Both teams are unbeaten but only one team can claim the crown, so the showdown will be a district superbowl.

Matador fans plan to pack the stadium and people are planning to attend from all over the area.

The Matadors beat Happy 24-20 last week, but they had about all they could handle in overcoming the passing of the Cowboys.

Motley County scored one touchdown per quarter but failed to make any conversions in the seesaw battle.

The Matadors opened the scoring in the first quarter when Bearden sneaked for a TD and the PAT attempt failed.

In the second quarter, Happy tied the score on a 9-yard pass from quarterback Donnie Venhaus to tight end Mark Tackitt and its running attempt failed.

The Cowboys went ahead when Venhaus connected with Tackitt on a 37-yard TD effort and Paul Comacho ran for the conversion.

District Governor Is Lions Speaker

The impact of Lionism on international, as well as domestic affairs was extolled Tuesday at regular meeting of Matador Lions Club at the First United Methodist Church. Speaker was the District Governor of district 2T-2, Lion Marshall Cooper of Whiteface, where his is director of Girlstown.

Negotiations through Lions International's ability to communicate, he said, aided in the release of the U.S. Naval intelligence ship, the Pueblo which was seized in 1968 by North Korea. He also cited the Lions crusade against darkness in reply to Helen Keller's plea in behalf of the blind, which resulted in worldwide assistance in providing them with white canes, cornea transplants, the eye banks and other aids.

"Lionism plays an important part in the life of a community," he declared, and commended the Matador club for having as one of its projects, the placing of flags on the street to signify national holidays. He also expressed appreciation for the club's support of Girlstown, and of the upcoming Christmas program for Boys Ranch at Lubbock. He announced that Jim Littleton of Lubbock's TV channel 28 will be sponsoring a band concert Dec. 6 to raise

Motley County Votes For Ronald Reagan

There were 944 voters in Motley County Tuesday and 573 went for Reagan and 341 voting for Carter. Anderson got 7 and Clark 8.

The turnout was down from the 974 who went to the polls in 1976, but the county followed the trend of the nation. Several local men ran

uncontested in the general election and were returned to office.

They were County Attorney Howard Tra-week, 623; Sheriff Alton Marshall, 662; County Commissioners John Russell (Precinct 1) 251; Bill Washington, (Precinct 2) 108; and Bill Jameson (Precinct 3) 132.

In the Presidential election all precincts were in majority for Reagan except Roaring springs, casting 167 votes, with Carter getting 85 to Reagan's 77.

In all other races the county had a clear sweep of Democratic Party candidates.

"Deaths due to cardiac failure have been reduced by 15% this year in Texas," said Larry McEachern, a recent guest at the Matador Lions Club, "yet it is still the number one cause of death." Mr. McEachern, attorney of law from Plainview, who serves on the AHA state executive board stated, "Outstanding progress is being made through heart research, medical and citizen education programs, so your contributions to the heart fund are being used for a vital cause."

To verify this fact, Mrs. Carolyn Moore of Lubbock, AHA regional director, showed a 1980 film on Heart Research. She told through research, a new medical device is being used for by-pass heart surgery that enables a patient to resume normal activities within twenty four hours.

Motley County residents have benefited from the AHA research with successful by-pass heart surgery, pace makers, cardiology

George Humphreys is a true son of the old west. He grew up in the big ranch country of northwest Texas and became the foreman of the famed 666 Ranch of Burk Burnett and sheriff of King County. Born in 1899 in a half dugout, he seemed destined from youth to spend his years in the cattle industry. He graduated from "bronc stomper" to foreman of the 6666 Ranch in 1932. His ability as a horseman and trainer became nationwide and his riding and training of the famed cutting horse Hollywood Gold brought crowds to their feet at major championship shows. The author has told the story of this cowboy and lawman who became a legend in his own time.

Early Small Grains Should Be Inspected For Worms

Small grains planted early for pasture or volunteer small grains that will be grazed should be inspected for fall armyworms and armyworms. Those fields where the plants are well established and are growing rapidly are most likely to be damaged. Improved moisture conditions have resulted in good small grain growth and at the same time have increased the likelihood of damaging armyworm infestations.

Armyworm infestations, primarily fall armyworms, have been reported in economically damaging numbers in Scurry and Dickens counties. Armyworms are also present in Motley County small grain fields.

Small armyworms are difficult to see in small grains. Infestations often go undetected until armyworms are larger and have caused excessive damage. Most of the

damage is caused when armyworms are from 1 to 1½ inches in length.

Insecticides for control of armyworms are most effective when applied while armyworms are small; therefore, fields should be inspected weekly until colder temperatures reduce the possibility of damage. Control measures are suggested when there are 4 to 5 armyworms per square foot which are causing seedling stand loss or significant foliage loss.

Methyl parathion, parathion, toxaphene and trichlorfon (Dylox) will control armyworms and fall armyworms in wheat. These materials are not as effective for control of beet armyworms but beet armyworms do not commonly cause damage to small grain in this area. Beet armyworms can be identified by the black spots on either side of the second segment behind the head.

The methomyl insecticides Lannate R, Lannate RL, Nudrin R90, and Nudrin R1.8 have 24(c) labels for use in the control of beet armyworms and fall armyworms on wheat, oats and barley in Texas. When using one of these insecticides for this purpose the user must have the 24(c) label in his possession at the time of application.

When using any of these insecticides read and follow the information given on the label. The grazing waiting period, the minimum number of days from application until cattle can be allowed to graze, is given on the label. Do not feed toxaphene treated forage to dairy animals or animals being finished for slaughter or allow them to graze toxaphene treated fields.

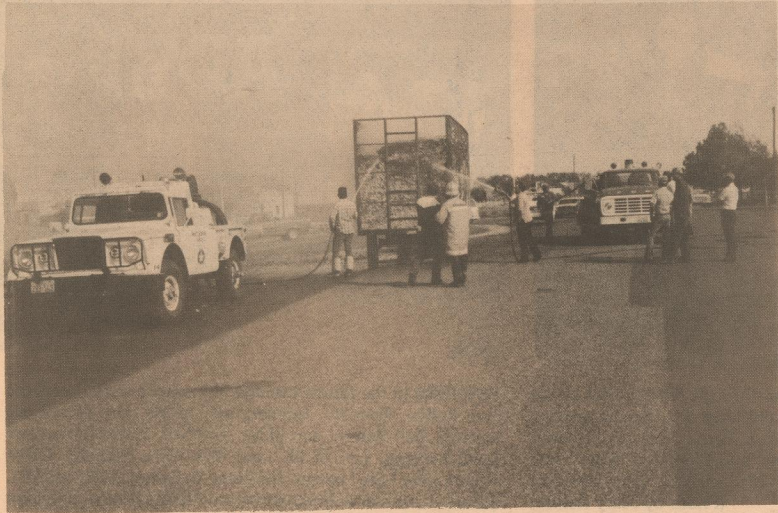

By joining in the Voluntary Truck and Bus Fuel Economy Program of the U.S. Dept. of Energy and Transportation, trucks are shattering the myth that trains move freight with greater fuel efficiency. Little fuel-efficiency advantage has been shown for competitive freight movement on trains.



Trucks, in fact, have reduced their empty miles to one-half that of railroads. By voluntarily adopting more fuel-efficient options for their trucks, the American Trucking Associations reports, operators are saving \$5,000 in fuel costs per 100,000 miles traveled.
