A Second Glance

We received an interesting letter from Lloyd Benson this week on why we should vote. It reads:

"HOW IMPORTANT IS YOUR VOTE on Tuesday, November 4? It could make all the difference! On numerous occasions throughout history the course of the world has been changed by the margin of a single vote.

But for one vote, what we know today as the United States of America might be merely part of the fading British Empire.

On September 28, 1774 the First Continental Congress, meeting in Philadelphia, debated on the "Galloway Plan." The effect of the Galloway Plan would have been to transform the American colonies into a British dominion ruled by an English type of Parliament and a British governor.

Delegate Patrick Henry of Virginia made an impassioned speech against the plan before it came to a vote that day.

The Galloway Plan was defeated by one vote.

With millions of votes being cast this year, it might be easy to assume that your lone vote would be lost in the shuffle, that it makes no difference whether you vote or not. That would be a mistake.

JOHN F. KENNEDY WAS ELECTED PRESIDENT by less than one vote per precinct across the nation. One-half of one percent of the votes cast in Illinois and New Jersey swung 43 electoral votes to Kennedy. Had that tiny percentage of the votes in those two states been reversed it would have been enough to throw that election into the House of Representatives for a decision.

In 1800 Thomas Jefferson was elected President over Aaron Burr by one vote in the House of Representatives, following a tie in the electoral college.

In 1824 John Quincy Adams gained the Presidency by one vote when that contest was decided in the House of Representatives.

And in 1876 Rutherford B. Hayes was elected President over Samuel J. Tilden when a special Electoral Commission voted 8-7 in his favor.

Repeatedly, throughout history, a single vote has changed the course of our civilization: "the U.S. Senate in 1845 agreed to annex Texas by a one-vote margin; "one vote cost King Charles I of England his head in 1649; "Elizabeth II is Queen of England today because some 250 years ago the British House of Commons voted in favor of the House of Hanover, 96-95; "in 1863 the U.S. Senate twice failed to convict President Andrew Johnson in his impeachment trial by a single vote.

IN 1963 A CANDIDATE FOR COUNCIL in a Cincinnati suburb was hospitalized for an emergency appendectomy.

Matadors Spear Longhorns 36 -- 8

The Motley County Matadors continued their winning ways Friday night by defeating the Lazbuddie Longhorns 36-8, in a District 2-1A game.

Lazbuddie scored first late in the 1st quarter on a safety, but that was the last time the Horns led.

In the middle of the second quarter MC mounted a good drive and went 76 yards in seven plays. The drive was capped off by a one yard dive by Tim Shannon, with 7:01 left in the first half, MC led 6-2.

Dwight Campbell tipped a Horn pass and Shawn Bearden intercepted it on the MC 42 with 5:48 left in the half. Then Shannon carried

for 9 yards, then broke over right guard for 40 yards to the one yard line. On the next play he scored. Dwight Campbell's PAT was good and with 5:02 left MC led 14-2.

The Horns had to punt on their next possession and MC put together another drive. They started on their own 36 and eight plays later Charlie Campbell completed a 27 yard TD pass from Bearden. The score was 20-2 with 33 seconds left in the half.

The Horns completed a 15 yard pass, but on their next try Charlie Campbell intercepted the pass and went 50 yards for another Motley County score.

In the 3rd quarter,

Shannon broke away for a 49 yard TD and with 5:56 left in the quarter the score was 33-2. Dwight Campbell kicked a 16 yard field goal later in the quarter to make it 36-2.

Lazbuddie scored a TD on a one yard dive with 4:56 left in the game. Following a couple of fumbles MC was content to run out the clock on the Lazbuddie 4 yard line.

The Matadors had scored one other TD when Harvey Lee went 43 yards to the end zone in the first quarter, but the run was called back because of a penalty.

In the last home game of the season the Matadors will face Happy here on Burleson Field beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Precautions Urged For Halloween Safety

On Friday, October 31, children all over will be celebrating one of their favorite holidays, Halloween. This being so, scores of miniature "monsters" will scamper through the neighborhoods of Texas. For many of them, "trick or treat" may well turn into tragedy.

Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety, Lubbock, suggests that a few precautions on the part of the motorists and parents could prevent such disasters this Halloween.

If your children go trick or treating, one of the parents should go with them to insure their safety. If you buy or make your child a costume, it should be of white or light colored material so it can be

easily seen at night by motorists. You should also have your child carry a flashlight to serve as a warning to motorists and as an added safety measure on poorly lighted streets and children should be instructed to use sidewalks whenever possible and the motorists, on their part, should be especially careful when driving the neighborhood streets as many of the youngsters will be crossing the streets hap-hazardly as they go from house to house.

Major Bell also stated that because Halloween falls on a Friday there will be added traffic as most area high schools will be having a football game. If the parents and motorists will join together and think of the children's safety, we can turn this

potentially dangerous evening into a safe and enjoyable one.
