SLOW, soaking rains that blanketed much of Texas late last week, brought to end the prolonged drought in West Texas. The entire area of Motley County received the penetrating moisture. In most areas the moisture measured as much as two inches and some sections reported as much as three inches unofficially.

The precipitation began without wind and continued with little if any runoff. Many fields are quagmires, according to reports from some farmers. Range conditions are greatly benefited, altho the moisture is probably too late to promote grass growth before frost. Ranchers say, however, that the penetrating moisture will go down to grass roots and greatly relieve the damage from prolonged dry weather.

One of the greatest benefits of the rains is to rye, wheat and other pastures that were suffering. The damage to the cotton crop is reported to be light since there was no wind or hard rainfall. Row feed crops were also benefited.

The drought situation had reached a crucial point as revealed by records kept by Bob Stanley. Last year the total rainfall to October was 18.62 inches, as compared with only 9.30 inches this year up to the moisture last week.

MOTLEY General Hospital will remain open with approval to accept Medicare patients. The reversal of the ultimatum letter of last week which caused the hospital board to decide to close the facility, was received by a telephone call from Representative Bill Heatly, to Judge Forrest Campbell, late Monday.

The board met in a special called meeting Tuesday afternoon and rescinded its entire action of the meeting October 13. All board members were present and approved the action. A complete staff is now on duty.

Administrator Haynes Stephens said the only deficiency which the hospital had was the number of registered nurses. The relief came in the announcement from Representative Heatly, declaring the hospital would receive Medicare approval with one registered nurse and three LVN's. The hospital was never closed.

The meeting was brief Tuesday afternoon. The statements were direct and the general air of relief was evident in the personnel, and especially on the street where word of the good news spread rapidly.

At the conclusion of the board meeting, President John V. Stevens said: "We have some friends who have made this action possible. I personally give the credit to State Representative Bill Heatly and to Congressman George Mahon in Washington. Perhaps there are others. We were simply up against a brick wall by the registered nurse ruling that required 42 be employed."

Thanks for Petition. In his conversation with Judge Campbell, Representative Heatly said he had received the petition containing four pages of names, asking that the hospital be allowed to operate with Medicare approval. He asked that his personal thanks be extended to each signer of the petition, and his appreciation for the interest of the people in the maintenance of the needed public facility.

No formal approval has been received on the hospital relief to accept Medicare patients, but Representative Heatly has assured officials here that it will be forthcoming, with the requirement eased to one registered nurse and three LVN's.

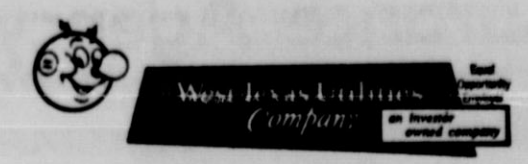

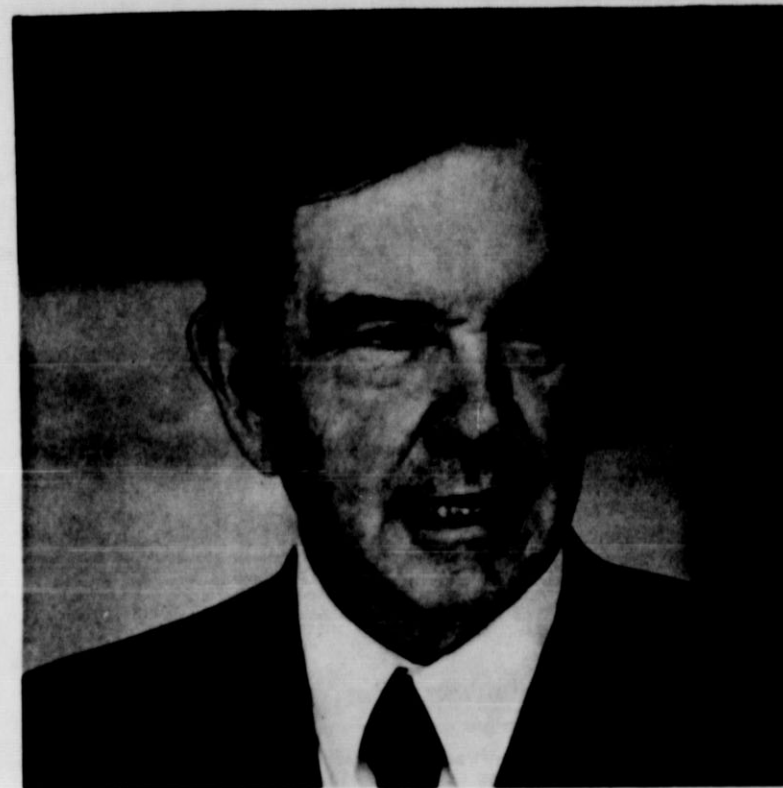

**Grocery Levy Threat To Proposal**

Austin—A \$565 million tax bill \$412 million more for the state and \$71 million more for city sales tax cities—came under heavy attack today as the House met for the do-or-die vote on approval.

