Matador Hardware Has Early Morning Break-in and Robbery Crime Line Offers \$100 Reward

Early Sunday morning, at approximately 4:45 a.m., Mr. and Mrs. Ray Perryman were notified of a possible break-in at their business, Matador Hardware, by Lonnie Doran who was on duty as night watchman. The Perryman's arrived at the store a few minutes later to find that they had had a robbery.

The culprits broke into the store by cutting a screen in a window in the back of the store. They then entered the back room and took the window out of the door entering the store.

Reported missing include approximately \$295.00 in cash; a VCR; chain saw; skill saw; power tools. An approximate total value of \$1194.00.

Leo Hickman, Texas Ranger from Childress and Motley County Sheriff, Alton Marshall, dusted for fingerprints and examined footprints, Monday afternoon and they are investigating the break in.

Sheriff Alton Marshall stated that Crime Line is offering a \$100 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the party responsible for this crime.

Commissioners Attend To County Business

The County Commissioners Courtroom buzzed with talk of bridge construction, motor graders, and "911" emergency telephoning summons system as Judge Billy J. Whitaker presided over the October 10, 1988, regularly scheduled meeting.

Present for the reading of the minutes, approved as read by acting County Clerk Roberta Jameson, were commissioners J.M. Russell, Bill D. Washington, Gid Simpson, and Frazier Watson.

Procurement of girders for bridge construction and reinforcing topped the morning's agenda as bills were read and approved.

Princt One reported the bridge toward Dumont has been torn down and will be reinforced with steel abutments added.

The courthouse elevator project, expected to cost approximately \$110,000 with the county picking up about \$19,000 of that tab, is well underway. Architects are drawing the blue prints and bidding on the project will soon follow. Projected completion date will be in November.

Fees and fines for the Justice of Peace Office totaled \$6,130.50.

Librarian Jimmie Hunter reported the "Library School," a program for pre-schoolers was scheduled for next week.

An Appreciation Tea was given for summer reading program helpers recently. The Trauma Support group meeting at the library got off to a good start with five attending.

Literacy training and books from West Texas Library System are providing the material for volunteers to teach reading, some to non-English speaking students.

In the afternoon session, South Plains Association of Government representative, Mike Pettigrew, showed a film and discussed the advantages of a "911" telephone number to summons emergency help.

Adopted by most large cities, 911 can

become a universal code for help if rural counties and cities choose to implement the system with the help of SPAG. In order to do so, the Council of Governments must receive a resolution from local government, their plan accepted, modify equipment, and establish a data base. Cost of the system would be a fifty cent fee collected by the telephone companies monthly from subscribers.

The Commissioners voted to adopt a resolution in favor of the 911 system. The Court's business concluded with Frazier Watson being appointed as the Court's representative to a regional committee including members from the fifteen counties surrounding Lubbock.

Carriker Announces Availability of Grants

Senator Steve Carriker (D-Roby) has announced that the Texas Department of Agriculture is accepting applications for matching grants to promote diversification in Texas agriculture. Authorized by the Legislature last year, the purpose of the program is to get projects off the ground that demonstrate new and practical solutions for emerging agricultural enterprises.

"It is vitally important that people across the 30th District are aware that potential exists in this program to help stimulate economic development through value added industries utilizing Texas grown products," Carriker said. "Our people have new ideas that can help put the agricultural economy back on track."

Named the Texas Agricultural Diversification Board, the program was created to award grants to applicants who will demonstrate the feasibility of alter-

native crop production, processing agricultural products or direct marketing. According to program administrator Alice Reynolds, "the program will fund applied research and innovation projects, business training and support services programs, and small business incubators designed to diversify the Texas agricultural economy."

Proposals for funding will be accepted from any non-profit regional or community organization, such as a university, community college, or council of government, or any other non-profit organization affiliated with small business. The funds will be allocated in two rounds of competitive bids, with deadlines in late October and mid-January. 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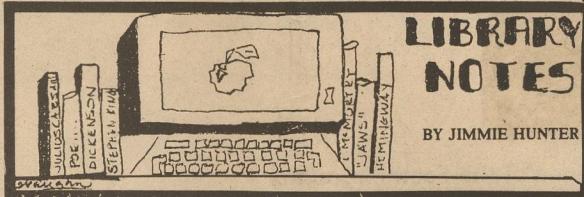

The method taught to us was a picture association method called LAUBACH WAY TO ENGLISH. This is the same method that is offered by the Motley County Library. I learned that it isn't necessary to know any of the student language in order to teach him to speak English. We were even told that it is better NOT to know.

