This Week Recognized As Soil Stewardship Week

The previous two summers Royce has been employed by the Gainsville field office. Primary goals of the student trainee are furthering development in range planning and (SCS) operations. Royce is a senior at Texas Tech in the range department, and will graduate next May. He previously attended Grayson County College and graduated from S and S High School. Royce is a native of Sadler, Texas with a ranching background.

Soil Stewardship Week will be held nationwide this year May 24-31, according to W. H. Marshall, chairman of the Upper Pease SWCD. Since 1955, Soil Stewardship Week has been recognized in millions of churches and schools across the nation. It is designed to focus on the nation's natural resource problems and to consider ways to solve them.

"This country must, at whatever cost, maintain the capacity of the land to produce food and fiber," cites the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in its booklet for the 1981 observance. NACD sponsors Soil Stewardship Week in cooperation with the nation's 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

"With our population at 220 million and growing with many regions of the world depending on the United States to supplement their food supply, the need to maintain our productive capacity becomes increasingly apparent," according to NACD.

This year's event focuses on "Society's Pressure Points" as its theme and covers such topics as soil and water conservation, urbanization, and loss of prime

farmland.

Clinic Funding Approved Tuesday

Funding for a \$2.3 million rural health program for an eight-county area of the South Plains Health Systems was overwhelmingly approved by the health agency's directors Tuesday night.

As was the case last week when the issue went before the agency's project review committee, a large crowd was on hand. And once again, the audience - which numbered approximately 450 Tuesday night - cheered and applauded when the board okayed by a 25-5 vote the project, which is administered by South Plains Health Providers of Plainview.

The board also considered recommendations for next year's funding that would de-emphasize Plainview and Hale County and concentrate more on the smaller, rural counties.

Before voting on the issue, the board heard seven persons who urged approval of the program and two Plainview doctors who spoke against federal funding.

Dr. Richard Demmler of Plainview said his city has four physicians, including himself and his wife, who take Medicare patients. "South Plains Health Providers serve a very needed service in this area, but Plainview and Hale County are well served with 27 physicians," he said.

He said that SPHPO

handled between 800 and 1,200 patients per month and that "us four doctors could easily take over the care of 800 to 1,200 patients."

At one point in the meeting, the Rev. Glen E. Godsey of Plainview quoted scripture and told the board, "We should not forget that Jesus said the poor will always be among us. It does not matter if local government, county or federal takes care of us."

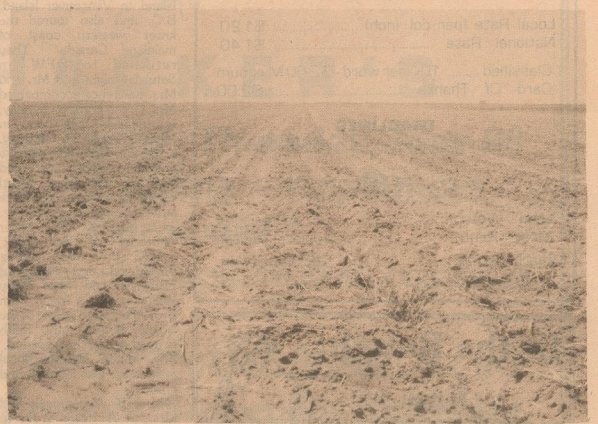
He said he knew of many area residents who could not get adequate medical attention if it were not for SPHPO.

Dr. John Selby, board chairman, questioned Godsey's reference to federal or local governments taking care of the indigent. He said the medical care should be each individual's responsibility, particularly that of the church.

Godsey replied that the church's "failure to take of its people allowed the government to step in. Thank the Lord someone like the government and SPHPO wanted to perform this service."

Board member Joe Horn of Plainview said the meeting's discussion about rural health offered "an opportunity for all of us to band together to get the best medical care with the cheapest federal dollar."

"If nothing else, we should look to the future of cooperating to solve all the problems of the poor," he added.

Cotton And Rye A Saving Combination

Several Motley County cotton producers have begun a rye-cotton double cropping system to cut down soil loss by the West Texas wind. This practice is proving to be very effective in fighting wind erosion. Along with cutting down wind erosion, the rye provides another source of income through the winter from its grazing value. In some years this extra income

may be worth more than the cotton crop itself.

The procedure generally used in this double cropping system is to seed rye in cotton in the late fall. The rye suffers little damage during cotton harvest. Then, depending on rainfall and the carrying capacity of the rye, cattle are turned in until spring. Around the first of May, after many fields have blown for six weeks, the rye can be disced and the land prepared for cotton.

Discing will leave some residue above ground to help protect it from blowing. The application rate of your pre-plant herbicide and fertilizer may need to be increased slightly because of stalk residue in the soil. Several producers have tried this double cropping system and are pleased with the results. If your fields are prone to wind erosion you may want to try cotton and rye - a saving combination.

Special Ed Program Presented To Lions

A program designed primarily to aid handicapped persons, which has been in effect for the past seven years and operated through the school system, was explained last Tuesday to Matador Lions Club by Tommy Wilson, who heads the Rolling Plains Special Education Co-operative program. Schools serviced include Paducah, Spur, McAdoo, Motley County, Valley (Turkey-Quitque), Guthrie, Dickens and Patton Springs.