House Speaker Gus F. Mutscher Jr. of Brenham, who worked all day Sunday pressuring members to vote for the bill, acknowledged the measure might be defeated, mainly because it would impose the state sales tax on groceries.

If the bill passes, groceries also will be subject to the local option city sales tax, and food stores will ring up a total state-local sales tax of approximately \$40 million on groceries bought during the 20 months beginning Jan. 1, 1970.

Mutscher predicted about an even break on the House vote, which will come approximately 6 hours before the 30-day special session ends at midnight Wednesday.

"We've got an uphill battle still," Mutscher conceded. "We're pretty close to the margin (a simple majority of those voting), but I couldn't say we definitely have the votes at this time."

The tax compromise was worked out by a 10-man House-Senate conference committee Friday.

It squeaked by the Senate, 15 to 14, at 12:33 a.m. Sunday after a 23 and one-half hour filibuster by a band of opposition liberals.

**Tax Bill Blackmail Charged in House**

AUSTIN (UPI)—Angry legislators accused House leaders today of "appropriations bill blackmail" and said they are being threatened with spending cuts in their districts unless they vote for the tax bill.

Rep. Bob Thomas, D-Waco, said he was threatened with loss of a \$90,000 appropriation for an institution in his district.

Rep. Burke Musgrove D-Breckenridge, said the chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Rep. W. S. Healty, D-Paducah, called me in and reminded me that I have a high percentage of elderly people in my district who will be getting a 5 per cent pension raise if the tax bill passes.

Musgrove said he considered this "appropriations bill blackmail."

This is the first time in at least 10 years that we've had to vote on a tax bill before the appropriations bill was passed," he said.

Musgrove and Thomas both said they will vote against the tax bill anyway.

"The leadership can threaten me all they want because I am not going to vote for a tax on food," Thomas said. A key provision in the bill extends the sales tax to groceries.

Thomas declined to name the person who made the alleged threat, but said "The pressure is on and the thumb screws are being tightened by the House leadership in an attempt to round up votes for the food tax."

Thomas said the appropriation in question was for repair of wind damage at James Connally Technical Institute at Waco.

Rep. Joe Allen, D-Baytown, released a statement calling the tax bill "a thoughtless, immature and ridiculous answer" to the problems of state financing.

He said it would be "inconceivable and inhumane" to tax food to pay for every legislator's "petty little pet project" in the appropriations bill.

The expansion of the sales tax to cover groceries, repair and maintenance services on everything except homes and buildings, and to add alcoholic beverages and farm machinery, will far exceed the amount involved in the rate reduction on items now taxed.

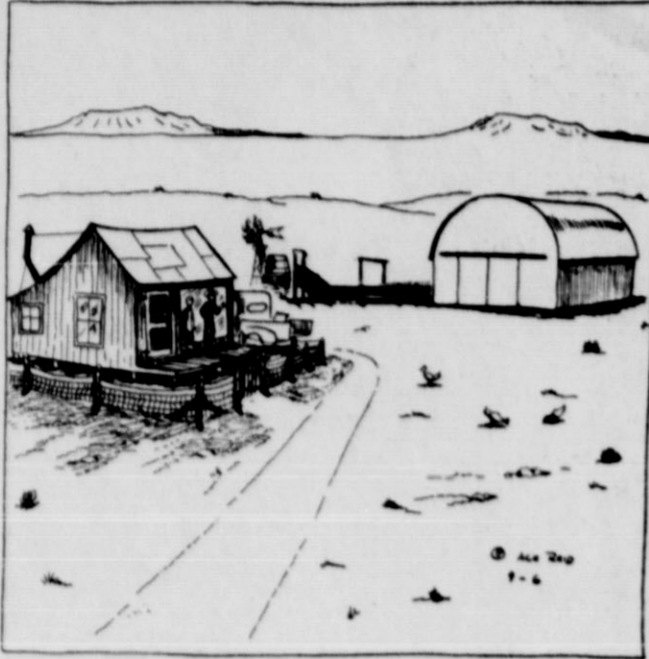

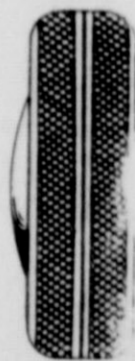