My first class was composed of Oriental students of various ages and economic backgrounds. They were from Vietnam, Korea and Taiwan. One student was from Laos. Some could speak a little English. Some spoke none. The student from Laos couldn't speak English nor any of the languages and dialects of the other students. The others couldn't speak his language. Neither could I! So, the man was isolated in the class as far as being able to converse with anyone. He attended faithfully, riding his bicycle to school and carrying a tape recorder. He was determined to learn English. In a few weeks he never forget the look on his face when he first began to understand what was being said in class. It was one of pure joy!

While the students considered themselves blessed for having the opportunity to learn the language of their new country, I am sure the satisfaction and pleasure that I received from associating with them was an equal blessing for me. The experience certainly enriched my life.



NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN FIBERS AND FABRICS

In an effort to stay competitive in world markets while also pleasing consumers, manufacturers are constantly working on new and better fibers and fabrics.

For example, a new blend of polyester and cotton has a more open structure to the yarn which allows air to flow through more easily, enhancing breathability. This fabric, called Light Spirit Blend, also quickly absorbs moisture, drawing it away from the skin and moving it to the fabric surface where it evaporates.

Another new fabric combines Ther-

max thermal-wear, two-layer fabrics in combination with other fibers, with the Thermax next to the skin. This allows the Thermax fibers to trap heat radiated from the body and wisk moisture away from the skin.

Softex Dacron is a type of polyester fiber that improves on traditional Dacron. It has more softness, a luxurious feel, excellent draping qualities and the ability to dye and nap more easily than Dacron.

A yarn of 75% Orlon acrylic and 25% nylon marketed as "Duralon" has been developed for use in socks. Socks made from Duralon are expected to wear twice as long as those made of Acrilan 11, 50% wool and 50% acrylic, or 100% cotton. They are also very soft.

Comfort Fiber polyester which has been available for a number of years in knitted goods is now being used in woven garments. Comfort Fiber is a more breathable and durable polyester.

Many clothing manufacturers will use fiber characteristics as selling points for their garments. Check the hang tags for information on the kind of fiber and fabric you're buying.

Last summer, I was talking to someone about becoming a Tutor while Louise Johnson and her sister were visiting the Library. After the person left, Louise told me that she had been teaching the Laubach Way to Reading for several years, and I immediately enlisted her help to tell others of the pleasure and satisfaction to be found from helping others in this way, explaining that though three of our tutors had received training three years ago, they had just begun to work with their first students. This is the "assignment" she returned to me. I hope after you read it you will realize what a joy it could be to you to help someone in this way and all 347-2717 or 347-2885 to get your name on the waiting list for the next training session.

Remember the old hymn, "Count Your Blessings, Name Them One By One"? All of us are blessed in so many ways that we take it for granted. One of the greatest of these blessings is to be able to read and write and to speak the language of the country in which you live. However, now all of us are so fortunate. Many who were born in the United States cannot read or write, and many who have come here from other lands, wanting to be a part of our culture, cannot even speak English.

My husband's step-father never had the opportunity for "schoolin". He was only three years old when his father abandoned him, his younger sister and his mother. From the time he was five he was doing whatever he could to help his mother make a living for the family. At a very early age he learned strategies for covering up his illiteracy. When he became old enough, he went to work in the oil fields of Texas and Oklahoma. After

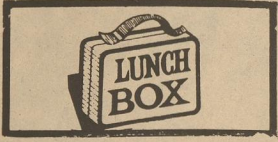
Topics from Tricia

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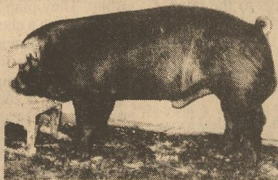

Social Security Improves Telephone Service In Motley County

Many people want to take care of their Social Security business by telephone. In recognition of this desire, the Social Security Administration has improved its telephone service for Motley County.

Additional telephone operators are on duty and more telephone equipment has been installed to help get your call through quickly. The hours when your call will be answered have been extended. You can now call us at any time from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. If you call after 7:00 p.m. or before 7:00 a.m., or on weekends or holidays, just leave a message with your name and number, and we will call you back.

Finally, you will not have to pay a

long-distance charge to call Social Security's toll-free number. We pay for the call. This is good news for those persons in Matador and all of Motley County who used to pay a long-distance charge. The number to use is 800-2345-SSA (800-234-5772). For toll-free service, just dial this number anytime, day or night.

Social Security is a package of protection - retirement, survivors, and disability insurance. It protects you and your family while you work and after you

retire. Social Security is a base you can build on, now and for the future, with other insurance and investments. Social Security never stops working!

Telephone Assistance Program Helps Elderly, Disabled

A new financial assistance program, aimed at older, disabled Texans, has been established by the Texas Legislature in cooperation with the local exchange telephone companies throughout the state. "Tel-Assistance" is the name given to the new program.