Introduced by program chairman, Lion John Stevens, Mr. Wilson said that of the approximately 1800 students in these area schools, 168 were enrolled in the Special Education program.

The central office was moved to the Motley County School several years ago and has four employees, including a dietician, in addition to 12 teachers and five teachers aids.

The personnel travel to the other schools in this cooperative. Students do not stay with the program full time, Wilson said. "Some require one or two hours a day, some two or three times a week. They receive attention according to the amount of help is required."

If the personnel can't help the handicapped they refer them to other sources who can, Wilson said. "We have had trouble locating all the handicapped children, and would appreciate any help from the public."

He explained further that the persons do not have to be of school age. "This program is for ages 0 to 21, and handicaps

covered are visual, mentally retarded, hearing, speech, pregnancy and multi-handicaps."

The program is financed with Federal funds which come through the school system and can't be used for any other school expenses. The budget for the combined schools in this group is \$159,000, with Motley County School set at 16.54%, Mr. Wilson said.

Lion Alan Bingham presided at the meeting in the absence of Boss Lion Ronnie Vandiver. He led the club in an expression of appreciation to the Methodist Women for a good meal, and guests introduced were Roy Seaborn, a Texas Tech

student working this summer with Agronomist Warren Multer, Tommy Wilson, and Ray Zabielski Jr.

Lion Bingham reminded the club that as sponsors of the Boy Scouts, expenses of two Scouts to the National Scout Jamboree this summer would be a project of the club in helping finance the trip.

Lion Larry Hoyle reported on a recent meeting at the courthouse in connection with Motley County Clinic, and urged all who could, to attend the hearings in Lubbock scheduled for May 21 and May 26, to review the application for funds.

Funnel Clouds Reported Tuesday

Matador residents were sent to the storm shelters shortly after 10 p.m. Tuesday following a call to the sheriff's office from the National Weather Service stating a funnel cloud was about five miles Northwest of the city, near Antelope Hill.

Residents of that area had earlier reported a tornado on the ground. Weather service confirmed it by radar.

Matador, however, received only a few sprinkles as did Roaring Springs. Billy Paul Simpson at Northfield reported six tenths of an inch of rain but no severe

weather.

Earlier in the day golfball size hail was reported near Silverton, but most of the bad weather went well north of Matador. Shortly after the report from the weather service Sheriff Alton Marshall was at Antelope Hill and said he could see a few stars shining.

Residents remained in shelters from 30 to 45 minutes before the all clear was given by weather watchers. At about 11 p.m. the weather service reported radar indicated a funnel cloud North of Paducah.

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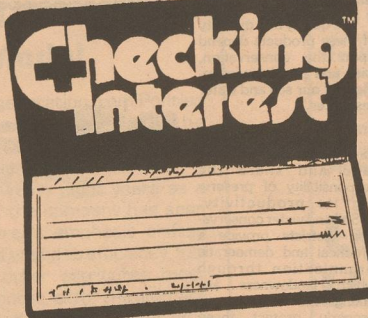
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Roaring Springs News

An impressive Commencement program was presented Monday evening by the 1981 graduating class of Motley County High School.

After the Invocation by Larry Neighbors of the coaching staff, Charles Cammack delivered the Salutatory address in which he declared, "The old story is finished-but a new story is beginning for us," as he reviewed the accomplishments of his class to this point. He expressed his appreciation to the teachers and all others who had assisted him through the years, "...and especially do I thank my mother, who has been both a mother and father to me." His father, the late Bryan Cammack had just been elected County Judge when he died of a heart attack in 1966.

The class song by the seniors was followed by the Valedictory Address by Kenny Holt, who challenged his classmates with thoughts of the future. He too, thanked the faculty, his parents, and all others who had supported him through his school years.

Presentation of honors by Wayland Moore, High School Principal included the valedictory and salutatory awards to the two top honor graduates and other scholastic honors. The valedictorian received the Matador Lions Club's Citizenship award, and a State Scholarship to a college or university of his choice, with exemption from tuition for the first two regular semesters. In addition, he received the class scholarship award for the highest grade average for the year, 97.15.

Highest grade in the entire high school was made by Renee Renfro, with an average of 98.20 for the year. She also received the 9th grade class scholarship award. This award for the 10th grade was received by Roy Thompson, with an average of 95.47, and John Douglas Russell with 95.45, and the 11th grade award went to Derinda Cruse with an average of 94.77.

The requirement for this award was that the student must have attended Motley County School all year, Mr. Moore explained. Nine of the graduating seniors had above 90 grade averages for the past two years, with Linda Palmer being the highest ranking girl and third

ranking graduate, with 95.961 average.

Presentation of the class was by Charles Johnson, Superintendent of Schools, and diplomas were handed out by members of the Board of Trustees, Mrs. C. W.

Palmer, James W. Taylor and Billie D. Durham, each of whom, with Mr. Johnson, had a child graduating. Benediction by Walter Jones concluded the program, for which Mrs. H. R. Jameson played the Processional.

Seniors Admonished Of The Power Of God
