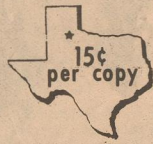

Baccalaureate Has Message Of Hope

A message of hope was contained in the sermon at Baccalaureate Sunday night when Rev. Bill Brown, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Roaring Springs addressed the graduating seniors of Motley County High School. The service was in the School gymnasium. The young pastor centered his remarks on scriptures read by graduate Randy Hunter, from the first chapter of Joshua, specifically the ninth verse: "...Be strong and of good courage; be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed, for the Lord thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest."

"Success if the accomplishment of life's goal," Rev. Brown pointed out. "There are no secret hidden formulas in the Bible--read the Book and follow its instructions." He offered as means of achieving success and happiness in life (1) an acceptable goal - a choice of vocation or career acceptable in God's eye; (2) an adequate guide - there is no better guide than God's word for it is good and it works; and (3) an able God - "Look to God. He is able and will never fail you."

Invocation was by Rev. Kenney Kirk, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, Matador and Roaring Springs and Rev. Terry W. Jones, pastor of First Baptist Church, Flomot pronounced the benediction. Singing was led by Fred Risser of Matador.

Processional and recessional were played by Mrs. H. R. Jameson.

Commencement service for the 24 graduates was conducted Monday night in the school gymnasium. Invocation was by Coach Gene Griffin, followed by the song, "This Moment in Time," by the senior girls. Salutatory Address was by Dennis Gwinn, and Pam Francis presented a piano solo.

Following the Valedictory Address by James Stephens, High School Principal Wayland Moore presented special honors. These included the valedictory and salutatory scholarship awards, the Lions Club Citizenship award, which went to Miss Jackie Bearden, and a special UIL Literary award in memory of the late Mrs. Reece (Grace) Timmons, a member of the school faculty for many years, which was presented by the Motley County Parents-Teachers Association, which went to both Bill Palmer and James Stephens.

Other awards were presented in school assembly Friday morning, and will be published next week. Superintendent of Schools Charles Johnson presented the class and the graduates received their diplomas from Mrs. C. W. Palmer, a member of the Board of Trustees. Benediction by Arnold Parker concluded the school's activities for the year.

Local Youths Win PTA - UIL Awards

James Stephens and Bill Palmer were presented the PTA-UIL Literary award at the 1980 graduation ceremonies held in the school auditorium Monday night.

The award, given in memory of Grace Timmons, is presented to the students in recognition of outstanding achievement in UIL literary competition. James, the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Stephens of Matador, placed first in district competition in science, second in district in slide rule, and participated in the number sense competition.

Bill, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Palmer of Roaring Springs, was named Best Actor in both district and regional levels of One Act Play competition. He also placed fifth in editorial writing at district and was the alternate in the news writing competition.

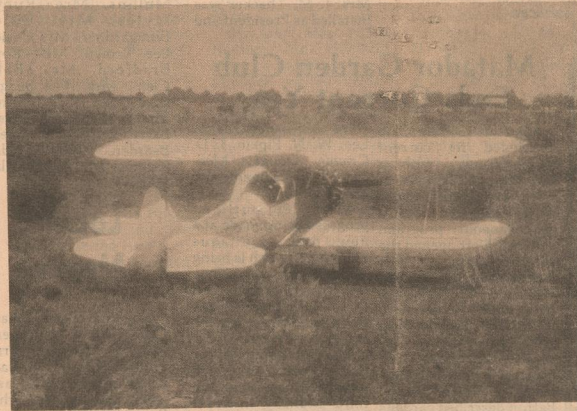
A point system is used to determine the winners of the award, and because of the points achieved by each of the students it was the decision of the committee to present the honor to two students this year.

FFA Area President Is Banquet Speaker

Motley County Future Farmers of America heard a challenging address Tuesday evening, May 13 at the chapter's annual banquet at the school lunchroom. Speaker was one of their peers, James Baxter of Shamrock, Area 1 President, 79-80.

Taking as his theme, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale's "Power of Positive Thinking," Baxter declared, "Think positive and you can do whatever you want to do." He continued this thought by citing that the careers of famous personalities such as Colonel Sanders, who began his Kentucky Fried Chicken chain at the age of 75, and the women's tennis champion, Billie Jean King, who overcame early childhood problems of obesity before attaining her goal.

Sharlene Smith has been invited to participate in the fiesta Bowl Southwest Track and Field Classic in Phoenix, Arizona on Saturday, May 31.

Tracksters from Mexico, California and Texas, Arizona, Colorado, Nevada, New Utah will attend the meet.

Grasshopper Numbers Are Down

Sharlene, one of the top 100 yard dash runners in area this year, was chosen as the only girl from Texas to run in the invitational track meet in the 100. She was a senior at Motley County High School this year.

She will be accompanied by Donna Thompson of Matador. The two will fly to Arizona.

During the past 2 weeks, three county wide surveys have been made in Motley County, reports Jerry L. Cummins, Motley County Extension Agent. The number of grasshoppers found has declined each time. The first survey showed as many as 51 nymphs per square yard. The second survey showed a maximum of 22 nymphs per square yard.

The third survey conducted this last Monday showed a maximum of 16 nymphs per square yard. The highest counts were found in the eastern and northeastern parts of the county.

Dividing the number of nymphs found per square yard by 3, gives you the estimated number of adults per square yard, to be expected later on this summer. Eight adults or more per square yard are considered economically damaging to range land. The recent rains and cool weather are the main reason for the decline in the grasshopper numbers, however the grasshopper hatch is not expected to be complete till the first or middle part of June. Numbers could increase rapidly, and therefore range land should continue to be inspected until the middle of June.

Music Group To Perform May 30

"The Golden Years of Country Music", the famed road show put on each summer by South Plains College, Levelland, is scheduled for a show May 30, 1980 in Matador, Texas.

Showtime is 8:30 p.m. at the football field. Back-up site in case of bad weather will be the high school gym. The show is sponsored by the Motley County PTA, and admission will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students.

Featuring a 15-member cast and nearly 50 classic and contemporary country/music hits, "Golden Years" is a spectacle of music, lighting, costumes, skits, and staging. In its debut last summer, "Golden Years" was seen by more

than 10,000 people as it toured 20 cities throughout West Texas and parts of New Mexico. The two summers before that, SPC put on its first road show, "Texas Cradle of Giants."

In this year's show the first half will focus on the early years of country music, from the 30's through the prime of Johnny Cash. Music will include a fiddle medley, a Carter Family medley, and songs made famous by such entertainers as Bob Wills, Hank Williams, Elvis Presley, and Buddy Holly.

The second half will bring country music up to date with music made famous by Eddie Rabbitt, Crystal Gayle, Tom T. Hall, the Gatlin Brothers, and many more. Elegant costuming,

multi-levels of staging, and multi-colored lighting also will add to the effect of a polished, professional country music show, says the show's writer, Helen Roberts, SPC assistant professor of speech and drama.

Ed Marsh teaches fiddle and mandolin for one of the world's few college degree programs in country and bluegrass music and he doubles each summer as a performer in "The Golden Years of Country Music". Both the show and the degree program are the brainchild of South Plains College in Levelland.

Tickets will be available at Ronnie's and the Dugout starting today. They will also be sold at a town canvas next week.

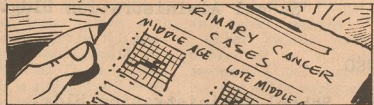