"Tel-Assistance will reduce certain charges on a qualifying person's telephone bill by 65 percent," according to Tim Raven, President of the Texas Telephone Association. "Eligible customers may have Touchtone service or custom calling services, however, the discount will not apply to these services."

Raven adds that Tel-Assistance service recipients will also receive appropriate reduction of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) line charge. Discounts do not apply to long distance, telephone equipment or installation charges.

The Tel-Assistance program is under

the direction of the Texas Department of Human Services. To qualify for Tel-Assistance, an applicant must meet several requirements.

Applicants must be 65 years of age or older and must be disabled. Additionally, applicants must be the head of a household and have an income at or below the Federal poverty level.

"Additional information regarding Tel-Assistance is available from the Texas Department of Human Services," Raven said. "Interested parties can call toll-free, 1-800-343-8353, or write to Tel-Assistance Service, Texas Department of Human Services, Mail Code 952-X, P.O. Box 2901, Austin, Texas 78769."

Applicants for the program are processed by the Department of Human Services, as well. The Department will advise telephone companies if a person is eligible for Tel-Assistance.

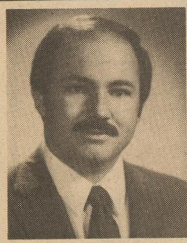

U.S. Navy Blue Angels Featured At Reese Commanders Day



The U.S. Navy's Blue Angels Flight Demonstration Team will be the featured aerial performers during Reese AFB's Annual Commander's Day Open House Sunday, October 16, 1988. (U.S. Navy photo).

REESE AIR FORCE BASE, Texas -- Colonel Mark H. Lillard III, commander of Reese AFB's 64th Flying Training Wing has designated Sunday, October 16, 1988 as "Commanders Day" Open House.

The base will be open to the public from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The featured flying attraction will be the U.S. Navy's Blue Angels Flight Demonstration team. They will be making their first visit to Reese in 20 years and will be flying their A/F-18 Hornet jet fighters.

More than 30, and possibly as many as 50 aircraft from all the military services will be on static (ground) display on the flightline when the gates open. The display will include fighters, bombers, reconnaissance, transports, helicopters and training aircraft.

Some of the more interesting aircraft currently scheduled to be on display are a B-1B bomber from Dyess AFB in Abilene, Texas and a C-5 Galaxie, the Air Force's largest transport aircraft. Visitors will be able to walk through the length of the C-5 as it will be displayed with the

front nose open and the rear ramp down. Also on static display will be an F-15 Eagle, a F-16 Falcon, an A-10 ground support aircraft, an F-4 and an RF-4 Phantom. Cannon AFB in Clovis, N.M. will send an F-111. Other transport aircraft will be a C-130 Hercules and a C-141 Starlifter.

A number of the latest military aircraft are expected to fly-by and give a demonstration of their flying maneuver capability. Reese's T-37 and T-38 training jets will fly-by in formation prior to the Blue Angels show.

A number of exhibits and displays will be available for viewing. The Reese fire department will show the capability of their crash-rescue trucks and demonstrate a simulated extraction from a disabled aircraft. The Reese Honor Guard Drill Team and Color Guard will perform throughout the day.

There will be plenty of food, drink and parking available.

The Reese AFB appearance will mark the only Blue Angels flight demonstration in the West Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico area between now and the end of their 1988 show season in November.

Social Security Tips

To serve you better now and in the future, the Social Security Administration has established a new system to provide workers, upon request, with a statement of their Social Security earnings history.

By completing the SSA form 7004 (6/88), "Request for Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement," the worker will receive free from Social Security a "Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement."

The new statement will provide:

- a summary of the worker's earnings from 1937-1950.
- an annual breakout of earnings from 1951-present, with the corresponding estimated FICA taxes, and estimates for retirement benefits at a reduced age, full retirement age, and age 70; and for survivors and disability benefits.
- more realistic estimates using the worker's anticipated future earnings and recent unposted earnings, as well as including projected real wage growth.
- the number of credits the worker needs to be insured for each type of bene-

fit and the credits currently on record. People who complete the new request form are asked to provide information about their recent earnings (which are not yet on record), their expected future earnings, and the age at which they plan to retire. This information is used in calculating the benefit estimates.

People can get a Form 7004 to request the new statement by calling toll-free 1-800-937-2000 or by writing to Consumer Information Center, Department 55, Pueblo, CO 81009.

The new statement serves as a tool for workers to verify their posted earnings and to learn the amount of estimated FICA taxes paid on the earnings. It also explains what they may expect in the way of Social Security protection so as to aid their planning for their future financial security. And, it demonstrates that Social Security is an entire package of protection - retirement, survivors, and disability insurance.
