

Members of the Motley County School Board were guests Monday night at the local PTA meeting, and presented a program of general discussion on ideas with the parents and teachers.

One main item canvassed during the meeting was the possibilities of obtaining an ice machine for the school concession stand located in the school cafeteria. After analyzing different sizes and prices of the ice machines, the PTA agreed to check into the subject in more debth and talk about it at the next meeting on March 19.

Other topics of discussion for the evening were the policies of absenteeism, excused and unexcused absences, activity periods, seven period school days, atheletic funds, adoption of text books and new or improved tennis courts.

The subject of 60 per cent being considered as a County was also discussed and a display of hands showed most of those present were in favor of a 70 per cent grade being the bottom level for passing. 

Guest speaker Thursday, Feb. 22, at regular meeting of El Progresso Club in the home of Mrs. E. A. Day, the lieutenant described her duties at Reese in connection with the military as a profession.

The meeting was opened by the president, Mrs. Franklin Price, who stressed attendance March 17 at the Santa Rosa District Convention in Seymour. New business included a report on Enterprise Economy by Mrs. W. C. Pallmever. department chairman of FREE (Federation Role in our Enterprise Economy.)

Mrs. Frank Pohl was program leader and read the yearbook quotation: "Praise the Lord and pass the ammunition," as an introduction to the program subject, "Love of Country." Lt. Yates was introduced by Mrs. Carl King, for her discussion of "Women in Uniform."



Administration Accused Of Playing Games

Senator John Tower (R-Tex) today accused the Administration of playing games with the defense portion of the Fiscal Year 1980 budget in an attempt to convince the American people that it represents the President's promised 3 percent real growth over 1979.

"The game the Administration is playing is to take funds authorized and appropriated from past years' budgets and adjust the expenditure of these funds so as to come up with the 3 percent real growth figure.' Tower declared

The net result, Tower said, is that we are not buying any more defense. The entire FY 80 budget is not expended during that year, even as in past years.

"For example, only about 15 percent of the funds requested in this budget for major items such as ships, tanks, and aircraft, will be expended during FY 80." Tower said

Tower said the actual growth in the new defense budget amounts to only about 1.7 percent, not 3 percent. According to Tower, the Administration derives its 3 percent growth statement from its estimate spent on defense in FY 80 President promised after which totals \$122.7 billion. vetoing the nuclear carrier The new budget request for last year." Tower con-\$135.5 billion in Total cluded.

Obligational Authority falls short of the 3 percent.

"If the Administration truly wanted a 3 percent increase in real terms in the defense budget, it would have requested that increase in Total Obligational Authority. This would assure the growth necessary in our national defense budget for those systems needed to be approved this year but not paid for in 1980.

Tower, who is the ranking minority member of the Senate Armed Services Committee said he would do everything possible to insure the defense budget contains real growth, not merely the appearance of growth through manipulation of budgetary figures. "I am particularly con-

cerned that the development and modernization of our strategic forces, especially the MX missile, proceed rapidly enough to overcome the expected vulnerability of our land based ICBM's in the mid-1980's. In addition, the Administration has again shortchanged the Navy's shipbuilding program with a request for only 15 new ships, including the smaller mid-sized aircraft carrier rather than the 90,000 ton

As a retired teacher, I believe that the "offset provision" 334 of the law PL. 95--216 should be repealed.

I am also against putting Teacher Retirement in Texas into Social Security.

ATTENTION TEXAS WORKFORCE:

In the Los Angeles Times on Sunday, January 28th, 1979, the following article appeared -- quoting:

"Late in 1977 the Social Security law was amended in a move to keep the whole system from going bankrupt. Hidden among the 56 pages of rules and regulations, the amendment singled out a particular group of women to be VICTIMIZED and virtually no one noticed."

"Section 334 of the law (PL95-216) is subtitled "Reduced benefits for spouses' receiving government pension". The key word is "SPOUSE". The government pension is one the spouse earned by working for "the federal government or any state or political subdivision thereof.' (Teacher Retirement System of Texas or California is a "nolitical subdivision.")

"A spouse may be either a man or woman. Historically it has been the woman who was insured under Social Security as a dependent of her husband. The burden of the reduced

most heavily on the woman."

"Before the law was passed, a retired woman could collect her own government pension and still be entitled to Social Security Benefits as a spouse, in an amount based on her husband's contributions to the Social Security fund. In 1976 the typical widow over 60 was collecting \$159 a month as her husband's beneficiary.

"Nora Graham, a Los

Angeles school teacher, accidently discovered how the new (law) regulations will slash her planned retirement income. Because the Los Angeles school district carries Retirement benefits through a California teachers' pension system (as does Texas. M.K.) rather than Social Security. Graham's status is the same as that of nearly one million female federal employees, NONE of whom is eligible for Social Security, not even as a spouse any more.

Social Security Tips

By Janis A. Sherrod Question: I have worked under social security all my life, but I've always had low wages. Isn't there some kind of sepcial retirement benefit for people like me?

Answer: There is a special minimum retirement benefit for people who worked under social security at least 20 years. This helps people who had low earnings, but still above a specified level, in their working years. The amount of the special

minimum depends on the number of years of coverage. For a worker retiring in 1979 at 65 with 30 or more years of coverage the minimum would be \$230. The special minimum benefit will increase automatically in future years as the cost-ofliving rises.
