Local Basketball Teams See Action Tuesday

The Motley County boys varsity basketball defeated Paducah 86-72 Tuesday in Matador while the Lady Matadors pulled out an exciting 60-48 win after trailing 23-26 at halftime.

The junior varsity girls won big over Paducah 53-26 after a 14-14 tie at their halftime. The junior varsity boys lost to Paducah 55-47 after they had led much of the game.

In the varsity boys game Charlie Campbell was the leading scorer with 26 points. Harvey Lee had 20, Dwight Campbell had 16, Wesley Stafford and Glen Calvert each scored 11 and Jerry Long scored two.

In the varsity girls game MC struggled early in the game and trailed most of the second quarter. The Lady Matadors came alive in the third quarter and led 42-36 as the final quarter began. They won the game 60-48.

In the junior varsity win Holly Hobbs had 18 points to be the leading scorer. Vivian Sims had 10, Varlena Lee and Alicia Zarate had seven each and Dixie Nimmo had six. Carlene Luckett and DeAnn Durham also

scored in the game.

Clayton Sims and Darrell Moore each had 12 points in the boys junior varsity game. Roy Thompson had 10 points, Brent Campbell had seven and Kyle Hardin had six.

A Second Glance

One of the perennial problems in the Nation's Capital is trying to simplify the maze of paperwork that flows in and out of the federal bureaucracy.

The Army, it seems, is not to be outdone in the Battle Against Paperwork. It survived Valley Forge, scaled the heights with Teddy Roosevelt and stormed the European fortress in World War II with General Patton.

Now, according to Washington Watch, regulatory newsletter of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, it has mounted a secret weapon in the war against red tape and government paperwork.

The Army has invented a General Purpose Form which is so simple any school child could have thought of it. In fact, the new form looks like an ordinary sheet of ruled

tablet paper -- a blank sheet with ruled lines.

The form's creators, at the Headquarters of the 94th U.S. Army Reserve Command in Hansom, Mass., say it is flexible enough to "conform to specific uses by inserting appropriate titles and rule lines."

"Other federal agencies," comments the newsletter, "should adopt this form. OSHA could use it to record the increased workplace injuries it has caused. EPA could use it to keep track of the businesses it has forced into bankruptcy. And the Energy Department would use it to explain how it has managed to make the energy crisis worse."

Channels To Be Added To Local TV Cablevision

Cable television subscribers in Matador will soon be offered several new channels to watch, according to D. H. Pope, one of the new owners of the local cable system.

Pope said he and a partner had purchased the cable TV and will call the business Matador Cablevision.

"We are in the process of replacing the electronic equipment and reworking all the cables," Pope said.

Pope, of Paducah, said new rates will be charged for the television service, but the new rates would not go into effect until all the new channels are installed.

"The monthly rate will

be \$11 for one connection and \$12 per month for more than one connection," he said "Home Box Office (HBO) will be optional to the subscriber, but those who want it will have to pay an extra \$10."

The stations to be received by subscribers will be channels 11, 13 and 28 from Lubbock; channel 17 a 24 hour movie channel from Atlanta, Georgia; ESPN a 24 hour sports channel; CBN a 24 hour religious channel and the optional HBO station.

Pope said he hoped the new stations can be added by the first of February, with a new satellite dish to be installed sometime this week.

revenue will amount to \$9,547,192, compared to the \$12,729,691 the Company has requested. The new rates will go into effect automatically in unincorporated areas and in 26 cities which had denied the increase and had their cases appealed to the PUC. The new rates will vary for different customer classifications, based on cost of operations for each class. Residential customers will pay 6.6 per cent more, commercial customers 1.1 per cent more, industrial customers 9.4 per cent more

and municipals 20.8 per cent more.

The new residential rate is 4.54 cents per kilowatt hour, compared to the present average of 4.26 cents. This means the average residential customer, who presently

uses 702 kilowatt hours per month, will see his bill increase from \$29.94 to \$31.90.

F. H. Welling, manager said the Company is generally satisfied with the outcome of the rate case, although the settlement is

for considerably less than has been sought.

"We are pleased that WTU and our customers were able to settle on a friendly basis without getting involved in a lengthy and costly hearing," he said.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

While contemplating the sad death of musician John Lennon, Americans should realize that no "gun control" law, no amount of restrictive firearms legislation, could have prevented this tragic act.

Gun laws simply cannot stop someone who is intent upon committing murder. The suspect charged with Mr. Lennon's murder purchased the murder weapon in Hawaii, a state which requires that all firearms and ammunition be registered with local and state authorities.

The crime took place in New York City which has perhaps the most stringent gun laws in this country. New York not only requires registration and permits for handguns, but also requires the licensing of firearms owners. These restrictive gun laws did not stop Mr. Lennon's murder. Additional gun laws would not have stopped it, either.

The act, for whatever reason it was committed, was premeditated. Once he is bent upon such a crime, a person cannot be thwarted by an existing gun law, nor by the passage of any additional legislation. Murder is

already against the law.

There will be those who call for more "gun control" laws. Such laws, however, only restrict the law-abiding citizen's use of firearms and will not affect the criminal or reduce crime. Such laws merely open the door for civil rights violations which have occurred many times under the Federal Gun Control Acts of 1968.

These violations have already resulted in 63 United States Senators calling for reform of that gun law.

To stop crime, laws must be directed at the violent criminal. The National Rifle Association has long been in favor of prompt and adequate punishment for anyone convicted of a crime of violence. Take the criminal off the streets.

Force the criminal justice system to be as severe as necessary to compel the criminal to realize that he will suffer the consequences of his actions. This is the way to stop such deplorable tragedies.
