Alton Marshall won the Motley County Sheriff's seat for four more years with a landslide victory over two opponents in the May 3 Primary held here. Marshall received 600 of the 715 votes cast in the sheriff's race, winning over Ewell Gene Martin and Bud Bethard.

The voting in all other races last Saturday showed much closer totals and indicated the county was divided among the candidates.





(Amos Jim) Dye, went on for his Ph.D in agronomy. Dr. Dye taught in the graduate

school of Texas A&M University a number of years before serving in the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Washing-ton, D.C. as Interna-tional Training Adminis-trator.


