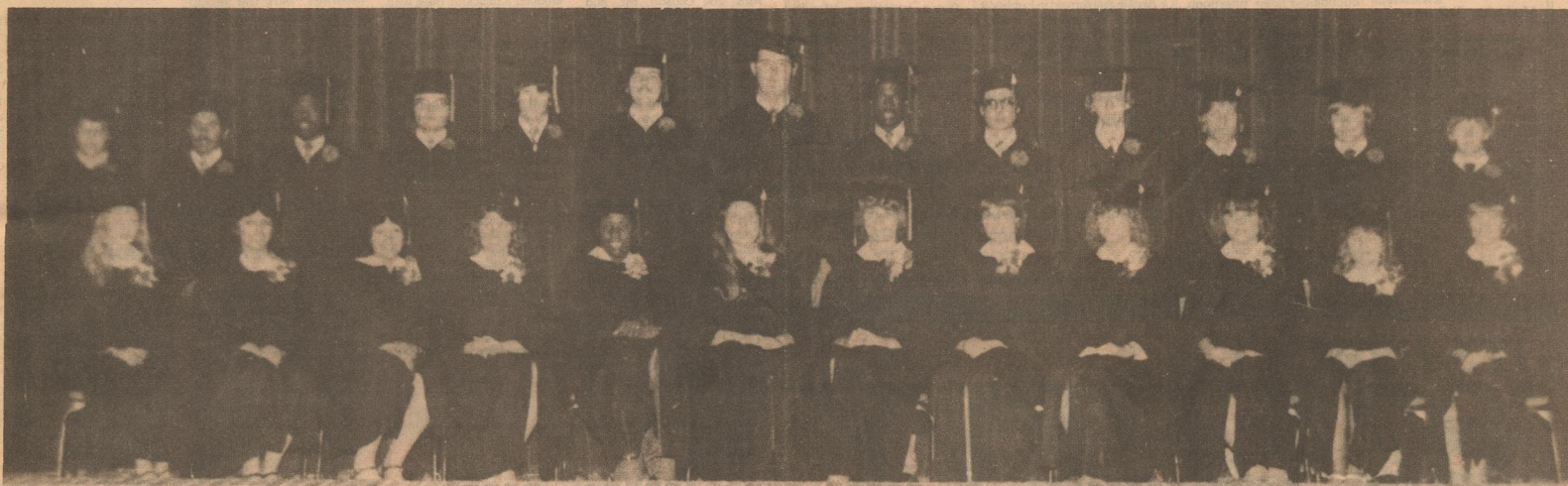

### Vernon Man Missing After Car Fire Sunday



A 52 year old Vernon man is still missing after his car was found burning 13 miles east of Matador Sunday afternoon on U.S. Highway 70.

Julius Leon James, 52, has not been heard of since the incident. The motor section of his car was on fire when local officials arrived, and the front of the car was resting against an embankment near the road.

Local firemen and Sheriff Alton Marshall sped to the scene upon receiving the report of the "car on fire" at about 3:15 p.m. Fred Huggins of Lockney had stopped at the scene and found James' drivers license in the front seat, along with a shirt and a pair of boots in the rear seat. A coat and other clothes had been placed over the motor of the car and the hood had been shut. Firemen said this might have been done in an effort to extinguish the flames coming from the motor. The car was facing east.

Marshall had the car towed into Matador and began an investigation. A search of the ranch pastures near the scene was conducted but officials failed to find the subject. Marshall said the man may have caught a ride to Paducah or on to Vernon, but several attempts to locate the man have failed.

Get your heart right with God and if there's changing that needs done, He will speak to your heart.

But again, it is the inner man that the Lord Jesus is concerned with. Listen to what he says in Matthew 23:25, "Thou blind Pharisee, cleanse first that which is within the cup and platter, that the outside of them may be clean also."

I've said all these things to say this. I am concerned about the large number of people in this area, or any area I've been in lately, who find it easy to make the Lord's day their day. Especially the ones who profess the name of Christian. Isn't that like stealing . . . taking something that is not yours? Isn't that usurping your wishes and desires over those of God, who without a doubt has your best interests in mind?

Oh, but Brother Bob you don't understand. I feel closer to the "Good Lord" when I'm out on the farm or my family and I take a long drive through the country. The "Good Lord" understands how it is. Isn't there a scripture somewhere about getting an ox out of the ditch?

Folks, I'm here to tell you, the day is coming when you'll meet the slain Lamb of God and have to look into His eyes and realize the awesome things He went through to purchase salvation for you. You know, they say its not the fall that hurts you, it's the sudden stop. And on the day when your life stops and you realize that this body you wear was your ticket into Glory you are going to cry out to God to forgive you for the days when you wouldn't serve Him because you wanted to do your own thing. You just plain wouldn't serve Him or you were too lazy or self-centered to submit yourself to what He had told you to do. On that day it will be too late to do anything about it.

