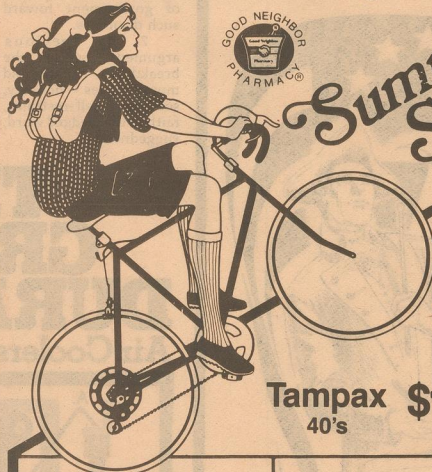

# Letter To The Editor

Solano, N.M.

Dear Sir:  
Two hundred years ago, when our constitutional Republic was founded (not a Democracy as Russia's government is) ten simple "easy to read" rules were used as guidelines.  
These ten simple rules that we are all supposed to live by read as follows:  
1. Thou shalt not have other Gods before Me.  
2. Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image.  
3. Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord God in vain.  
4. Remember the Sabbath Day and keep it Holy.

## Cattle Raisers Ask For Repeal Of Natural Resources Taxes

The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association took dead aim on the windfall profits tax law during their summer board meeting in Waco, Texas, June 12 and 14 and called for a repeal of all taxes levied on natural resources and products of the land. TSCRA further asked Congress to amend those tax laws that "threaten the maintenance of a decent standard of living for those who have invested and now are receiving modest income from royalties."  
The resolution, forwarded to the U.S. Congress, was one of five policy statements approved by more than 350 cattlemen attending the work session.  
John S. Cargile, TSCRA president from San Angelo, said the association supported the budget requests of the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories, including the building addition at Amarillo, provided it is within the guidelines set forth by the Governor and the Legislative Budget Board.  
TSCRA also endorsed the brush control, range improvement and beef cattle production research programs of Texas Tech University and recommended the continuation of the university's line-item funding for brush control research in the amount of \$650,000 annually. TSCRA requested that the appropriate state agencies reinstate line-item funding for the school's beef cattle production research in the 1981-1983 biennium for the

amount of \$228,823 for 1982 and \$244,823 in 1983.

TSCRA also sent a resolution to the state's legislative leaders supporting a request by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station for new funds for beef production research, feeder cattle health and nutrition research, bovine brucellosis research and new research in range management in the Corpus Christi area.

Citing the longtime, valuable contributions to the beef cattle industry from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, TSCRA committed its support to salary increases for Extension personnel, the addition of an Extension veterinarian for brucellosis, an area livestock specialist for the Coastal Bend area and two foods and nutrition specialists.

Bill Helming, president of the Kansas-based consulting firm of Livestock Business Advisory Services, Inc., gave a detailed outlook for the cattle industry in the coming year and decade. He advised that the nation's cattle herd, which had been liquidated drastically in recent years, will rebuild at a restrained rate in the next few years because of eight factors. Consumers will have limited beef supplies because of the high interest and inflation rates cattlemen face, higher energy costs, large meat supplies primarily from pork and poultry, restrained consumer demand for beef, grain prices rising faster than beef prices, the nation's economic and political instability and renewed emphasis on crop production in the previously heavy cattle producing areas in the Southeast U.S.

U.S. congressman Marvin Leath of the 11th District stirred the cattlemen to their feet and was interrupted at least three times by applause while giving a rousing speech on free enterprise and the conservative viewpoint.  
Committee chairmen holding meets were George E. Light II of Lytle, fever tick subcommittee; J. E. Birdwell II of Lubbock, animal health; John Merrill of Crowley, agricultural research; Jack Shelton, soil and water resources; William B. Blakemore II of Midland, land use and the environment; Alfred Negley of San Antonio, Cattle PAC (political action committee); and James L. Powell of Eldorado, Texas.

## New Energy Coming

The 1980s are expected to witness the development of geothermal energy, a source that will provide 7 to 10 percent of the nation's electrical power needs.

Geothermal energy is stored in the earth's crust in the form of super heated steam which can be withdrawn at high pressures and used to operate conventional turbines for generating electricity.

According to a group of geothermal experts who met at Texas Tech University June 19-20, the major obstacles in the advancement of geothermal sources include the extremely high temperatures in the earth's crust, the nature of the hard geothermal formations and corrosion of drilling equipment.

Dr. Samuel Varnado, a geothermal expert at Sandia Laboratories in Albuquerque, said that "these problems are likely to be solved through research by the late 1980s and will result in the reduction of geothermal drilling costs."

Geothermal energy would then provide "an impressive" 7 to 10 percent of the nation's electrical power needs, Varnado said. That is enough power for 100 cities like Lubbock, population 182,000.

Varnado's research time table expected to reduce drilling costs 25 percent by 1983 and 50 percent by 1987.

Part of the research that will ultimately reduce drilling costs is being conducted by Dr. Necip Guven, Texas Tech geosciences professor.

Guven is developing drilling fluids that can survive the high temperature and pressure deep in the earth's crust. The fluids, among other things, need to act as coolants for the drilling bits.

The Texas Tech geoscientist hopes to complete his work by next summer.

Research at other institutions is aimed at reducing corrosion on drilling equipment by using nitrogen as a drilling fluid and reducing corrosion-causing agents such as oxygen.

New drilling bits are also being studied to increase the speed of drilling geothermal wells.

Progress on these research projects was reviewed at the two-day meeting at Texas Tech. Participants in the Geothermal Drilling Program Advisory Panel's meeting came from the U.S. Department of Energy, Sandia Laboratories, major oil corporations and drilling companies, and university researchers.

Geothermal drilling technology has applications in the oil and gas industry for developing wells that are below conventional depths.



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
