A Second Glance

Sensing when a young person needs real understanding and when it's better to pretend his problems are new to you can be a difficult task, so the more you know about what your child thinks, the more likely you are to be truly helpful.

Many parents are finding that planning game-playing evenings at home can be among the best ways to get to know their teenagers, and each other. A new board game created by one understanding mother, Mrs. Rhea Zakich, encourages players to be open and honest with one another.

Even teachers and professors, marriage counselors and religious educators find it stimulates exploration of attitudes, feelings, motives and values. Called the Ugame, it asks players to answer questions like What do you want to be doing in 10 years? and How would you define "love"?

Some teenagers like the game so much their teachers are using it as a reward for completing academic tasks in the classroom! Though it comes with a game board, playing pieces and two decks of question cards, it's really an exercise in interpersonal communications that can be very revealing.

We recognize learning as a complex, developmental process that proceeds at a different rate with every individual. The importance of individualized teaching is underscored by the growing use of computer-based instruction, such as the PLATO system developed by Control Data Corp. and used throughout the country to teach basic skills.

Local Business Burglarized Sunday

Texas Rangers have joined Motley County Sheriff Alton Marshall in investigating the Sunday night burglary of Cammack Corral Recreation Center in Matador.

Reported taken in the break-in was between \$400 and \$500 and about 80 records.

"We would like to ask residents and businessmen to watch for anyone spending a large amount of quarters," Marshall said. "That's mainly what was taken from the game

machines which were broken into."

Marshall said a "small person" entered the business through a narrow window. He said there was probably more than one person. Finger prints are being taken.

"About \$2,000 worth of damage was reported," Marshall said. "One Juice Box was almost completely destroyed."

Investigation is continuing. The business is located east of the Courthouse in Matador.

Bollworms On Increase In Area Cotton

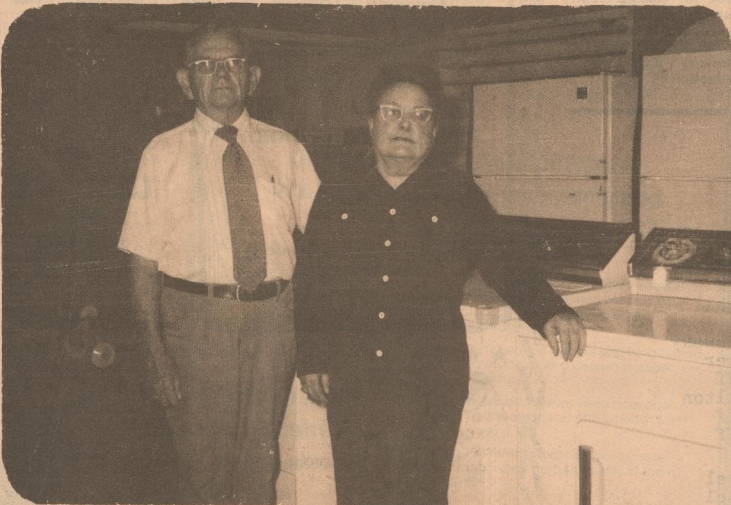
Cotton bollworms have increased over the past several weeks in area cotton. Very low populations are being found in the dryland cotton but higher numbers are being found in irrigated fields. Bollworms can cause severe damage to a cotton crop in a very short period of time.

The bollworm moth usually lays its eggs singly on the upper side leaves in the top 1/3 of the plant. These eggs are small white to tan eggs with ridges running vertically along them. With no predation from

other insects and the right weather conditions these eggs will hatch in about 3 days. The small worms will start feeding in the terminal of the plant and start moving from square to square and into bolls as they increase in size. These worms can cause damage to as many as seven squares or bolls in its life cycle.

Control of these insects should be based on various conditions. Such things as yield potential, age of cotton, beneficial insect population, percentage of damaged squares, and worm numbers and size

should be included in your decision to control or not to control. Close scouting of cotton should be used to determine population of worms, egg numbers, and number of damaged squares present in a certain field. A number of fields may have completely different conditions, therefore, each field should be scouted separately to determine presence of bollworms. If additional information is needed on cotton bollworms contact Warren Multer, County Entomologist at the Motley County Courthouse.

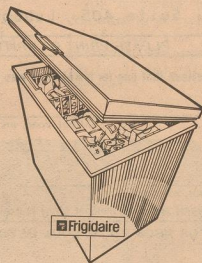

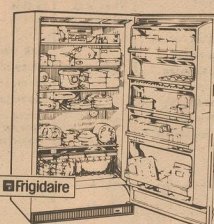
