## Lt. Col. John G. Rosh Speaks To Lions Club

Reese Air Force Base, Lubbock, passed in review here Tuesday of last week at regular bi-monthly meeting of Matador Lions Club at the First United Methodist Church, with Lt. Col. John G. Rosh of the base presenting the program.

Introduced by Lion Gerald Pipkin, a Captain in the United States Air Force, Lt. Col. Rosh showed a film of base activities after a brief introduction in which he explained the overall structure and performance of the pilot training program.



Lt. Col. Rosh is assigned to the 64th Flying Training Wing, (Air Training Command) at Reese, as the Chief of the Flight Operations Branch, under the Deputy Commander for Operations. As such, on a weekly basis, he is responsible for overseeing the scheduling of approximately 2,000 aircraft sorties by Reese's 200 T-37 and T-38 jet training aircraft. In connection with these flying missions, he also oversees the maintenance of flight records for 225 instructor pilots, and the posting of grade books for 550 student pilots.

He described Reese Air Force Base as a community of 3500 persons, including dedicated civilians as well as Air Force personnel, motivated to serve wherever needed, and compared its aims with those of Lionism.

The colonel is himself a Lion—a member of the Anton Lions Club, and a Lay Leader, Lay Speaker and Sunday School teacher for the First United Methodist Church in Anton. He also is Scoutmaster of Boy Scout Troop 629 in Anton.

Boss Lion Ronnie Vandiver reported on action of the directors at

their breakfast, and announced that the annual Father-Son banquet is set for Monday, February 23 at the Motley County School cafeteria, and that the Union Youth service will be on Sunday, February 22 at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Mark Rickman, Methodist pastor, as speaker. He urged the Lions Club members to attend these meetings. Secretary Jerry Cummins distributed assignment sheets for the banquet, and also for the upcoming volleyball tournament set for April 2-4.

## General Telephone Company Files Statewide Request

General Telephone Company of the Southwest Friday (Jan. 23, 1981) filed a statewide request for increased revenues with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) seeking \$44.6 million in annual revenues of which the company would receive \$23.2 million after taxes and uncollectibles.

The request is based on financial data for a one-year period ending Sept. 30, 1980.

General Telephone is the largest independent (non-Bell) telephone company in Texas serving over 1.3 million telephones in 291 exchanges across the state. Major cities served include Garland, Irving and Plano in the Dallas/Fort Worth area; Baytown and Dickinson in the Houston area; and Texarkana, San Angelo, Bryan and College Station.

F. E. Hightower, vice president-revenue requirements, said the major

factors creating the necessity for filing the application are continued inflation; record-setting gross construction expenditures necessary to keep pace with growth; and new technology.

"The money to finance new construction in the fast-growing Sun-Belt area of Texas must be borrowed at record high interest rates," Hightower said, "and double digit inflation continues making everything connected with providing service cost more. The company's program to improve and upgrade service and to continue to construct new facilities makes it necessary to request higher rates to more nearly reflect today's costs of doing business."

The request follows the company's first application filed before the commission on Feb. 25, 1980 for \$58.3 million resulting in August 1980 granting a \$31 million increase in annual revenues, including a \$4 million service penalty. The amount granted by the PUC also contributed to the need to file now for increased revenues, according to Hightower.

The PUC order issued in August stated the company must improve its service levels or face possible further action by the PUC. Rex Bailey, vice president-marketing and customer service, said, "Companywide service levels have improved significantly and are continuing to trend upward. We are optimistic the PUC review of our service will be favorable."

Bailey added, "In hindsight, I guess we felt a little too strongly the customer was maybe more interested in us holding rates down. Maybe we were concentrating a little too heavy on controlling expenses and not enough emphasis on meeting service objectives."

"However, now the

company has made a commitment to dedicate the necessary resources to improve service," Bailey explained, "and we are very pleased with the short-term results of the plan inaugurated." He also reported the status of the service improvement plan and service levels are reviewed monthly with the commission staff.

Bailey's testimony filed with the PUC includes a review of telephone growth in Texas during the year ending Sept. 30, 1980 (over 95,800 phones gained); capital budget increases during 1980 to meet growth and upgrade the quality of service (\$13 million bringing the year's capital budget to \$217 million); and detailed explanation of efforts to bring service levels in compliance with PUC rules and standards.

Bailey states the company met or exceeded the majority of PUC service requirements during September, October and November, pointing out objectives not being met are nearing PUC required service levels.

Oscar Gomez, rates and tariff manager, said overall the proposed tariff establishes rates that will, to the greatest extent possible, more equitably align rates with cost.

Significant changes affecting large customer groups include increasing monthly telephone rates in each of the 10 rate bands and foreign exchange charges, changes in service connection charges which more nearly allow customers to pay only for services used and an instrument recovery fee for customers who discontinue service and do not return leased instruments to the telephone company.

In addition, GTSW plans to implement changes in current offerings for secretarial answering bureau services.

## City Gets Check For Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday made payments totaling \$33.1 million to nearly a thousand cities levying the optional one percent city sales tax.

The payments represent the first rebates to cities this year who collect city sales tax and about \$10 million more than the cities received in January

of last year.

Matador received a rebate check for \$563.75.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller.

South Plains residents are asked to be on the lookout for salespersons selling an all-purpose cleaner door-to-door. These salespersons are representing a company called D & D Distributors out of Memphis, Tennessee.

This company attempted to obtain a peddler's license to sell within the city limits of Lubbock, but were refused due to the fact that the company does not meet the standards of the Better Business Bureau of Memphis, Tennessee -- unanswered complaints. The BBB/Memphis also stated that the company began operations in March 1980. The all purpose cleaner is called Vanage.

The BBB is unable to evaluate the quality of any product being sold to the general public. We do advise caution in dealing with this firm due to the fact that they are selling within the City Limits of Lubbock without a permit.

If you should be approached to buy their product, please notify the Lubbock Police Department immediately. If you do not live within the City Limits of Lubbock, please notify your sheriff's office or police department to see if the company has obtained a license to peddle within your area.

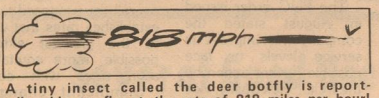

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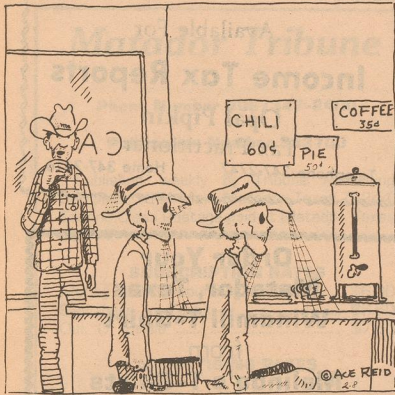
