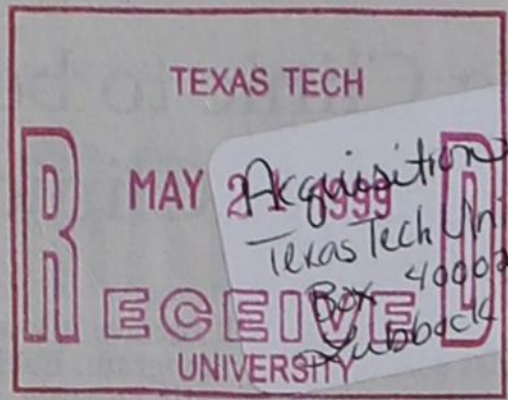

Matador Fire Department receives computer

Childress -- The Matador Volunteer Fire Department recently received a new computer free of charge through the Texas Forest Service Helping Hands Program. The computer will be used to help in reporting range fires and equipment use. This will help the local department and the Forest Service to more efficiently communicate in battling the range fires that have been all too common in the local area over the past few years.

The computer originated from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) District Office in Childress. TxDOT has had to upgrade some of its automation equipment recently to keep up with the processing demands of engineering software programs. Pat Swindell, TxDOT Information Resource Administrator in Childress, said, "The computers are in good condition and will run any of the usual programs except the highly technical programs used by our engineers. We are glad to see them being put to such good use." TxDOT was able to transfer the computers to the Forest Service, who in turn facilitated the local department's acquisition. Mona Bridges, of the Texas Forest Service,

added "We are always glad to work with our partners as TxDOT in Childress and the local volunteer fire departments to improve our fire fighting capabilities in West Texas."

"Congratulations to the volunteer fire department on their recent acquisition of these computers," said State Senator Tom Haywood. "I am pleased with the Texas Forest Service Helping Hands Program and their involvement with these rural areas in my district. This type of technology will help ensure the welfare of rural Texas and protect it against the violent destruction caused by fires. I commend the fire department as well as the Texas Forest Service."

"I am glad the Texas Department of Transportation in Childress and the Texas Forest Service were able to work together to provide local volunteer fire departments with computers," said Texas House Speaker Pete Laney. "The West Texas community will benefit greatly because of their efforts."

