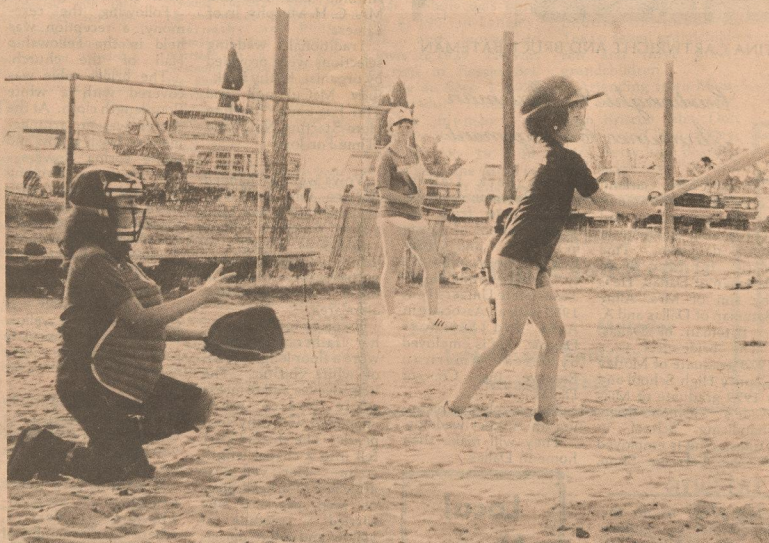
Bill was ranked 12 out of 209 students graduating in the 1980 class. In addition to this accomplishment, he was selected into the honorary medical society Alpha Omega Alpha. Membership in the fraternity is based on high achievements and grade point averages; and consists of

the top 13% of the class.

During his junior year in medical school he was awarded the Texas Merit Scholarship.

Southwestern Medical School is one of four medical branches of the University of Texas. The school is in affiliation with Parkland Memorial Hospital of Dallas, where Bill has spent the past four years in training.

On July 1, 1980 Bill will start an internship year in general surgery at Parkland, followed by a four year residency in orthopedic surgery.

## Drivers Urged To Prepare For Trips and Vacations

Drivers should prepare themselves for summer driving, according to Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety. With summer approaching many people are planning vacations and he warned drivers that accidents spoil vacation trips.

He said, "Summer driving is different because the motorist is trying to get away from it all and this means getting into an unfamiliar environment."

"For the urban driver the expressway can become a bore, lulling the unwary into highway inattention. Drivers who normally drive on quiet country roads can panic in the confusion of the

multilane mix of car and pedestrian city traffic."

Bell said, "Fatigue and lack of alertness is a serious problem on long freeway trips." He advised the motorist to stop every two hours to rest and never drive more than ten hours each day. He suggested that motorists get at least eight hours rest each night.

He stated that motorists entering large cities should plan their trips to avoid rush hour traffic, keep their speed down, stay with the traffic flow and be patient.

Major Bell said, "Drivers who think ahead, stay alert and drive defensively can have a safe trip and a great vacation."

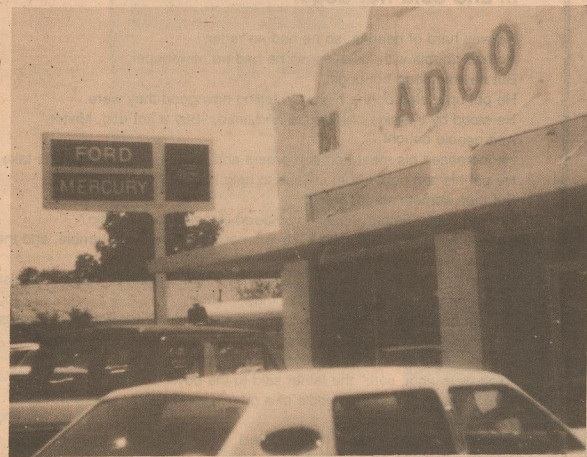

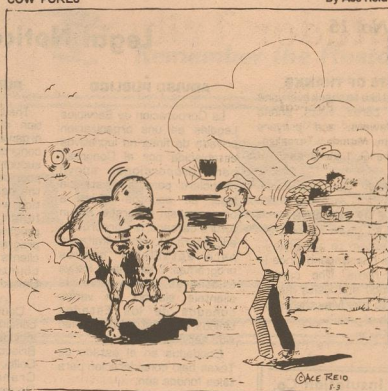
and was a member of the Brotherhood of Local Engineers.

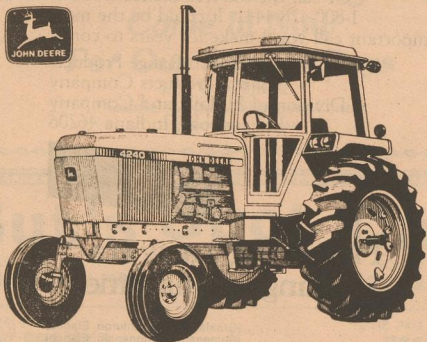
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
