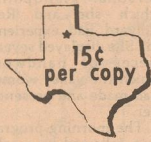

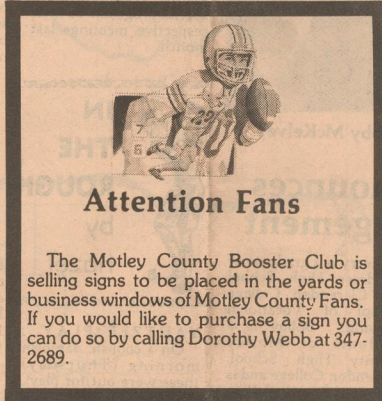

Motley County Defeats Sudan During Constant Rain

During a constant rain Friday night the Motley County Matadors defeated the visiting Sudan Hornets for a 19-12 victory to remain undefeated for the season.

A 19-point second quarter scoring barrage by the Matadors was all the points Motley County was able to put on the board, but it proved to be enough.

Sudan drew first blood on the third play from scrimmage in the first quarter when halfback Lester King ran

for a 44-yard TD. The attempt at a running conversion failed.

In the second quarter, Matador quarterback Shawn Bearden threw a 57-yard TD pass to wingback Charlie Campbell to even the score up and the PAT kick by Campbell put Motley County in the lead.

After a Sudan fumble, Motley County put more points on the board when fullback Harvey Lee ran for a 44-yard TD run. The kicking attempt failed. With the half almost over, the Matadors

scored again on a 1-yard run by Tim Shannon and the attempt at a 2-point conversion failed.

Sudan scored early in the fourth quarter on a 15-yard TD run by Joey Bellar. The conversion attempt failed.

Harvey Lee rushed for 151 yards on 22 carries. Tim Shannon rushed for 50 yards on 12 carries.

Shawn Bearden completed 2 of four passes for 96 yards and the defense was led by Wesley Stafford and Jim Meador who had 16 and 14 tackles respectively.

Coach Griffin said, "We feel like Claude is a much better team than their record indicates and are looking for a very physical contest. Any success we've had this year can be directly attributed to our Seniors and we are looking for another good effort from them, both leadership-wise and performance-wise."

Everyone is urged to come to Claude Friday night and support the Motley County Matadors who are ranked 9th in the State UPI.

Principal Wayland Moore Presents Program To PTA

"Encourage your children to work hard and study. If they have learned to do these things in high school, they will carry the habits with them into college," Wayland Moore told the members of the Motley County PTA at the first regular meeting last week.

"The basic ingredient to learning good study habits is homework. A child cannot learn to study unless he has something to study," continued Moore.

College is the time to mature emotionally and socially along with the academic study involved. Students need to set career goals and follow-up on them, according to Wayland.

In the program for the evening, entitled Higher Education, Moore discussed career choices,

financial aids, college entrance examinations, and loans for higher education, and the assistance the school tries to give the students with these matters.

He suggested that any parent who needed assistance in guiding his child could consult the school library for catalogues distributed by most of the colleges or technical institutes in this area. There is also material available at the school for the students to read concerning career choices and the education necessary for them to achieve their goals.

Before introducing Moore, PTA President, Judy Renfro, conducted the business meeting. A committee was formed to check into the possibility of converting the old gym into a skating rink. Mrs. Renfro introduced

Josephine Hamilton, to whom the 1980 PTA yearbook is dedicated. The dedication reads, "We wish to dedicate this yearbook to Josephine Hamilton for her dedication in helping children, her assistance given to other teachers, and for her concern with the welfare of people."

Couple Announces Recent Engagement

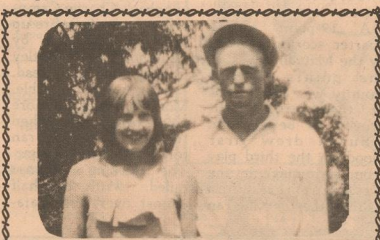

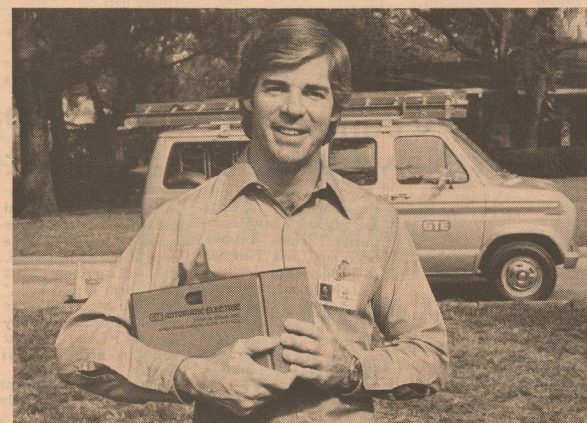

F. M. Jinkins Family Were Early Pioneers

F. M. Jinkins, born September 24, 1865 in Missouri, the son of Ed and Elizabeth Jinkins, moved with his parents to Cook County, Texas at an early age where he grew to manhood. He moved to Motley County in 1891 and married Fannie J. Edmondson, the daughter of T. N. (Uncle Tom) and Mary Edmondson who had moved to Motley County the same year. He married Fannie in 1893.

They were parents of eight children all of whom are now living. Namely: Leland Jinkins of Amarillo, Mable (Jinkins) Solomon of Tulia, Sadie (Jinkins)

Bradley of Corpus Christi, Clarence Jinkins, Emmet Jinkins, Homer T. Jinkins, Ethel (Jinkins) Payne, and Mary (Jinkins) McMahan, all of Matador.

F. M. (Francis Marion) attended college at Veal Station near Denison and was awarded a 2nd grade certificate and taught school for several years in Motley County, including the old Clements School and White Star School. He filed on school land near Clements School where he made his family home for some forty years, as a stock farmer.

He was Justice of the Peace and by request made a night time trip to

old Teepee City, arriving there about day break on a frosty morning to perform a marriage ceremony. The couple's name participating, nor the fee for the ceremony is not at hand.

The first housing was a dugout, then a half dugout, then two rooms added then two more rooms as the family grew. The house now abandoned, known as the Stafford Place, still stands, the land of which is owned and farmed by John M. Russell.

Francis M. Jinkins died September 27, 1937 at age 72.

Fannie J. Jinkins died March 26, 1956 at age 79. In 1904 F. M. borrowed \$50.00 to

attend the "St. Louis World's Fair" traveling to Childress by horseback, there boarding the train with other Matador residents for the big city.

Upon returning he was able for weeks to regale his family with word pictures of the sights to be seen.

One fellow traveler was Jeff Morris, who at one time built a merry-go-round, pulled by a mule and named it the "Flying Jenny".

Soil-Water Conservation Board To Meet, Oct. 3

An election for a director to serve in Zone 2 on the Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 3 at the El Matador Cafe announced W. H. Marshall, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 7:30 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 21 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 21 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Current members of the board of directors of the Upper Pease SWCD are W. H. Marshall, James Bearden, Coy Franks, H. R. Jameson and W. D. Lipscomb. The current director for zone 2 is W. D. Lipscomb.

The purpose of the Upper Pease SWCD, with headquarters in Matador, is to promote sound soil and water

conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.
