighbor?" the Dr. asks. "Then you are not likely to need a psychiatrist."

The doctor's favorite passage is: AND YE SHALL KNOW THE TRUTH AND THE TRUTH SHALL

MAKE YOU FREE. Nine times out of ten, when people come to me tormented by guilt, racked by anxiety, and exhausted by unresolved hate, it is because they do not know the truth about themselves."

It's the psychiatrist's job to help them find that truth. "Once insight is gained, the cure can begin—because the truth DOES make you free."

(It's quite possible, of course, that your best friend could give you that same information—for free.)

"The Bible," says Dr. Blanton, "is a book that for 3000 years has been a help in time of trouble to any person wise enough to use it."

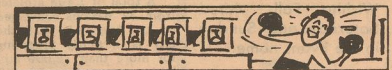

County Agent's Corner

The first Rolling Plains Area Cotton Show has been set for December 6 and 7 at the Abilene Civic Center. The show, sponsored by the Extension Districts 3 and 7 is billed as the first of its kind in the state or nation. Cotton will be highlighted in all of its phases from production to consumer utilization.

A major feature of the two day event will be the cotton show with possible entries coming from a thirty-county area from Wichita Falls to San Angelo. The

winner of the 1983 show will receive one ton of certified cotton seed valued at \$1,200, courtesy of G&P Seed Co.

Motley County has two entries in the contest, one from the Caldwell Smith farm in the Roaring Springs area, and also Joe Edd Helms in the Flomot area.

Some news of interest to ranchers with brush problems is the cancellation of registration for the uses of 2,4,5-T, and Silvex. These are two key chemicals used in controlling brush in Texas.

On October 18, 1983, the EPA published in the Federal Register a notice of intent to cancel all remaining nonsuspended registrations of the herbicides 2,4,5-T, and Silvex. The EPA will

permit the continued distribution and sale of existing stocks of 2,4,5-T, and Silvex for one year from the date of cancellation.

Work is being done to obtain registrations for two herbicides for use on rangeland that could replace 2,4,5-T, and Silvex.

Also of interest to cattlemen is the new Pinkeye Vaccine that has shown to be very effective. An injectable way to castrate calves has also been developed. The procedure is shown to be 100% effective on young calves.

We hope to be able to conduct result demonstrations on these two new products in Motley County this coming year. If you would like to co-operate in one of these demonstrations, please give us a call.

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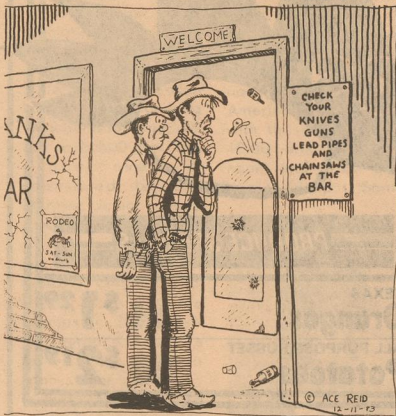

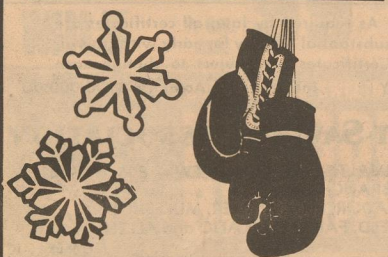