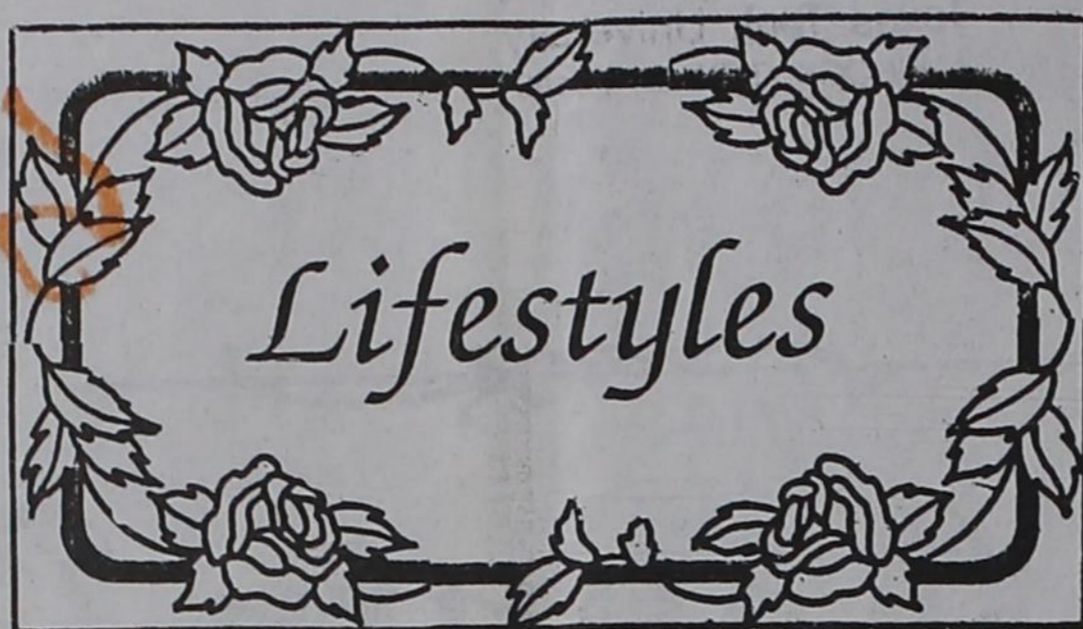

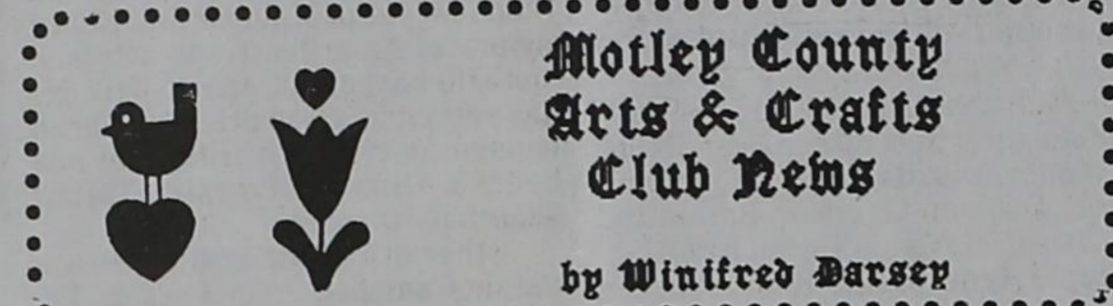

Memorial Day Muster approaching

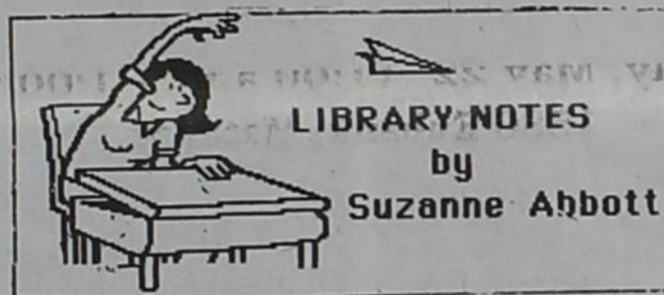

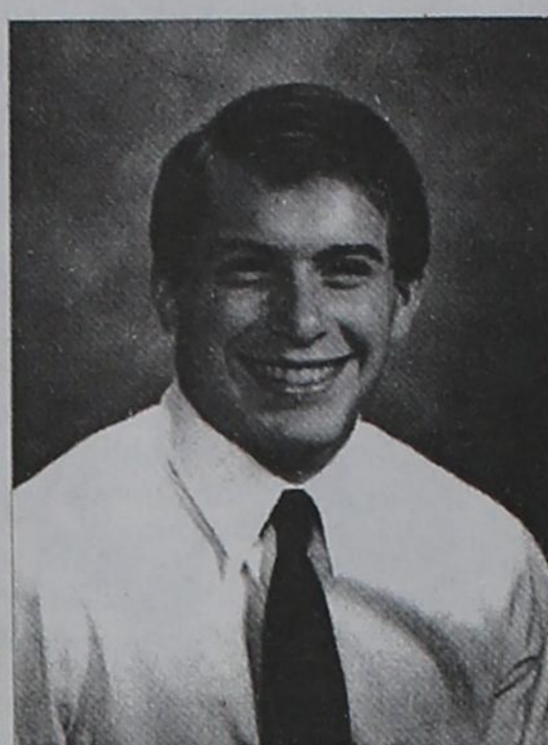

Notification of Pre-Kindergarten

Any school district may offer pre-kindergarten classes, but a district shall offer pre-kindergarten classes if the district identifies 15 or more eligible children who are at least four years of age. A school district may offer pre-kindergarten classes if the district identifies 15 or more eligible children who are at least three years of age.

- A. A child is eligible for enrollment in a pre-kindergarten class if the child is at least three years of age and is:
- (1) unable to speak and comprehend the English language;
 - (2) educationally disadvantaged; or
 - (3) homeless as defined by 42 U.S.C. Section 11302, regardless of the residence of the child, or either parent of the child, or of the child's guardian or other person having lawful control of the child.

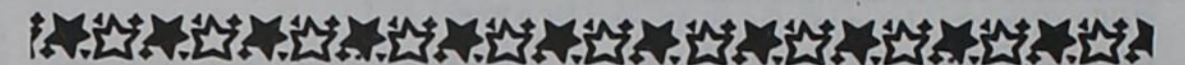

The Motley County Ambulance Service has a team of trained professionals who treat illnesses or injuries and transport the patient to a hospital emergency department.

