AN EXCITING POLITICAL week end in Motley County simmered down a couple of hours after the polls closed Tuesday night Two write-in candidates in the race for County Judge and Ex-Officio County Superintendent, failed to change the voters for the Democratic nominee, Forrest Camp-

A letter in the mails Saturday morning asked voters to consider Judge Elbert Reeves as a write-in candidate for re-election. Saturday afternoon circulars were distributed showing voters how to write in the name of former Judge Vance Gilbreath for the office. The circulars were also distributed in the mails. The result was to bring out a record general elec-† tion vote in the county.

Forrest Campbell was elected with a total vote of 383. Elbert Reeves received 216 votes and Vance Gilbreath received 184

Mrs. Velma Fulfer received the largest vote in the county, 851, for reelection to the office of County treasurer. Her vote was over 60 more than the combined tota's of three men in the judge's

Motley County gave a slim majority to Waggoner Carr and Dee Miller, but both lost their races to Republicans in state and

Total vote for Carr, attempting to unseat US Senator John Tower, was 402 to 351 for Tower. In the Congressional race Dee Miller received 392 to Bob Price's 309. Voters crossed party lines at will in all five county boxes and used the write-in space freely. Voting was heavy here during the entire day and 501 ballots had been cast in the Matador box when the pols closed.