I'm saying this, ministers and lay-people prepare themselves during the week to provide for you a spiritual feast on Sundays. And we and the Master of the house bid you to come in and dine. Do not find yourselves among the invited guests of Luke 14:16. I invite you to go and read it for yourself and let the Spirit of God speak to your hearts.

A program on enterprise given May 14 for El Progresso Club was a study of The State of the State address delivered in January by Governor William P. Clements Jr., at the 67th session of the Texas Legislature. Mrs. W. F. McCaghren was hostess for the meeting.

Rosa district had raised for Girlstown, had been sent to that institution. It had been voted by the district to contribute the fund to the foundation endowment fund, if established for Girlstown.

The state convention was held May 5-7 in Abilene, and attending from El Progresso Club, in addition to Mesdames Vinson and Campbell, were Mrs. J. E. Edwards and Mrs. L. B. Campbell.

Although the address was lengthy, it was read in its full context in order to familiarize the club with the processes of state government, as well as the economic condition, Mrs. Meador explained.

Inspirational Thought was by Mrs. D. E. Pitts, to conclude the program. Afterwards, Mrs. McCaghren served refreshments of cake squares and punch.

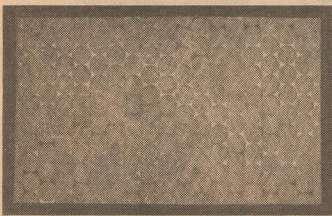

If you've been doing the right things at the right times such as planting the right varieties and fertilizing, watering, mulching and controlling pests properly, chances are you've begun to enjoy the "fruits of your labor."

Most inexperienced gardeners have a tendency to believe all that's left to do is to sit back and enjoy all those tasty, fresh vegetables. Believe me, that's wrong. If anything, you should pay even closer attention to your garden and what's going on out there. An outbreak of disease, an infestation of damaging insects, or even a short drought period can wreck your garden and make all previous efforts worthless.

Also, make it a point to harvest all your vegetables when they mature. To get the most from your garden, harvest your vegetables at their best stage for eating. This is also a must for canning and freezing. The final quality of your preserved vegetables is no better than the quality you began with. In other words, what you put in the jar is what you take out.

After all the effort you've put into growing your garden this year, make sure that you enjoy your vegetables at their peak of quality. It's important to remember that once a vegetable is removed from your garden, it has no further source of food nor

can it replace loss of moisture. So, make the time between harvesting and eating or preserving as short as possible.

Now it's time for a little philosophy. Gardening is a great activity--for everyone. Its rewards are many, but there's one that's overlooked by most and that's an appreciation of agriculture. You haven't been gardening; you've been "backyard farming."

If you have been successful this year, you owe a lot of the success to the advances brought about by modern science and research conducted by land grant universities and private industry. New varieties, improved cultural techniques, high efficiency fertilizers, and safe and effective pest control chemicals are all the result of a highly sophisticated agricultural system like no other anywhere in the world.

If your garden was a failure or just didn't live up to your expectations, try to figure out what went wrong. Vow to do better next time. And on your next trip to the local grocery store, be appreciative and thankful for the small number of farmers doing a great job to feed America.

You are asked to be on the lookout for advertising from a company by the name of Rocky Mountain Trading Co., d/b/a Factory Sales and/or Expo '81. This company is out of Salt Lake City, Utah and has been known to this Bureau since December 1980, when they were doing business on 19th St., here in Lubbock as Factory Sales. They were in the business of selling electronic equipment and waterbeds.

Based upon investigations by the BBB/South Plains and the local State Attorney General's office, the Attorney General's office sought and obtained a temporary injunction against Factory Sales, Colen Fryer, Rocky Mountain Trading Company, Brian Wallace and Robbie Chapman, in December 1980. They were enjoined from 1) Using a bankruptcy sales pitch unless there is actually a bankruptcy; 2) Using a regular price reference when that price is not the normal selling price of the goods of the company; 3) Using any other name than the official name unless an assumed name is filed for under State law; and 4) Referring that the company is a specialist in disposing property of others when in fact the goods belong to the defendant.

This Bureau would appreciate your letting us know if you are approached to buy advertising as they are being investigated for possible violation of the injunction filed in the State of Texas. 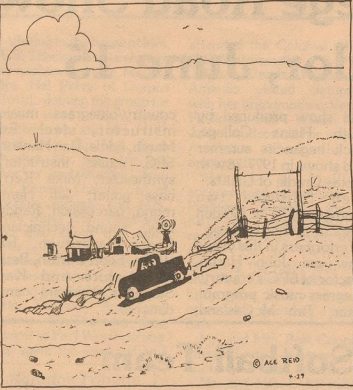