Motley County EMS and the Texas Department of Health remind you and your family that emergency teams provide a lifesaving link between ill or injured individuals and medical care. "Emergency medical response across Texas is provided

every day by dedicated, trained professionals, working in ambulances stocked with lifesaving equipment," said Gene Weatherall, chief of TDH's Bureau of Emergency Management. Ambulances staffed with at least two trained and certified medics respond to medical assistance calls and at least one medic provides care to the patient during transport. Some ambulances are as well-equipped as hospital intensive care units. And 9-1-1 phone calls can now be made in every county in Texas.

"Nearly 50,000 trained and certified emergency personnel are part of Texas EMS," Weatherall said. "They respond to people in need and give the best emergency medical care possible. These highly trained medics are an integral part of our system of care for victims of sudden and se-

rious illness and injury."

In Texas, this system begins with an informed public able to recognize a medical emergency and make the call for help and includes a network of trauma centers that provide highly specialized care for the most seriously ill or injured.

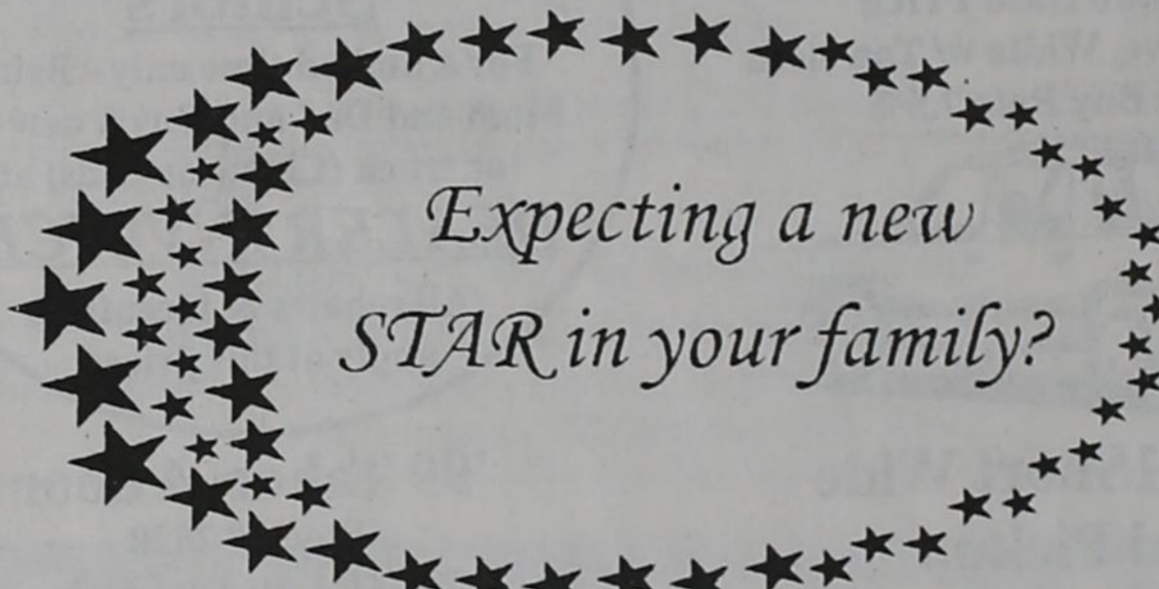

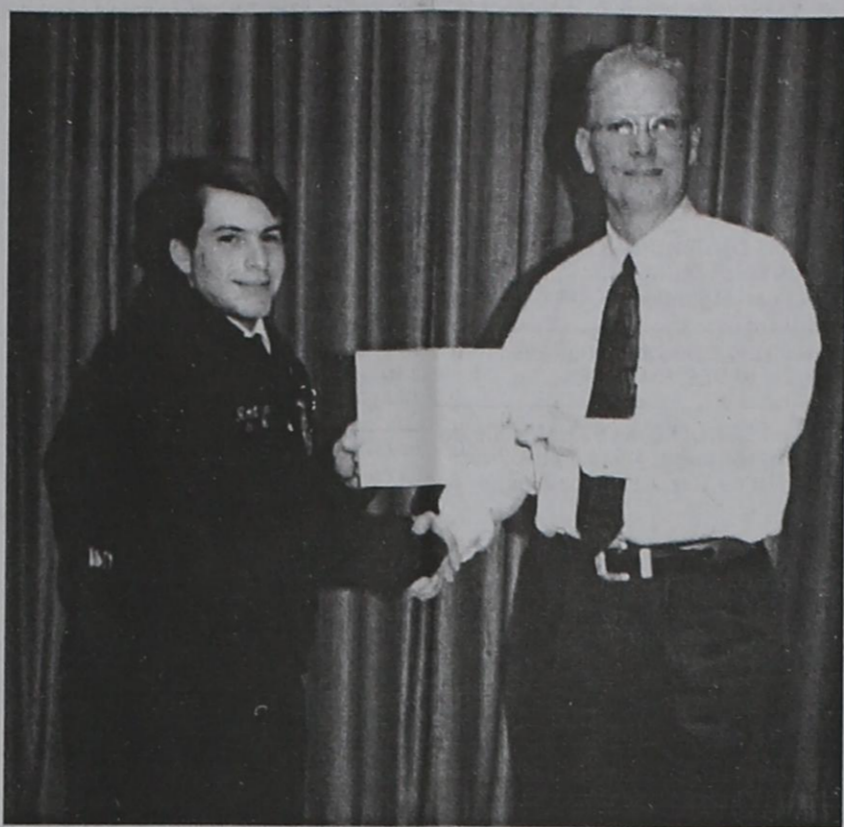

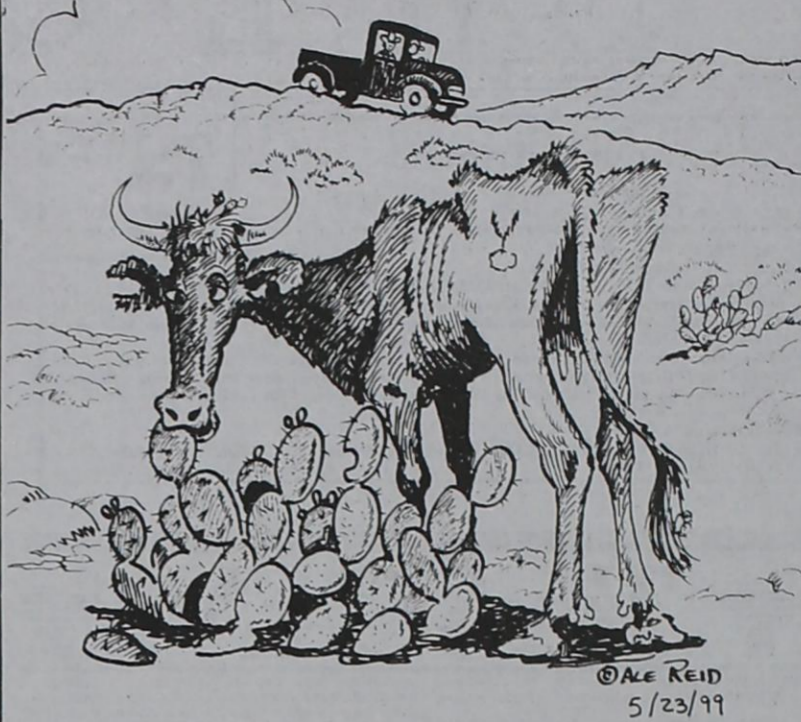

TxDot hosts preconstruction meeting to discuss improvements to FM97

The Texas Department of Transportation hosted a preconstruction meeting on Thursday, May 13, 1999, at 10:30 a.m. at the Motley County Maintenance Facility. The purpose of this meeting was to discuss the upcoming project for the complete rehabilitation of FM 97 in Motley County. This project will begin at the Floyd County line east and continue to the intersection of FM 97 and SH 70 in Matador, for a total of 9 miles.

Construction efforts on the \$1,051,211.00 project started May 13, 1999 with Nobles Road Construction being awarded the contract. The completion date will be approximately November, 1999, with the anticipated time line being approxi-

mately 109 working days.

"Widening this road will make a safer road for the citizens of Motley County" said Gary Mizer, P.E. Munday Area Engineer. "The contractors will work at full width during the day with traffic diverted to the ditch during the daylight hours. The road will be open to traffic at night."

Judge Laverna Price attended this meeting and said, "I am excited about getting the improvements on this road. It will be a plus for the people who live on FM 97."
